Austria, Land of Waltz, Now Jumps To Swing Music

Vienna — (UP) — If you remember what swing music did to America in the 1930's, you'll have some idea of the craze now sweeping Austria. The land of the waltz has started jumping. American popular music, hot and cool, pouring in torrents from Austrian radio, night club bandstands, record shops, juke boxes. It even comes out of the telephones on programs specially taped for diallers. No. U. S. export finds a more receptive Austrian market.

Police and ambulances have been forced into action to handle jump-happy crowds at concerts given by visiting U.S. musicians. Lionel Hampton and his band scorched the gilt cherubim at Vienna's stately Concert House recently and caused a demonstration reminiscent of the pre-war swing demonstrations in Manhattan.

The overflow crowd surged out of control as the concert ended, hurled hats and articles of clothing into the air, jumped on seat cushions and tried to tear down the great stage curtain before police restored order. One youth had to be restrained from beating his own skull against a wall.

At Exposition hall in the city of Linz, several persons were hospitalized after Hampton's music created what an official police report described as a "near-mad and hectic status" among 3,000 Austrians. At Industrial hall in Graz, several rows of seats collapsed as 2,000 customers stomped.

The Viennese gave Woody Herman and his band such an ovation that he was unable to make himself heard on the amplifiers after the last number.

THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN RHEUMATISM AND ARTHRITIS

Chronic rheumatism, wrote Dr. Osler, sixty years ago, is "most common among the poor, particularly washerwomen, day laborers, and those whose occupation exposed them to cold and damp." In his famous textbook *Practice of Medicine*, Osler said nothing more about the cause of the rheumatism, but elsewhere in the book he described "rheumatoid arthritis," otherwise called "arthritis deformans." I have studied Osler's descriptions of these chronic joint disabilities and the descriptions given by numerous modern medical authorities, but I'm afraid I'll never be able to understand how to distinguish plain old \$1.98 rheumatism from \$25 rheumatoid arthritis, if these are anything more than different names for the same joint disability.

But then, suppose one should distinguish plain from fancy joint disability—it would make

a difference of only \$23.02. So far as I can learn there's no noticeable difference in the treatment anyway. Whether you prefer to have rheumatoid arthritis or just rheumatism, treatment is about the same—just "promising." Most victims of chronic joint disability know by now that the old remedies or methods of treatment give only temporary relief if any. And from all I have seen and read of the use of the succession of "miracle" or "wonder" drugs being launched these days for the treatment of arthritis (it's always arthritis, never vulgar rheumatism), the less truck doctors and patients have with them the better.

I praised the drug extravagantly and babbled away like a blankety-blank ninny-hammer only to realize a week later that the patient was crippled as badly as before.
