Bills in Legislature

Salem — (U.P.) — A bill that would permit the State Chiropractors' examining board to censor before publication any advertising copy prepared by one of Oregon's 67 registered foot doctors has come under fire here.

Newspaper, radio and advertising people as well as chiropractors objected to the restrictions on advertising. Chiropractors also objected to a companion bill that would boost annual license fees from \$10 to \$17.50.

But measures had been introduced at the examining board's request.

Salem — (U.P.) — A proposal for a five-man highway commission has received the endorsement and support of a large delegation who crowded into the House Highways Committee for a public hearing on the bill.

A representation from the Oregon Motor Court Association urged adoption of the measure to increase the size of the commission from three to five members—one from each of the four congressional districts and one member at large. The bill as originally drafted, would have made the fifth member a representative of roadside businesses but that section was deleted at the recommendation of the OMCA.

No opponents of the bill appeared at the hearing.

Salem — (U.P.) — A bill that would have permitted three Oregon counties to buy equipment and materials without calling for bids has been defeated in the Oregon house.

The bill was sponsored by the Lane county delegation in the House to let county courts or commissioners declare an emergency and then buy materials outright, without advertising for bids. It would have affected Lane, Marion and Multnomah counties but was turned down after several members objected to the trend toward increasing use of the emergency clause in local government.

The house approved unanimously a bill authorizing the secretary of state to liquidate the Milk Marketing Administration which was wiped out by the voters last November. The bill, at the same time, would establish machinery which could be used in the future if other state agencies should be eliminated by the voters or the Legislature.

Salem — (U.P.) — Second-time losers in narcotics cases will be subject to life sentences in the penitentiary if the Oregon Senate approves a bill that passed the House with only three dissenting votes.

The Original bill had called for a death sentence for persons convicted twice or more of violation of narcotics laws. That section was deleted by the house state and federal affairs committee and the life sentence substituted.

Principal sponsor of the bill was Rep. Joe Rogers (D-Independence).

Salem — (U.P.) — The Senate has passed a measure authorizing school boards to pay travel expense of their members when going on business of concern to their districts.

Some apprehension was expressed that the permission might be abused. But Sen. Lowell Steen (R-Milton-Freewater) Eugene Allen (R-Portland) said school board members serve on their own time and have shown no inclination to waste the money of the district.

The Senate also voted in favor of a bill to abolish discriminatory wage rates based on sex.

The new industry committee of the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce embarked on a new program of evaluating home-grown industry at a meeting this week, and Don McNeil, chamber manager, explained that the committee, under chairmanship of Hugh Coleman, not only will attempt to persuade outside industries to locate in Medford and vicinity, but will attempt to evaluate and arouse interest in industries already established here which show possibilities of growth.

A group of local citizens met in the Crater Lake Motors showroom and heard officers of the firm explain the production facilities and sales possibilities of the recently re-organized Kompak Trailer company. Spokesmen for the company were Jack Lewis of Medford, new general manager, and Jack Vanneman of Oakland, Calif., the firm's sales manager.

Mayor of Lebanon Leaves for Lebanon

Portland — (U.P.) — The Mayor of Lebanon, Ore., left here yesterday with his wife on a 16-day visit to Lebanon, Syria.

Mayor Ralph Scroggin said he was carrying gifts of myrtlewood, lebanite, a pressed wood product, and an Oregon state flag for the Lebanese government.

Mayor Scroggin said he and the mayors of the other 27 Lebanons in the United States had been invited to the Syrian city of Beirut.

The mayor said his city was named after Lebanon, Tenn., which in turn was derived from Biblical references to Cedars of Lebanon, located in the state of Lebanon, Syria.

The Lebanese commissioner-general of tourism, M. Houma, extended the invitation on behalf of his government, Scroggin said.

how she finally landed a job at the fair promises to be a lulu and Sally vows to bare all in telling her story.

"I'm not going to pull any punches in telling my story," Sally said.

Played Lady Godiva

She will tell how on a chilly May night in 1933 when the fair was just getting underway she accepted a dare that led to her getting a chance to perform her fan dance on the "Streets of Paris."

With all animals barred from entering the fair grounds, Sally hired a boat to bring her to the fair grounds astride a big horse. Sally came riding down the

"Streets of Paris" portraying Lady Godiva, winding in and out and around the tables where a group of Chicago's leading socialites were seated at a milk fund dinner.

Fair officials expressed both amazement and shock and Sally was advised there would be no job for her. But fair officials hadn't anticipated press and public reaction. A few days later Sally was waving her fans in her own show. She was an immediate sensation, the biggest attraction at the fair, and for the paltry sum of \$100 a week.

This Time a Bubble

She was back again as the star attraction at the 1934 con-

tinuation of the fair, and again she was a success, this time with a bubble dance.

