Vote on Harlan Nomination Slowed

Washington —(U.P.)—The Senate Judiciary Committee today deferred action on the nomination of John Marshall Harlan to be a Supreme Court justice but agreed to vote for sure next Wednesday.

Chairman Harley M. Kilgore told newsmen the committee reached the decision unanimously after several committee members said they had not had enough time to study the record.

"We followed the long standing custom of honoring such requests," Chairman Kilgore said. The action came after a 1 1/2 hour discussion of the long delayed nomination. Sen. Thomas C. Hennings Jr. (D-Mo.), who favors confirmation of Harlan, made the deferral motion. He said he did so in order to bring the discussion "to a head."

Harlan is now a judge of the U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in New York.

Education Board Bond Issue OK'd

Salem —(U.P.)—The Senate has passed and sent to the governor a House-approved bill to authorize the State Board of Higher Education to issue more bonds to build housing facilities on Oregon campuses.

Sen. Gene Brown, Grants Pass Republican, said an increase in the bonds now outstanding, \$8,000,000, to just under \$14,000,000 was needed to finance so-called self-liquidating housing facilities at state colleges.

It also would finance a student center at Portland State College.

The proposals include these housing facilities:
University of Oregon: A men's dormitory to house 328 students, \$1,200,000. And a housing facility for 100 married students, \$600,000.
Oregon State College: A dormitory to house 300 men and 300 women, \$1,900,000. A facility for 100 married students, \$600,000. A memorial union, \$1,000,000.

Oregon College of Education at Monmouth: A men's dormitory to house 100 students, \$225,000.

Southern Oregon College: \$225,000 for Memorial Court alterations.
Eastern Oregon College of Education: \$500,000 for a dormitory to house 180 men.
Portland State: \$500,000 for the center.

The accident occurred in the school gymnasium during an activity period when the youth and another student collided, according to the report. He was admitted to the hospital about 12:15 p.m. Wednesday. Complete diagnosis had not been completed today but he is reported to have a chest injury.
