

Nominees Selected For Academy Awards

Hollywood — (U.P.) — Judy Garland, Grace Kelly, Jane Wyman, Audrey Hepburn and Dorothy Dandridge were nominated Saturday night for the annual "Oscar" award as best "actress of 1954."

The workers of movieland also named their five choices for best actor, best motion picture and "Best" of everything else that goes into making screen plays.

Best Actor Nominees

Nominated for the "Best Actor" award, to be handed out with the other "Oscars" by the motion picture academy of arts and sciences March 30, were:

Marlon Brando, the tough dockworker of "On the Waterfront"; Bing Crosby, the has-been singer who loses himself in alcohol in "The Country Girl"; Humphrey Bogart, the tyrannical "Captain Queeg" of "The Caine Mutiny"; Dan O'Herlihy, who played the title role in "Robison Crusoe," and James Mason, the alcoholic actor who commits suicide in "A Star is Born."

Miss Wyman played the doctor's wife in "Magnificent Obsession," the 1954 version of the best-seller of the 1930s. Miss Kelly attempted to save Crosby in "The Country Girl," Miss Garland was the unknown girl who rose to stardom in "A Star is Born," and Miss Hepburn was

the chauffeur's daughter in love with her father's employer in "Sabrina."

Miss Dandridge, the first Negro nominated for a "Best Actress" award, played the cigarette girl in "Carmen Jones."

The five best movies were: "Caine Mutiny," from the best-seller and stage play about a mutiny aboard a U.S. destroyer escort vessel.

"On the Waterfront," the tough story of labor racketeering on the docks.

"Country Girl," from Clifford Odette's story of the alcoholic singer who is a has-been.

"Seven Brides for Seven Brothers," a backwoods musical.

"Three Coins in the Fountain," the story of three girls in Italy seeking romance.

Five film beauties were nominated for best supporting actress of last year. They were Jan Sterling, Eva Marie Saint, Nina Foch, Claire Trevor and Katy Jurado.

"On the Waterfront" walked off with three of the five nominations for the "best supporting actor" role by placing Lee Cobb, Karl Malden and Rod Steiger on the ballot for the finals. The other two nominees were Tom Tully, for his work in "The Caine Mutiny," and Edmond O'Brien, who played in "The Barefoot Contessa."

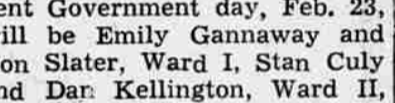
Delegates Chosen

Army, Navy Slate Amphibious War Training Exercise

San Francisco — (U.P.) — The Army and Navy will team up next month in a large scale amphibious warfare training exercise from one end of the Pacific coast to the other and back again.

Labeled "surf board," the exercise will feature an assault landing on California beaches near Hunter Liggett military reservation by 6,000 men of the 38th regimental combat team from Fort Lewis, Wash.

The combat team will leave Fort Lewis aboard navy craft beginning March 6 for San Clemente island off southern California where a live demonstration of naval firepower and Army artillery will be staged to show troops the actual covering fire that would be available in an assault landing.

From San Clemente island the troops will be transported to the beaches near Hunter Liggett where they will storm ashore and make a simulated attack on an "aggressor" guided missile launching and storage depot located underground.

The 38th will push inland over a newly-built 30-mile military road, locate the dump and "destroy" it, and then withdraw to the ships.
