Maid Servant Tells Police of Slaying Of Wealthy Woman

Beverly Hills, Calif.—(U.P.)—A young maid servant admitted Saturday she hacked wealthy Mrs. Kate Hayden, 71, to death with a hand axe after arguing how to carve a roast of beef. The maid, Peggy King, 25, who had been employed only three days at the Hayden's lavish home here, broke down and confessed the murder after police got a "bad reaction" from her during a lie detector test. Miss King told officers she had got the hand axe to cut the bone on a round roast. Mrs. Hayden, the wife of millionaire real estate man Samuel Hayden, came into the kitchen and they argued over how the bone should be cut, Miss King told police.

"During the argument Mrs. Hayden took the axe from me and tried to show me how to do it," police quoted her as saying. "She continued arguing with me and I took the axe from her and struck her on the head. She didn't fall after I struck her once, and then I struck her again and again."

Nerves on Edge Miss King, who first told officers she was vacuuming in another part of the house when the murder was committed, said her nerves had been on edge since her common-law husband of the two years had left her. It was her screams that brought six landscape workers rushing to the blood-spattered kitchen.

Police said the young maid rushed upstairs after the murder and pulled open dresser drawers in an attempt to make it appear the house was burglarized. Then she returned to the kitchen and started to scream.

Langlie Will Consider Seeking Senatorship

Sacramento, Calif.—(U.P.)—Gov. Arthur B. Langlie said Friday that he would consider running for U. S. senator in his state of Washington next year if President Eisenhower wanted him to make the race. Langlie said the matter has been discussed with him by several persons "close to the President."

"I have preferred to retire from public life and return to law practice after three terms as governor and prior service as a councilman and as mayor of Seattle," Langlie said. "But I am willing to do anything the President wishes me to do to help him in his administration."

The governor made his comments prior to his return to Olympia. He was principal speaker Thursday night at a Lincoln day dinner in San Francisco.

Ike Gets Slight Cold While on Hunting Trip

Thomasville, Ga.—(U.P.)—President Eisenhower developed a slight cold during an unsuccessful hunt for quail in wintry weather here Friday and decided to remain indoors Saturday. The chief executive, week-ending at a "warm weather" plantation where the mercury dipped to 22 Friday night, appeared to be slightly hoarse this morning. He did not require the services of a doctor.

Instead of taking to the fields again where 90 minutes in a light rain and a sharp, cold wind yesterday brought no hunting luck, Mr. Eisenhower organized a bridge game.

The President flew here Thursday for some quail hunting but the weather ran against him. He returns to Washington tomorrow.

Retail Meat Prices Drop to Low Mark

Chicago—(U.P.)—Retail prices of the 14 most popular meat cuts and items this week averaged lower than at any time during the last year, the American Meat Institute reported Saturday. Pork continued most to the decline, the institute said, averaging between 10 and 26 per cent below prices of a year ago.

Sliced bacon, for example, was selling 22 cents a pound less than a year ago in Chicago and was typical of prices elsewhere, the report said.

Shells Fired by Big U.S. Atomic Cannon More Powerful Than Hiroshima A-Bomb

New York—(U.P.)—The nation's armed forces now have 30 huge cannon each capable of firing shells more devastating than the atom bomb dropped on Hiroshima, and more are on the way, Attorney General Herbert Brownell Jr. said Saturday. Brownell, speaking at the National Republican Club's 69th annual Lincoln Day dinner, said that since 1952 five atomic-cannon battalions, each equipped with six cannon, have joined military units. Each can fire a larger atom warhead than the World War II bomb that nearly wiped out the Japanese city of Hiroshima, he said.

Mr. Eisenhower, in his budget message, made a statement that "needs no embellishment." In that statement, the President said the nation never had been as well prepared to defend itself as it is today. "It is as comforting to us as it is disappointing to those with evil designs upon our free institutions to know that Nike guided-missile battalions, fighter interceptors, aircraft control and warning networks, land and water radar systems, and other defensive measures are rapidly going forward to the point where, already, a surprise enemy attack would find us with increasing readiness to resist attack and retaliate with devastating effort," Brownell said. "Our offensive striking power is outstanding in the present world situation."

It was here Brownell mentioned the atomic-cannon battalions, and added that air force fighter interceptor squadrons now are 100 per cent jet equipped. The atomic submarine USS Nautilus, launched last year, will be joined this year by the USS Sea Wolf, an atomic sub of different design, he said. "The building of two atomic-powered attack type submarines is underway," he said, "and additional submarines of this type are included in the 1956 budget, as is a fifth aircraft carrier of the Forrestal class." Brownell said that despite increases in military strength, the 1956 estimated defense department costs are more than \$9,500,000,000 less than actual expenditures in 1953.

