

Lodge Invites Russians To Contribute Material To 'Atoms-for-Peace' Pool

Pan American Seeks New Zealand Flight

San Francisco —(U.P.)— Pan American World Airways will inaugurate a third weekly flight from the West Coast to New Zealand on March 10.

The new flight will follow the same route as the existing two weekly flights—from San Francisco to Auckland via Honolulu and Fiji, with connections at Honolulu from Seattle, Portland and Los Angeles.

United States To Seek Honest Disarmament Plan

London —(U.P.)— U. S. Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge Jr. invited Russia today to contribute fissionable material to President Eisenhower's "atoms for peace" pool.

Lodge spoke on the eve of a five-nation disarmament conference here at which he is the chief U. S. representative.

He promised that the United States will "leave no stone unturned to develop an honest disarmament scheme" at the forthcoming five-power meeting.

Lodge told a press conference he had noted Russia's Feb. 18 statement that the people of the world demand establishment now of a system of world-wide cooperation and peaceful use of atomic energy.

Gromyko Confers
As he spoke, Andrei Gromyko, deputy Soviet foreign minister and chief delegate to the disarmament conference, conferred with British Minister of State Anthony Nutting. Informed sources said Gromyko outlined Russia's latest disarmament policy.

The Soviet plan was first broadcast by Moscow Radio last week end, and probably will be considered by the conference together with other proposals already on the agenda.

These included a Franco-British compromise plan on "phased" disarmament, or disarmament in easy stages, with effective controls, and a U. S. working paper on controls and an international authority. Western officials have stated they are prepared to consider alternative proposals which would achieve overall reduction of world disarmaments.

No Optimism
President Eisenhower, at his press conference in Washington yesterday, said history affords no great reason for tremendous optimism.

Lodge said today "No one is more anxious for international cooperation and peaceful use of atomic energy than President Eisenhower."

"Such a system was set up at the last session of the General Assembly by a resolution which received a 60 to 0 vote," he said. He then issued the American invitation to the Russians to pitch in and cooperate.

"I ask this question," Lodge said. "Wouldn't it make a wonderful impression if the Soviets were to contribute some fissionable material to the stockpile being set up subject to that resolution? It would be a wonderful impression if they would back their statements with some concrete steps which they can well afford to take."

Marilyn Monroe To Ride Pink Elephant in Parade

NW Congressmen Torn Between Devotion To President or To Reciprocal Trade Program

Washington — Pacific Northwest congressmen were torn last week between devotion to President Eisenhower or the reciprocal trade program and their desire to offer protection to a host of regional industries that opposed the president's tariff-cutting trade program.

Representatives of many Northwest industries were here trying to enlist votes to modify or kill the trade bill, a feat nearly carried off with help from other regions until Speaker Sam Rayburn and GOP Leader Joe Martin stood shoulder-to-shoulder to back up a last minute plea for support from Eisenhower.

Rep. Thor Tollefson, Tacoma Republican, spoke for most Northwest industries opposing tariff reductions, telling the House of these regional products in danger:

1. Tulips, iris and daffodils — "in my district alone are grown some 30,000,000 King Alfred daffodils annually — more than are grown in all of Holland. But faced with growing imports of foreign flowers, produced at the low-wage rates prevailing there, the growers of the Northwest are facing bankruptcy."

2. Tuna, salmon and halibut — "there are several thousand ships and an estimated 20,000 or more fishermen

employed directly in the taking of these fish . . . and yet with imports from Japan and South America growing at an alarming rate, these American ships will be driven from the seas and the American factories closed up unless relief is granted soon."

3. Red raspberries — "imports of cheaply produced red raspberries from abroad are beginning to threaten red raspberry growers in my district."

4. Hardboard — "six of the nine domestic producers of this vital national-defense item are located in Washington or Oregon . . . vastly increased imports have already had a serious impact on the domestic industry. One producer has been forced to lay off

more than 350 employees; another reports production cutbacks of 50 per cent."

5. Plywood — "this important industry, likewise, is suffering from a lack of adequate protection, and plywood made in Japan at wage rates drastically below those of our own workers is now coming into this country in greater and greater volume."

6. Tree nuts, including filberts — "The nut industry has consistently sought (tariff) relief . . . but this relief has just as consistently been denied them."

Wool growers and cherry growers of the Northwest also opposed the trade bill.

Tollefson was joined by two Oregon Republicans, Reps. Harris Ellsworth and Sam Coon, in voting for the motion to send the bill back to committee with instructions to revise it so that (1) the Tariff commission would have to cancel tariff cuts if an industry showed it was threatened by foreign competition; and (2) the president could not, as now, set duties independently of the commission's recommendations.

Eisenhower openly opposed this move by sending Joe Martin a letter to read to the House. Supporting the president were Republican Rep. Walter Norblad and Democratic Rep. Edith Green, who favored the president's plan to negotiate with U.S. allies for gradually reduced trade barriers over the next three years.

While many lawmakers duplicated Tollefson's plea for industries in their own areas, they were countered with arguments from others favoring more trade who pointed out that trade is a two-way street in the sense that every American dollar used to buy foreign imports is then subsequently used by the foreign

Instructor Slays Army Officer as Climax To Feud

Wichita Falls, Tex. —(U.P.)— A civilian instructor in intelligence training today faced charges of murdering a lieutenant colonel and wounding a captain in a flurry of gunfire that ended a long standing disagreement.

William Francis Sink, 38, instructor at Sheppard Air Force Base, was charged with the shooting.

A volley of shots killed Lt. Col. Carl G. Carlson, 43, Spokane, and critically wounded Capt. Marvin L. Marchesi, 34, Los Angeles, yesterday in the colonel's office.

Sheppard authorities believed the six shots fired at the officers climaxed a disagreement among the three men when they were stationed at Lowry Air Force Base at Denver.

Carlson was director of intelligence training at Sheppard, while Marchesi was attached to the same outfit.

Sheppard information officers said Sink was known to have had trouble in the past with several military men at Lowry and was moved to different jobs from time to time.

Carlson was shot in the head several times. Marchesi also was hit in the head at close range and was reported today in serious condition. A brain surgeon was flown from Lackland Air Force Base, San Antonio, to operate on Marchesi.

Two Pistols Used
Lt. Billy Rector of the Sheppard Information Service office said he knew nothing about earlier reports that the colonel was handing Sink his discharge papers when the shooting took place.

The Air Force said the shots were fired from two pistols as the three men conferred in Carlson's office.

Sink, who has two sons and lives in Wichita Falls, was held today without bond in Wichita county jail.

One Sheppard spokesman quoted Sink as saying after the shooting: "I did what I wanted to."

But Rector said he had no report of Sink's making any statement and referred all questions to the tight-lipped FBI.

'Good and Dutiful' Wife Files Suit for Divorce

Tulsa, Okla. —(U.P.)— Mrs. Robert A. Wallace, suing for divorce because of gross neglect, said she had been a "good and dutiful wife throughout her marriage."

In her petition filed Wednesday she said her husband deserted her 15 minutes after the ceremony and had not been seen since.

They were married seven days ago.

Student Newspaper Points To Discrimination

Chicago —(U.P.)— The Roosevelt University newspaper, "Roosevelt Torch" announced the elevators in the school library would exclude coeds under 5-feet-2 and men with mustaches and carry only freckled students as passengers.

The purpose of the bans were to demonstrate the "arbitrary and ridiculous distinctions of discrimination" in conjunction with the observance of Brotherhood Week, the newspaper said.
