Closing Arguments Heard in Dodele Case

Hillsboro — (U.P.) — Closing arguments were presented today in the first degree murder trial of 17-year-old Jerry Dodele, accused of killing Peter Ribbers, 64, in Timber, Ore., last November.

Washington county District Attorney James Gardner attacked defense claims that young Dodele was intoxicated at the time of the slaying. Gardner said "Jerry Dodele wanted money; he borrowed a gun; searched for money in Peter Ribbers' house; Ribbers came home, Jerry aimed the gun, fired and Ribbers lost his life."

Trial of the youth began last Monday in Judge Arlie G. Walker's court.

Dodele who was arrested several days after the slaying, allegedly signed statements made to the police admitting he shot the elderly railroad machinist when he surprised Dodele in the act of burglarizing his home.
