Sen. Morse Returns To Washington; Many Comment on Change

Washington — (U.P.) — Sen. Wayne Morse of Oregon, who was regarded as an independent when he left here Thursday for a visit to his home state, returned to his congressional duties as a Democrat Saturday.

The senator arrived by United Airlines plane early yesterday morning from Portland, Ore. Morse conferred in Salem briefly Friday before going to Eugene for a visit in his home town.

While in Salem he conferred briefly with Democrat leaders on his 1936 campaign plans and was guest at a coffee hour at the home of Charles Jens.

Greenville, S. C. — (U.P.) — Maj. Gen. Chester E. McCarty, commanding officer of the Eighteenth Air Force, declined to comment Saturday on reports he may run against Sen. Wayne Morse of Oregon next year.

Timberline Lodge Negotiations End; Reopening Unlikely

Portland — (U.P.) — Negotiations between the Forest Service and Timberline Lodge, Inc., were broken off late Friday, and the corporation attorney said it appeared highly improbable the lodge would be reopened in the near future.

Ruben Lenke, lodge attorney, said the negotiations were undertaken in an attempt to obtain Forest Service permission to operate the lodge until Feb. 22.

The resort was ordered closed to guests after the Sandy Electric Co-operative shut off electric service.

Lenke said the lodge management had hoped to have the Mt. Hood resort open over the Washington holiday, when at least 200 skiers from Washington state were expected to use the ski facilities.

Washington — (U.P.) — Democratic National Chairman Paul M. Butler said Friday Sen. Wayne Morse's decision to become a Democrat proves there is no room in the Republican party for "an independent a liberal, or an enlightened conservative."

Butler, in a letter welcoming the Oregon Senator into the Democratic fold, said Morse's "example will have the effect of convincing countless thinking Americans that they can best serve their highest hopes for America by active enlistment in the Democratic party."

Morse bolted the GOP in 1932 and campaigned for Democrat Adlai E. Stevenson for President. He then became an Independent. His single vote last month gave the Democrats control of the Senate in the 84th Congress.

Will Support Morse
Senate Democrats also welcomed Morse into the party. Sen. Richard L. Neuberger (D-Ore.) said he would support Morse in 1936 and predicted his reelection. Neuberger said Morse could still be "independent" while a member of the Democratic party.

Sen. Earle C. Clements acting Senate Democratic leader, said "the Democratic party is big enough, broad enough for anyone who is interested in progress of this country to become a member."

"It can't be said he, Morse, took this step without doing everything possible to reform the Republican party," Kefauver said.

Washington — (U.P.) — The conversion of Sen. Wayne Morse of Oregon, from Republican to Independent to Democrat, gave Sen. Sam J. Ervin (D-N.C.) a chance for a little evangelism.

"As one licensed by the Democratic party to convert political sinners to righteousness," Ervin drawled across the senate's aisle, "I offer any other member of the Republican party opportunity to confess his past political inequities, get right with the Lord and join the Democratic party."

516 Delivered to Legislature; 73 Drafts Submitted

Salem — (U.P.) — Requests for drafting 539 bills are still to be carried out by the legislative counsel. It was announced Saturday.

Sam Haley, legislative counsel, said he had delivered 516 bills to the Legislature and in addition had submitted 73 rough drafts of bills. The 73 drafts are included in the count of 539 bills yet to be prepared.

Still More Bills
In addition there will be some 20 to 30 or more bills, drafted by the ways and means committee staff, to be introduced, carrying appropriations for the 1935-37 biennium. On top of this are 100 or so bills drafted by the Oregon State Bar staff or by some attorney at request of a legislator.

In the 1933 session a total of 1215 bills in both the Senate and House were introduced.

Must Be Cleared
Although all bills from now on must be cleared through the Rules Committee in each chamber, veteran observers here look for a total of bills at least equal to the total in 1933 with indications there might be more this session.

Expanded Aid Plan For Asia Approved

Chicago — (U.P.) — A new expanded aid program for Asia has been approved by top administrative officials and should be before Congress by April, Harold E. Stassen, Foreign Operations administrator, has revealed.

Stassen, at a news conference Friday, declined to disclose the cost of the new program for Asia but said the total program falls within the approximate \$3,500,000,000 recommended in the President's budget for overseas aid.

In a speech to the National American Wholesale Grocers Association, Stassen said that while the foreign aid program costs billions of dollars, the results "brighten the prospects for future jobs and future progress, future business and future peace for every American home."

Washington — (U.P.) — The Oregon State Society, composed of Oregonians living in the nation's capital, held its annual party Friday night and the wife of newly-registered Democrat Sen. Wayne Morse brought down the house.

Mrs. Morse was called upon to speak for her husband, who had not yet returned from Oregon where he switched his political affiliation Thursday. She commented quietly, "I think my husband can get us into enough trouble without me speaking." The crowd roared with laughter.

Scientist Sees Catch In Russian Proposals

Chicago — (U.P.) — Atomic scientist Harold C. Urey said Saturday there's always been "one catch" to Russian nuclear plans.

The catch, said Urey, is: "who will watch them to see that they do what they ask the others to do?"

The University of Chicago scientist said, in commenting on the Soviet Union proposal for destruction of all nuclear weapons, that "if there is adequate inspection provided in the new Russian proposal, I'm all for it."

Urey said that "sometimes I believe the Russians are sincere, that they actually understand how bad the situation regarding hydrogen bombs has become."

Neutralized Formosa Backed by Sen. Stennis

New Orleans — (U.P.) — Sen. John C. Stennis (D-Miss.) Friday said Formosa should be neutralized as the "best prospect for peace in Asia."

Stennis, a member of the Senate Military Affairs Committee, said it is "wishful thinking" to believe that Chiang's forces can successfully invade the mainland of China.

Stennis criticized Adm. Arthur W. Radford, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, for "overly aggressive action on this Formosa question." He said he believed Radford's sentiments verged on actual warfare. Stennis was here briefly after attending a highway dedication at Baton Rouge.

WIN WAGE BOOST
Chicago — (U.P.) — The AFL Glass Bottle Blowers Association has announced it has won a five cent hourly wage increase for a large group of members.

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Q. What is stilbestrol?

Q. What animals should be fed supplements with stilbestrol?
A. None except cattle being fattened for slaughter.



Q. What are some of the toxic effects that could result if stilbestrol is fed to breeding stock?
A. Possible breeding trouble is the main objection.

Q. Why is it so important that a steer get only 10 milligrams of stilbestrol in his daily ration?
A. Too little of this growth stimulant won't produce maximum gains... too much might be toxic, producing adverse health condition.

Q. To what class cattle are Purina Steer Fatena and Beef Chow with stilbestrol recommended at the present time?
