Israel's Fashions Ignore Lean Look

Tel Aviv — (U.P.) — Women of the world's newest nation have the world's oldest feminine problem—keeping the waistline slim.

So says Lola Behr, Israel's top woman designer. "Our women should follow the American trend," she said in an interview. "Waistlines are just too big."

Miss Behr, herself a slim woman with delicate hands and features, said Israeli women had an excuse for plumpness when national food shortages compelled a heavy diet of starches. Now she said, there's plenty of fruits and vegetables, and it's time women of the new nation tried out the long, lean look decreed by fashion leaders in New York and Paris.

Lola Behr studied fashion in Prague, emigrated to Tel Aviv and opened a shop which has become in a decade one of the most exclusive in Israel. Half her customers are diplomats.

wives and visitors who have found her clothes are bargains compared with New York or Paris prices.

Miss Behr's flat in Tel Aviv serves as both home and salon, where she and four dozen helpers sketch, cut, pin and sew. The customers line up, regardless of rank or wealth, in the modest grey foyer outside.

"There is no such thing as a typical Israeli fashion," said Miss Behr. She goes to Paris twice a year for ideas, and adapts them to her country's tastes and climate.

The torrid summer and short winter of the Middle East forces dress designers to concentrate on cool, simple clothing.

Yemenite embroidery, introduced by immigrants from the toe of Arabia, is the only non-Persian feature of Israel's haute couture.

Applied in rich bands of metallic stitching to scarves or evening accessories, this embroidery caught the Oriental streak in most Israelis and became popular immediately.



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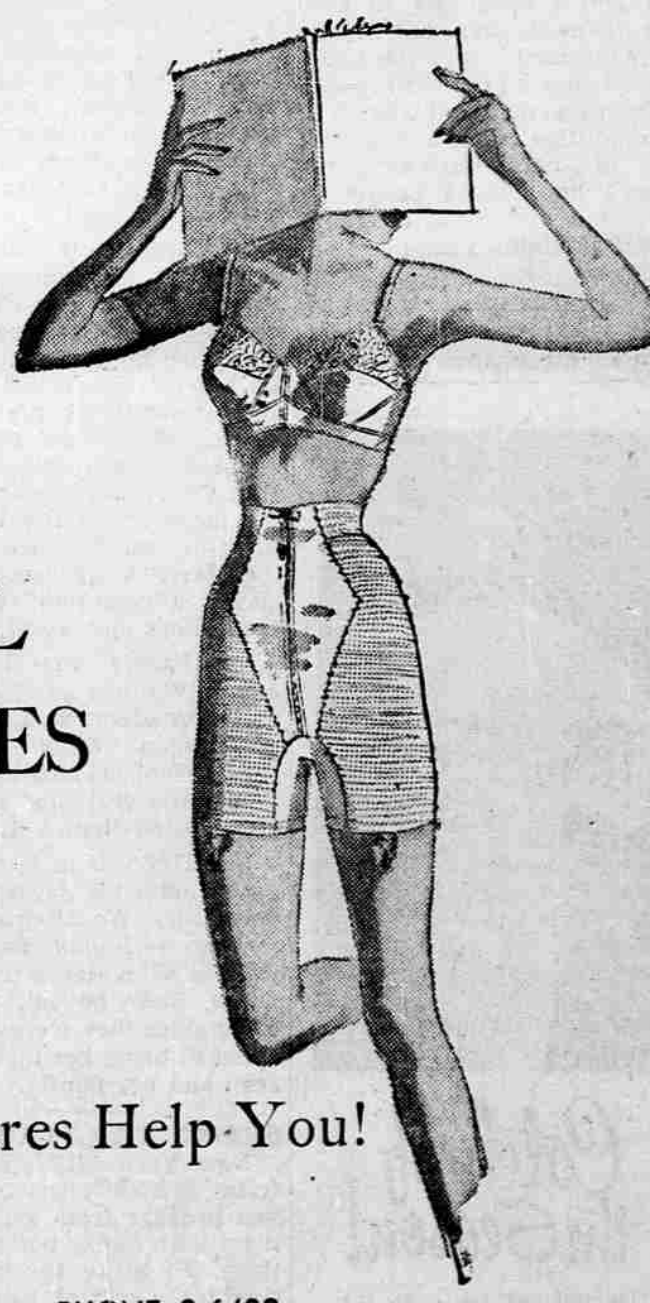
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
