

Bob Watson Appointed OSC Backfield Mentor

Corvallis—(U.P.)—Two new assistant football coaches, one a former Medford high school player, have been named at Oregon State College to aid new head coach Tommy Prothro in the 1955 campaign.

Bob Watson, former standout Medford gridder who played his collegiate ball at UCLA, was appointed backfield coach, and Bob Zelinka, UCLA freshman coach last year, was named line coach. Zelinka also played football for the Bruins.

Prothro Chooses
Announcement of the appointments was made today by Jim Barratt, assistant athletic director. Barratt said the selections were made by Prothro who recently was hired at Oregon State after several years as backfield coach at UCLA.

Prothro said he still is searching for a third assistant. A hold-over from the Kip Taylor regime is Freshman Coach Dick Twenge.

Bob Watson, named backfield coach at Oregon State college, was a 1946 graduate of Medford high school. He was a backfield star for the Black Tornado as a quarterback and fullback in 1944 and 1945 and was rated as one of the all-time Medford grid greats. Watson was an all-state basketball center in 1946.

Rosburg, Holguin Knot at Tucson

Tucson, Ariz. — (U.P.)—Bob Rosburg, of San Francisco, and Tony Holguin, of Midlothian, Ill., led going into the second round of the \$10,000 Tucson Open today but with a mob at their heels.

The two carded five-under par 65s Thursday, one stroke better than George Bayer, Los Angeles, and Bud Holscher, Santa Monica, Calif., who tied at 66, and two strokes better than the next five top scorers for the day over the El Rio course.

Nearly 30 players carded below par first rounds and 19 shot par. Gene Littler, who had been rated the favorite off his Phoenix and Los Angeles titles, was among those failing to break par, along with Ed Furgol, PGA champion from St. Louis; Dr. Cary Middlecoff and many other winter circuit stars.

Tucson, Ariz. — (U.P.)—Oregon's two entries in the Tucson Open golf tournament trailed leaders Tony Holguin and Bob Rosburg by several strokes today.

Bob Duden of Portland had a 72 in the opening round, while Ralph Richter of Gearhart had a 73. The leaders both fired 65's.

NCAA Cage Meet Ducats Available On February 21

Oregon State College, Corvallis—Monday, February 21, has been established as the day ticket applications for the Western Regional NCAA basketball championships will first be accepted, Athletic Business Manager Jim Barratt announced Tuesday.

The regionals will be staged at Gill Coliseum on Friday and Saturday, March 11 and 12, with Oregon State college and Corvallis as hosts for the fourth straight year.

Barratt said any ticket applications bearing a postmark prior to February 10 would be returned immediately to senders unfiled. Each customer will be limited to four tickets each night. All correspondence should be addressed to Barratt at Coliseum 103 in Corvallis.

Two automatic entrants in the tourney will be the champions of the Mountain States conference and Pacific Coast conference. The two other teams will come from either two at-large clubs or from winners of the Border conference and Rocky Mountain conference. Playoffs will be necessary to determine the latter two entrants.

Paul Andrews Meets Johnson

New York—(U.P.)—Lanky Paul Andrews and muscular Harold Johnson will fight again tonight at Madison Square Garden for a possible shot at the light heavyweight crown.

Andrews of New York, second-ranking contender, is favored at 7½ to 5 to turn the tables on Johnson of Philadelphia, number three, because of his improvement under Joe Louis' instructions.

Johnson, a counter-punching specialist, won a majority decision over Andrews in their previous bout at Chicago stadium last March 17.

Mary Faulk Takes Lead In Professional Start

St. Petersburg, Fla. — (U.P.)—Mary Lena Faulk, who turned golf professional because "it was either that or get a job," didn't take long to catch on to her new trade.

Miss Faulk, former amateur star from Thomasville, Ga., made her pro debut Thursday in the first round of the St. Petersburg Women's Open tournament and showed no traces of nervousness as she seized the first-round lead with a five-under-par 69.

Miss Faulk didn't take an extra stroke as she collected five birdies and 13 pars and her 69 total was even two strokes under men's par. Her brilliant play gave her a one-stroke lead over pretty Marlene Bauer of Sarasota, Fla., and two strokes over Patty Berg of St. Andrews, Ill.

Army Grid Clubs Granted Bowl Game Clearance

West Point, N.Y. — (U.P.)—A congressional committee granted Army football teams clearance to appear "whenever invited" in post season bowl games today but high military authorities were expected to ask President Eisenhower to approve a "limited-participation only" policy.

Pointing out that "the main objectives of West Point cannot be subordinated to appearances in athletic contests," an Army source said Lt. Gen. Blackshear Bryan, the Academy's superintendent, probably will recommend a bowl appearance "only once every three to five years."

The West Point Board of Visitors, composed of Rep. F. Edward Hebert (D-La.) Rep. Olin E. Teague (D-Tex.) and Rep. Leroy Johnson (R-Calif.) voted unanimously at a surprise meeting Thursday to recommend that Army appear in post season bowl games "whenever invited." Rep. Hebert said the board's recommendation would be sent directly to Mr. Eisenhower "who will direct the Academy to follow the recommendation."