Springfield, Ill. Solemnly Observes 146th Anniversary of Lincoln's Birth

Springfield, Ill.—(U.P.)—This prairie city that claims Abraham Lincoln as its most revered son Saturday solemnly observed the 146th anniversary of the Civil War President's birth. War veterans, government officials and others made pilgrimages to the tomb on a knoll in nearby Oak Ridge cemetery, where Lincoln was buried after he died by an assassin's bullet in 1865. Visit Lincoln Home Others paid their respects at the simple brown house near downtown Springfield, the only home Lincoln ever owned, and at the restored village of New Salem, where he lived as a young man. As almost every school boy knows Lincoln was born in a

log cabin in Kentucky. But ceremonies on his birthday traditionally revolve around Springfield, for it was here he spent much of his adult life and it is here he lies enshrined. One of the first wreaths placed on the tomb Saturday was that of President Eisenhower. Col. Richard D. Boerem, adviser to the Illinois National Guard was assigned that duty. Legion Makes Pilgrimage The American Legion made its 21st annual pilgrimage to the tomb, led by National Commander Seaborn P. Collins, Las Cruces, N.M. The Veterans of Foreign Wars and others also mapped pilgrimages. Members of the Sangamon County Bar Assn. planned their usual hike to the tomb from

the county courthouse, which was the state capitol when Lincoln lived here. Their route follows that of the Lincoln funeral procession in 1865. A special feature of today's birthday observance was to take place at Lincoln's home. Six more rooms were to be formally opened to the public for the first time. New York Newspaper Asks Jenner To End Handouts

Syracuse, N. Y.—(U.P.)—The Syracuse Post-Standard said Saturday its publisher asked Sen. William E. Jenner (R-Ind) to stop mailing postage-free "political handouts" to the newspaper. The request was made in a letter from publisher Richard H. Amberg to Jenner, a member of the Senate Internal Security committee. Amberg's letter said in part: "It is of absolutely no interest to readers of the Post-Standard to have copies of your remarks to the Shelby County (Ind.) Republican Central committee and the Madison County (Ind.) Central committee and others which

you send us through senatorial frank at public expense . . . "I feel that it is an imposition on the taxpayers for you to send us your remarks at taxpayers' expense, and I would appreciate it if you would delete our name from your mailing list." The Post-Standard, listed as Independent-Republican, said it had been receiving Jenner's "political handouts" for several months. U.S. Military Reserve Said Weakest in NATO Washington—(U.P.)—Gen. Alfred M. Gruenther, supreme allied commander in Europe, said Saturday the United States' military reserve system "is one of the weakest in the entire North Atlantic treaty organization." He said it would take several months to get U. S. National Guard and reserve units into action after an attack—"an unacceptable situation in a jet-atomic age." Gruenther's statement was issued by the defense department along with two others by overseas commanders supporting President Eisenhower's proposal to build a 5,000,000-man U. S. reserve. Joe Rips Coexistence In Lincoln Day Speech Appleton, Wis.—(U.P.)—Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy ripped "co-existence" with the Communists in a brief speech here Friday night devoted almost entirely to a criticism of the Eisenhower administration. The Wisconsin Republican told a hometown Lincoln day dinner audience that "co-existence is a catch phrase of an adopted defeatist assumption that half the people are free and half are slaves." For the second time in two days, McCarthy referred to a recent White House snub suffered by him and his wife.

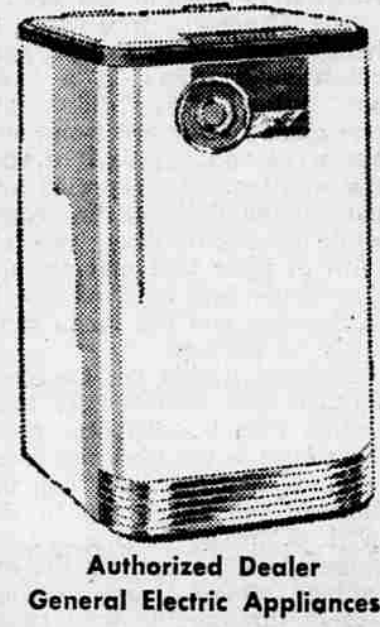
