Magnuson Offers Oregon Tax Bill

Washington — (U.P.) — Sen. Warren G. Magnuson (D-Wash.) introduced a bill yesterday which would prevent Oregon from withholding state tax from paychecks of certain federal employees who work at Bonneville dam.

Some of them work in Oregon but live in Washington and this creates a double tax load since they pay a sales tax in Washington, Magnuson said.

In Salem, tax commission officials said if the employees work in Oregon they owe the Oregon income tax. But they said it is possible for the government to limit the collection of withholding tax on such employees if it so desires.

Kiwanians' 'Tel-A-Versions' Runs Gamut of Entertainment

"Tel-A-Versions," the 1955 edition of the Kiwanis Kapers, which opened last night at the Medford High school, ran the full gamut of revue entertainment. It opened with "pieces" of Marilyn Monroe, satirized that latest American institution, television, and worked up to a grand finale including practically every Kiwanis member in Medford.

After the introduction of Marilyn Monroe's parts, the revue got off to a swift start with the Angel Gabriel and Saint Medford deciding to investigate the effects of television on suffering humanity. The first act to be investigated by Gabriel included mad scientists, roller skaters, wrestlers, giveaway M.C.'s, comics, bijou girls and all the assorted entertainment that makes television reminiscent of vaudeville.

Aimed At Culture
The second scene of the play was aimed at the cultural level, and presented a ballet, vaguely—very vaguely—modeled after Swan Lake. However, this little production would have made Tchaikovsky revolve in his grave. It is highly recommended for those who feel that they guffaw with difficulty!

The effects of television on our junior citizens was effectively demonstrated in Scene 3. Perhaps the ultimate in explosive breakfast cereals was shown as a tribute to TV commercials.

Scene 4 took place in a typical horse opera saloon, which was complete with shootin', can-can girls, mustachioed prospectors, and ladies who sing swing songs. There was also a nice smooth talk routine. This little idyll is interrupted for the shooting of a movie scene revolving around a warbling cowboy, and tremendous activity takes place before the film is safely in its can. Incidentally, this scene would make a boiler factory seem like a nice quiet cozy place.

Dragnet Theme
"Friday," "Saturday" and "Monday," snap-felted gentlemen, gave the "Dragnet" theme the once over lightly with the homicide hatchet, and provided lots of good bloody fun. The graphic pantomime of murder on the banks of Bear creek is guaranteed to captivate the most hardened whodunit fan.

The Hit or Miss Parade, Scene 6, recaptured the singing and dancing of the Roaring Twenties, with the Charleston no less, well done by a lot of people who were really too young to remember the original.

After the intermission, the Fred Herring show followed with a medley of choral, solo and dance numbers. A complicated soft shoe routine added to the nostalgic vaudeville atmosphere.

One of the hits of this act was Ribberace himself, complete with teeth, candelabra, and brother George, also an amusing patter.

High School Orchestra
The high school orchestra gave a very good original arrangement of "Little Brown Jug" and performed nobly throughout the evening, furnishing all the music for the performance.

After the Poof Girls, who plugged a fine perfume guaranteed to make you disappear if

necessary, the grand finale went on, with a very snappy routine by the Yankee Doodle girls.

All through the show, the music was lively and the costumes were eye-catching. The props were ingenious and added punch to the general gaiety. Noteworthy, too, was the elaborate harmonizing of the choral groups.

"Tel-A-Versions" will play through Saturday, Feb. 26, curtain time at 8:15 p.m. Reserved tickets can be bought at Barker's and regular tickets can be purchased from any Kiwanian or at the door.

All Kapers Funds Go To Kiwanians' Boys, Girls Work

Kiwanians today reported how money raised by the annual Kiwanis Kapers is spent. The seventh yearly production of the Kapers is now being presented at the Medford High school. Last year, the event raised a total of \$4,167.14, and all of it went to boys' and girls' work in Jackson county. Representative figures listed by Kiwanians show examples of how it was spent, including \$157 for surgery and hospitalization on one hernia patient, \$25 for clothing and bedding for a 4-year-old; \$63 for milk for several weeks for a large family; \$53 for glasses for three children; \$435 for dental work for eight children, and other similar expenses.

Other Aid Given
In addition to these specific relatively smaller expenses for individual cases, which totaled more than \$2,500, the Kiwanis club also gave money to help send the Medford High school band to the Shrine East-West game in San Francisco, contributed camperships for the YMCA, aided the Girl Scouts, and assisted other similar projects. The amount of work and enthusiasm for the project is demonstrated in the fact that the cast of the Kapers alone is usually more than 100, and the club's membership totals 113 men, members pointed out.
