Finland Said in No Danger From Russia

Washington (U.P.)—Rep. Walter Norblad (R-Ore) has been reassured by the State Department that Finland isn't in any immediate danger of being gobbled up by Russia.

Assistant Secretary of State Thurston B. Morton, in a letter to the Oregon congressman, said "official reports reaching the Department of State do not tend to corroborate fears of certain sources, some of whom have not recently visited Finland to obtain first-hand information."

The letter said that while Finland has been a target for Russian blandishments in the past several months, the advances can be regarded as part of the Soviet "peace and goodwill offensive."

Man Shoots Self When TV Flickers

Mill Valley, Calif. (U.P.)—Wade Cook, 49, railroad brakeman fired a Luger pistol into his television set and then killed himself last night when he became enraged because the TV flickered in the final rounds of the Bobo Olson-Tiger Jones fight.

Mrs. Jewel Cook, 48, told Deputy Sheriff Guy Gibbs that her husband was irate when the TV screen kept "flicking over." She said he took a pistol from his gun collection and fired a bullet into the set. Then, she said, Cook went to the kitchen and shot himself. He was dead on arrival at Marin General Hospital.

Californian Raps Dixon-Yates Attacks

Washington (U.P.)—Rep. James B. Utt (R-Calif.) said last night the attack on the controversial Dixon-Yates power contract "is not based upon facts" and is part of "the fight of the socialists to destroy private enterprise."

The contract provides for the Dixon-Yates private power combine to transmit power into the government owned TVA system to replace power TVA furnishes atomic installations at Paducah, Ky.

Public power is the easier segment of industry to nationalize, Utt said.

"The socialists cannot afford to let the Dixon-Yates contract go unchallenged, even though it would supply the shortage of energy, encourage private industry and save the government from borrowing another \$100,000,000," he said.

"I am glad the President is standing firm on the issue in spite of the attacks," Utt said.
