DOCTOR-CAUSED HEART DISEASE

Iatrogenic is the word for something produced by or caused by the doctor. The word has been used in medical literature in the past few years but N. Webster has not yet recognized it in its entirety, though iatro- and -genic are separately defined.

Iatrogenic heart disease has been freely discussed in recent medical journals and books. In Canadian Medical Association Journal (45:1, '41) Dr. J. A. Oille said that almost 60 per cent of patients who consult a heart specialist (cardiologist) is the \$150 word for it) suffer from an exaggerated or wholly unnecessary anxiety arising from suggestion and not based on reason.

Now, wait, neurotics. I'm just quoting what Dr. Oille said about it. If you want to go around with your heart in your mouth, don't worry about what I say—probably none of your relatives, friends, employers or associates will take my teachings as seriously as they do the conventional weak heart obsession.

Without breaking faith with Hippocrates I quote also what Drs. H. B. Weinberg (Annals of Internal Medicine, Jan. '53) and

M. Friedman (Functional Cardiovascular Disease, Williams & Wilkins, '47) say about doctor-caused heart trouble:

The manifestations of iatrogenic heart disease are generally produced by anxiety or worry. They include palpitation, breathlessness, fatigability and pain in the region of the heart.

Apprehension, dizziness, fainting, cold clammy hands and feet, spells of very rapid heart beat.

If an avowed quack may contribute a word here, I'll say it is remarkable how rapidly the rapid heartbeat (tachycardia) becomes normal if the sufferer's attention is diverted—say by a telephone call from a friend eager to impart good news, or a funny story—if anyone dares to tell a funny story in such circumstance.

As Dr. Weinberg carefully points out, in iatrogenic heart disease the heart is normal, although innocent murmurs, minor electrocardiographic variations, some alterations in blood pressure and disturbances of rhythm occur.

On television the other evening appeared a man who had "died and then came back to life." The man said that in the course of an operation his heart had stopped, so the surgeon had quickly made an opening, inserted his hand and massaged the heart until it resumed beating. What had caused his death, the man explained, was "cardiac arrest."

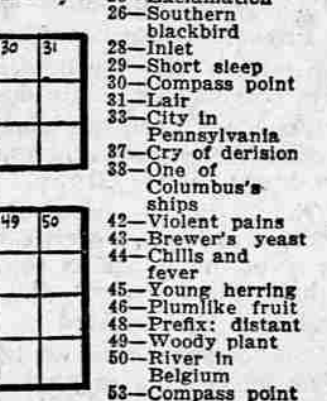
