

Bill To Prevent Girls' Names for Hurricanes Eyed

Washington — (U.P.) — Rep. T. James Tumulty (D-N.J.), said today he intends to introduce legislation calling on the weather bureau to abandon its practice of giving feminine names to hurricanes.

He told a reporter that by following the practice, the weather bureau "tends to treat a serious matter frivolously and may even add to the deaths, injuries and destruction" caused by hurricanes by unconsciously prompting the public to regard them frivolously, too.

Would Consult Librarian

Tumulty said his resolution would call the bureau to consult with the librarian of Congress in drawing up a set of names that would convey to the public the seriousness of hurricanes.

He suggested, for example, that hurricanes could be called by some descriptive term, like "Hurricane Awesome," "Hurricane Blustery," "Hurricane Casualty," "Hurricane Death," etc. The weather bureau recently announced that despite some protests, it would continue its practice of naming 1955 hurricanes for women, in alphabetical order.

Not Funny to Victims

"After years of dealing with disasters," Tumulty said, "the bureau may think they are funny. But they aren't funny to the people who have to go through them."

"If the bureau says 'Hurricane Death' is coming up the coast, your first tendency is to take to the storm cellars," he said. "If it says 'Betty' is coming up the coast, you might have the first impulse to look around and see what she looks like."

\$100,000 Needed To Open Timberline

Portland — (U.P.) — A "rock-bottom investment" of \$100,000 would be necessary to re-open Timberline Lodge, according to Lloyd Olson, superintendent of Mt. Hood National Forest.

Olson spoke last night at a meeting sponsored by the Toastmasters' Club here to probe the possibilities of re-opening the ski resort this season.

The forest superintendent said the sum would be needed to purchase food stocks, linen and dishes, repair the ski lift and meet operating expenses.

Olson said the forest service hopes to find an operator willing to construct a chairlift below the lodge, and several ski tows. The forest service would counter, he said, with a 10-year operating contract with renewal options.

The group formed a 25-man committee to investigate means of putting the lodge back into operation as soon as possible.

Foreign Trade Said War Antidote

Chicago — (U.P.) — Increased foreign trade is the most effective antidote for war, Sen. Homer E. Capehart, (R-Ind.), said last night.

Capehart, chairman of the Senate Committee on Banking and currency in the last Congress, said increased trade also has a good effect upon our own economy.

He addressed the 18th annual Chicago World Trade Conference.

If the United States loses the cold war, "it will be because we lost out on international trade," Capehart said.

The U.S. must "recognize the absolute necessity for applying to our foreign trade the same principles of long-term installment which has been the basis of our own domestic economy," he said.

The Senator said "we must give our foreign nations long-term credits on which they can produce and create jobs and trade."

Fulbright Attacks Policy in Europe

Chicago — (U.P.) — Sen. William Fulbright said the worst failure of the Eisenhower administration's foreign policy is in Europe.

He also accused the administration in an interview yesterday of over-emphasizing the Chinese menace.

Fulbright said United States foreign policy has failed to "bring about a closer unification of Europe. Europe is still the power center between the United States and Russia."

"Our attention has been preoccupied by China," the Arkansas Democrat said. "It is an irritating thing which makes our blood boil."

Rudolph Wuiram, fractured pelvis, and Pvt. Kenneth M. Jones, leg injuries. All but McCalmant were from Portland.

Less seriously hurt were Pfc. Harry Arnold, Pfc. Eugene Essex, Pvt. Donald Crabtree, Pvt. Melvin Green, Pvt. David Paul and Pvt. Howard Lyons, all of Portland.

Planes Sought In Chicago Area

Chicago — (U.P.) — Sixty planes today resumed a search for two planes which are reported missing in the Chicago area with five men aboard.

The planes are a Marine Corps jet fighter, believed to have crashed in Lake Michigan on a flight to Tulsa, Okla., and a rented Piper Cub with four Chautauque Field airmen aboard.

The jet fighter took off as bad weather was lifting from the Glenview, Ill., Naval Air Station Monday with San Diego its ultimate destination.

Its pilot was identified today as 1st Lt. Henry G. Stallings, 24, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. G. Stallings of Nacogdoches, Tex.

The Piper Cub left Joliet, Ill., bound for St. Cloud, Minn., Saturday despite fog and freezing drizzle. Its occupants were the pilot, Wayne R. Studer, St. Cloud, and Bernard C. Vandre, St. Cloud, and Cyrus Manfull, Pacoima, Calif. The fourth man was not yet identified.

Almost 70 per cent of National Guardsmen are between 17 and 21 years of age. Less than five per cent are over 35 years old.

Dodele Receives 10-Year Sentence In State Prison

Hillsboro — (U.P.) — Jerry Eugene Dodele, 17-year-old Timber, Ore., youth, was sentenced to 10 years in prison and fined \$1 yesterday for the slaying of Peter Ribbers, 64, a Timber railroad machinist.

Dodele stood poker-faced as Judge Arlie G. Walker pronounced the sentence. He was convicted of manslaughter by a jury which unanimously asked the judge for leniency in the case.

'Charitable' Verdict

Judge Walker, in refusing a plea from defense attorney Irvin Goodman that the youth be remanded to juvenile court, said that the boy had received a "charitable" verdict. He added that the boy would be segregated and fairly and humanely treated in prison.

The judge admitted the task of sentencing a 17-year-old was "doubtfully difficult," but said it must be done to serve notice on other minors that crime does not go unpunished. Dodele will be eligible to ask for parole after serving a third of the sentence.

Dodele was convicted of shooting the elderly machinist with a .22 calibre rifle when the latter came home and surprised the youth in the act of going through his house.

January Highway Death Toll Unchanged

Chicago — (U.P.) — The national highway death toll was unchanged in January from the same period last year, according to the National Safety Council.

The council said that the total for both months was 2,900. The record could have been better if motorists stayed in the cities, it said. Deaths were 7 per cent lower in the cities during January and 7 per cent higher in rural areas.

Among major cities, Los Angeles led with 2.9 deaths per 10,000 registered vehicles. Chicago was second with 3.4 and Detroit third with 3.9.

Portland Meadows May Get Dog Racing

Portland — (U.P.) — An invitation to Murray Kemp, president of the Multnomah Kennel club, to attend a Portland Turf club stockholders meeting next Monday has raised speculation that the horse group may make an offer to rent Portland Meadows for dog races.

The kennel club traditionally holds its meets at Multnomah stadium. But the dog racing group is reported so far to be unable to come to terms with stadium representatives.

State law now forbids dog and horse races to be held in the same plant, but a measure passed by the state House and sent to the Senate yesterday would authorize the double use of race facilities.
