Measures in Oregon Legislature

Salem—(U.P.)—An expected floor battle over the people's right to vote on tax measures before they go into effect was delayed here when Rep. C. Allen Tom (R-Rufus) moved successfully to send Senate Joint Resolution 4 back to the House Taxation Committee.

The Senate had passed the resolution to remove the ban against putting the emergency clause on revenue raising measures. If passed by both houses and signed by the governor, the measure would still have to be voted on by the people.

Rep. Tom in making his move said he had not been present when the committee took its split vote on the resolution and he wanted more time to study it.

Rep. Loran L. Stewart (R-Cottage Grove), chairman of the Taxation Committee, announced for the second time he was ready to submit the committee's taxation package to the members. It was placed on special order of business for Friday morning.

The package, which would revise Oregon's tax structure in the property tax and assessment field, as recommended by the Tax Interim Committee, was placed for third reading more than a week ago. But it was called back when Stewart's committee was unable to agree on the wording of a definition of true cash value in the first bill of the eight-bill package.

Salem—(U.P.)—The Senate has passed a House-approved measure to wind up the affairs of the Milk Marketing Administration which went out of existence when the voters repealed the milk marketing control act last November.

Sen. John P. Hounsell explained that \$134,000 remains in the general fund credited to the milk marketing account. Disposition of these funds will be made by subsequent legislation.

The Senate also passed a House-approved bill which Sen. Gene Brown (R-Grants Pass) said was designed to make "honest men" of the higher education administrators. Attorney General Robert Y. Thornton recently ruled that acceptance of donations and gifts for specified purposes at the institutions of higher learning was not legal procedure. The measure will make such practice legal.

Salem—(U.P.)—Rep. Henry H. DeArmond (R-Bend) says a compromise bill on creation of a water resources board in Oregon was being worked out.

A hearing on the original measure brought a flock of objections from irrigation district attorneys who said some provisions were unconstitutional.

DeArmond, chairman of a subcommittee of the House Commerce and Utilities Committee, was appointed along with Rep. Al Corbett (D-Portland), Allen Tom (R-Rufus), and Earl Hill (R-Cushman), to work out objections with attorneys and Frank McCulloch of Portland. McCulloch headed the board which drew up the bill.

Salem—(U.P.)—Sen. Mark Hatfield (R-Salem) says a plan which would subdivide Multnomah county into five areas for election of state representatives has been tentatively agreed upon by the Senate State and Federal Affairs Committee.

The plan includes changes from the original subdistricting bill proposed by Sen. Rudie Wilhelm Jr. (R-Portland) but Wilhelm said he would go along with it. The bill eliminates any

subdistricting of Marion and Lane counties as was proposed at first.

Hatfield, chairman of the committee, said the five areas are of about equal population. Final committee action is expected next week.

Salem—(U.P.)—Rep. Alfred Corbett of Portland has blocked passage of a bill that would tend to allow commercial clamming on beaches fronting on state parks. The bill would have repealed what Rep. Emil Stunz of Nyssa said were "two obsolete statutes." Corbett said one of them was a prohibition against commercial clamming on state park beaches. The House supported his motion to send the bill back to committee.

Chest Structure of Still-Born Child Corrects Nature's Failure in Youngster

Chicago—(U.P.)—Little Linda Wetzel played with her doll today.

The mere fact that she was alive seemed close to a miracle. But to outward appearances there was no difference between blonde and blue-eyed Linda and any other little girl.

She ran and laughed with her five-year-old brother, Peter, and went to the store with her mother, Mrs. Werner Wetzel.

When Linda was born Sept. 28, 1952, at Belmont Hospital it was found that nature somehow had failed her.

Most of her chest structure was missing. Her heart lay exposed. Instead of ribs, only stub ends of bones protruded from the spinal column.

She was transferred the same day to Michael Reese Hospital which has extensive facilities for unusual pediatric cases. Dr. Saul A. Mackler took charge of the case.

No Room For Heart Action

"We thought at first that we could place the heart back in the chest cavity and draw the sides of the chest together," Mackler said. "But that wouldn't have given room for proper heart action."

Instead, a desperate move was decided upon. For 11 days, Dr. Mackler waited.

On Oct. 8, a baby was stillborn at the hospital. When Dr. Mackler told the parents about Linda, they readily consented to what he had in mind.

The night, Mackler removed the dead infant's chest structure—breastbone and rib cage—and stored it in a deep freeze over night.

The following day he attached the structure to Linda's body, interlacing the dead baby's ribs with Linda's rib stubs.

"The 'alien' portion covered about one-quarter of the circumference of Linda's body," he said. "Then it was simply a matter of waiting."

Time has proved Mackler's theory.

Operation Successful

The bone and tissue from the dead baby provided a stimulus and a framework around which Linda's body grew, forming the portion that nature forgot.

"Part of the dead baby's tissues were absorbed or sloughed away as Linda's own flesh and bone developed," Mackler said. "But some of the transplanted tissue literally grew to be a portion of her body."

Now, Mackler said, Linda's chest has developed a virtually complete rib cage and sternum, or breastbone.

After examining her about a week ago, Mackler said he was convinced that Linda "will grow up to be a perfectly normal child." Only one portion of her chest failed to develop a bony structure and that is well covered with flesh and skin and "should cause no problem."

Heart Develops Normally

Her heart, he said, also is developing normally.

Linda's mother said she sees no difference between her daughter and other children in the block.

"She runs and plays and never seems to tire," Mrs. Wetzel said. "She walked at 11 months and she's just beginning to talk."

Mackler said that so far as he knows, the operation he performed on Linda was the first of its kind in medical history.

Atomic Explosion On Friday Pondered

Las Vegas, Nev.—(U.P.)—The Atomic Energy Commission scheduled a weather briefing today to determine if the much-delayed "big shot" of the 1955 test series can be touched off Friday morning.

Results of the evaluation meeting were expected shortly after 5 a.m. (EST).

The AEC said it had no immediate plans for an alternate to the big shot, which has been postponed because of unacceptable weather conditions since Feb. 15. Three smaller A-bombs, one an air drop and two tower shots, have been touched off as alternates in the meantime.

The big shot last was scheduled for detonation at 8:30 a.m. (EST) Wednesday. But the AEC called it off 45 minutes before H-hour.

Fire Damages Famed Boston India Wharf

Boston—(U.P.)—A five-alarm fire broke out early today on historic India Wharf on the Boston waterfront.

Fireboats and apparatus from every part of the city converged on the scene to keep the raging flames from spreading to adjacent structures in the congested harbor district.

Early, incomplete reports said there were no deaths or injuries resulting from the fire. Cause of the fire was not determined immediately.

Firemen were hampered by brisk west northwest winds and by near-freezing temperatures.

India Wharf is located off Atlantic Avenue, the thoroughfare which separates the waterfront buildings from the rest of the downtown and North End districts.

City officials appealed for Coast Guard and naval assistance in fighting the blaze.
