### Husband Puts Golf

If a person wants to succeed in business he must follow the tried-and-true maxim, "Business before pleasure." A young wife writes:

(Q) "My father was a hard-working man, and in spite of the fact that he had only a limited education he rose quickly in his work and now holds a position of responsibility with his company. He has always made enough to give his family everything a family could want. He has laid aside enough for his old age, and he has never lost a job in his life."

"Now my husband is an entirely different sort of man. To him, pleasure always comes before business. He has a college degree, and his father has been able to help him get good jobs. But he never keeps them for long. He is not conscientious about work, he is more often late than on time, he leaves the office early on nice days to play golf, and he often takes long week-end fishing trips with his friends, not returning until Monday night. "I tell him he must put bus-

iness before pleasure, but he claims that takes all the joy out of life. He is beginning to refer to me as a 'slave driver,' but I want some security for my children as well as for myself. Am I wrong in trying to make him see his mistake?"

(A) You certainly are right in trying to show your husband that when he married he assumed obligations which he cannot meet unless he stops putting his own pleasure first.

Even though we are living in prosperous times, when work is plentiful, few employers are willing to pay a man for work he does not do. Your husband's cutting short the work week will not help him hold a job or to advance in any job he is lucky enough to keep.

He must settle down and give up some of the pleasures he enjoyed as a boy. He has to realize, sooner or later, that he cannot support a family by playing golf and fishing with his pals.

Perhaps his father and your father could impress this upon his mind better than you have been able to do. He is beginning to think of you as a nag and will turn a deaf ear to any arguments you give.

## Central Point Bond Issue Sold To Pay For New Building

Central Point—The low bid, of 2½ per cent interest, on the sale of a \$20,000 bond issue by the city of Central Point was accepted by the council this week. Money from the sale will be used to construct a new fire hall and library building.

U. S. National Bank of Portland was the successful bidder. The bid will result in a cost of \$3,208 to the city for the life of the issue. The effective interest rate was 2.467 per cent.

**Two Other Bidders**  
Other bidders were First National Bank of Portland, 2¼ per cent, and Charles M. Trip and June S. Jones, Portland, 3½ per cent.

In other business, the recorder was authorized by the council to contact the firm of John Cunningham and associates, Portland, consulting engineers, for an estimate on a comprehensive survey of the city's current and future water needs. The action was taken to follow up the request by the Elk City Water district for the city to help finance construction of a trunk water main from Medford to Central Point.

**Plan Common Number**  
Jack Creager, local manager of Pacific Telephone, appeared before the council and discussed plans for a common telephone number for the city and rural fire departments to use, with the rural department sounding the city's alarm. The city's alarm. The council moved to meet with telephone and rural district officials to work out an agreement along the lines suggested.

Although no formal application had been made, the city informally expressed a negative vote towards a proposal for reopening the Fireside inn under new management and name. The vote was 4 to 2 against the proposal.

**Baldock Eyes Program Of Interstate Highways**  
Portland—(U.P.)—State Highway Engineer R. H. Baldock said yesterday President Eisenhower's road building program would have to furnish \$2,550,000 of this with the federal government providing the rest, mostly from sale of revenue bonds.

## Withholding Tax Increase Approved

Salem — (U.P.) — The House Taxation Committee yesterday voted in favor of increasing the state withholding tax on income from one per cent to two per cent.

The committee also favored including farm labor under the withholding tax. This, members said, would bring in money from transient farm laborers who now escape state income taxes.

## Mother Faces Trial In Slaying of Child

Chickasha, Okla. — (U.P.) — County Attorney William Smith has announced that Mrs. Flora Giddings will be returned here immediately from Central State Mental Hospital at Norman, Okla., for trial on charges she beat her six-year-old son to death.

The former Dinuba, Calif., woman was declared sane after an examination.

Mrs. Giddings is charged jointly with her common-law husband, Jack Shinault, with causing the death of her son, Jack Giddings, by beating him with a belt buckle and stomping him.

## Salem Bank OKs Merger With U. S. National

Portland—(U.P.)—Stockholders and directors of Salem's Willamette Valley Bank have approved a merger with U. S. National Bank of Portland.

E. C. Sammons, president of U. S. National, said the merger was expected to become effective about the middle of this month.