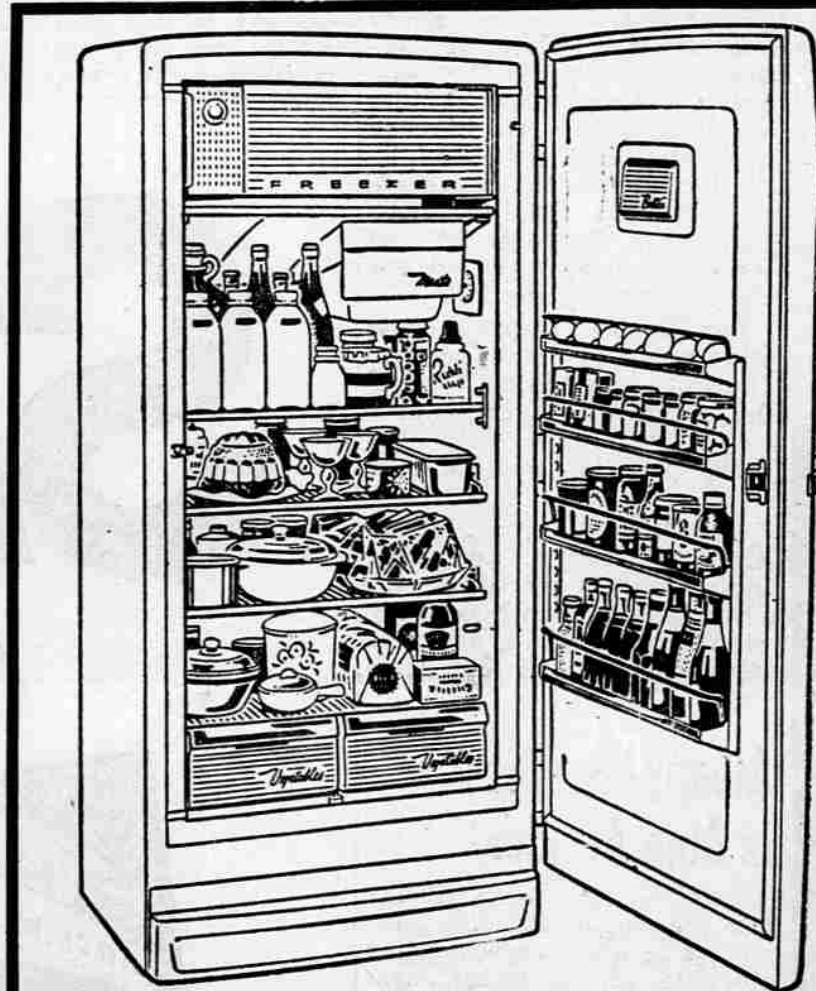
But her story doesn't start with the fair nor does it end there. She was a Wampus Baby star in 1927 and had a minor role in one of the all-time great movies, Cecil B. DeMille's "King of Kings."

Sally is currently appearing at the Tropics night club here. In between times she adopted a baby boy, now 6 years old.

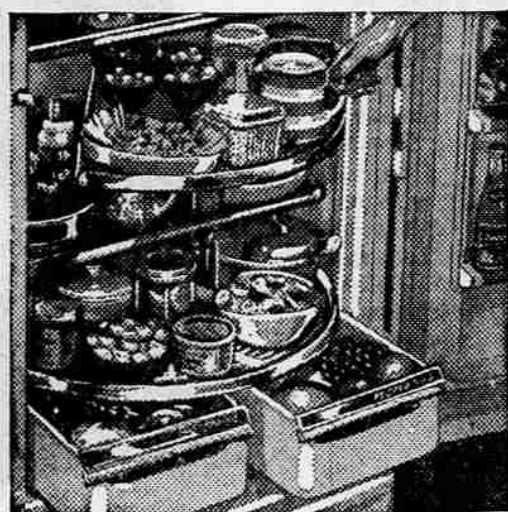

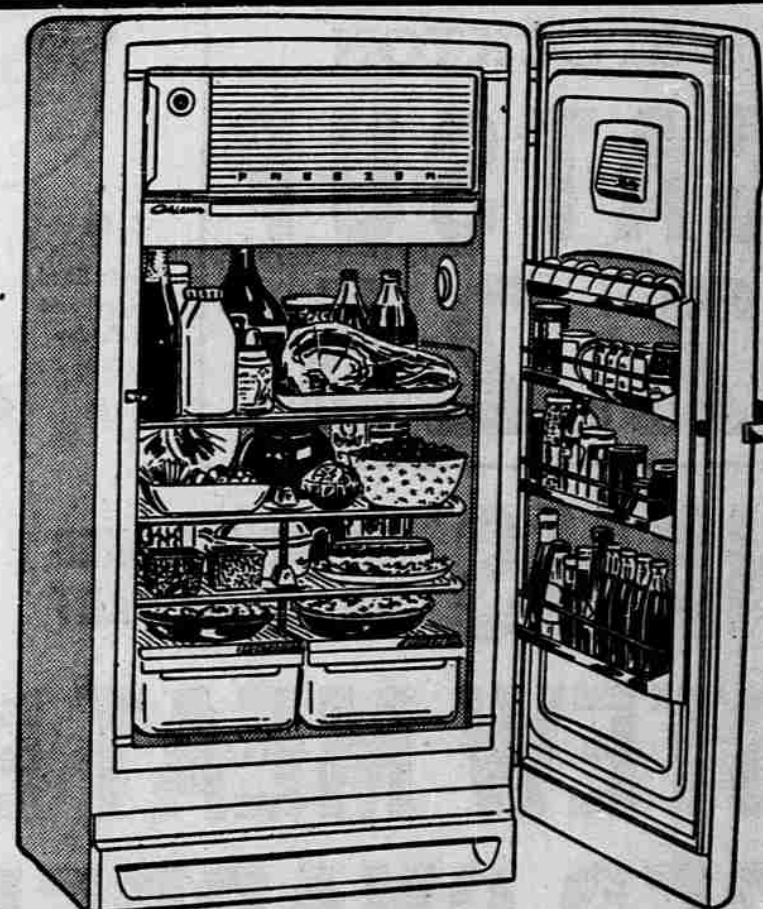
