House Pays Honor To Past Speakers

Salem — (U.P.) — The House yesterday honored its past speakers with an eulogy by Gov. Paul Patterson and with plaques of appreciation.

Attending the special speakers Day ceremonies were nine former speakers of the lower house. They were Lawrence T. Harris, speaker in 1903; John H. Carkin, 1927; Frank Lonergan, 1931; Howard Latourette, 1935 special session to authorize building a new state-house; Harry Bovin, 1937; William M. McAllister, 1943; John Hall, 1947; John Steelhammer, 1951, and Rudie Wilhelm Jr., 1953.

Gov. Patterson noted that Harris was presiding over the House when Patterson was only three years old. He said the state owed a debt of gratitude to all the past speakers for "giving of themselves" to the history and greatness of the commonwealth.

Weather Handicaps Search for Plane

Norcia, Italy — (U.P.)—Italian officials directing the search for a Belgian airliner missing since Sunday with 29 persons aboard confirmed today that planes had sighted wreckage on a mountainside.

However, fierce winds, a blinding snowstorm and bad atmospheric caused Italian authorities to suspend all air search for the missing airliner. The Italian Air Rescue Center announced that planes would resume the search as soon as flying conditions improve.

But Italian police searching the slopes of the mountain on foot reported they were only 1240 feet from the summit without finding any trace of the wreckage.

An American Navy pilot first caught a glimpse of wreckage on 8128-foot Mt. Vettore in Eastern Italy yesterday.

Rubinstein Killers Declared Known

New York — (U.P.)—Authorities said today that a chauffeur who once worked for Serge Rubinstein had given them the names of the persons who killed the millionaire draft-dodger in his Fifth ave. mansion Jan. 27.

The disclosure that police knew the men who choked Rubinstein to death was made by Asst. Dist. Atty. Alexander Herman who appeared in General Sessions Court to ask that the chauffeur, Herman Scholz, 50, be held in high bail as a material witness.
