Surprise Awaiting Cow Girls' Player On Medford Arrival

A surprise awaited a member of the Texas Cow Girls basketball team when the club arrived in town today for a two-game series with Yellow Cab, district AAU champions.

Leeona Evans, 19-year-old veteran with the Cow Girls team, was to meet an aunt whom she had never seen. Mrs. Foster Seaver, Talent, anxiously awaited arrival of the team for her first meeting with her niece.

Mrs. Foster visited her sister, Miss Evans' mother, at her home in Winthrop, Ark., about a month ago but the niece was on tour with the team. They have corresponded many times, the last about three months ago, Mrs. Foster said, "but letters can't take the place of the meeting which I am anticipating."

Mrs. Foster was expected to occupy a place of honor on the bench when her niece's team plays Yellow Cab tonight at St. Mary's gym here and tomorrow night at Crater high school gym in Central Point. Both games start at 8 o'clock with doors to open an hour earlier.

According to advance publicity, Mrs. Foster will probably have cause to be proud of her niece's demonstration of basketball ability. She is said to be a terrific out-shooter and possessor of a good hook shot from either side. She is said to be a good ball handler who can move with the best of them, has an uncanny knack of scoring when needed and passing off at the right time.

Another of the Cow Girls who will see a lot of action during the two nights is Pat Cramer, fastest member of the team. Miss Cramer is said to be a top guard who likes to fast break, is a good passer and good scorer with the one-hand push shot.

Other members of the Cow Girls who will take to the court against the Cabbies are Florence

Holder, team captain and one of the nation's most outstanding feminine players; her sister, Frances, who is just breaking into the pro ranks out of high school where she was an all-state star; Ellie Banas, a good passer and rebounder; Shirley Dorow, a pass-off artist and hook shot specialist; and Joan Rupp, who possesses an unorthodox out-shot.

Average age of the Cow Girls is 20 years. They play men's rules and ask no quarter from the opposition.

Cherokee-Jeri, western song stylist, will provide halftime entertainment and the Cow Girls will give a trick shooting demonstration, also at halftime.

Prior to the game the girls will have a shooting and ball-handling warmup session.

MacLeod will be one of the sportscasters for the tournament at McArthur court in Eugene.

Hollywood — (U.P.) — Middle-weight king Carl (Bobo) Olson, one of the ring's busiest boxers, rested today after a week of hard workouts for his 10-round non-title fight tomorrow night against state champ Willie Vaughn.

The tattooed Olson, who plans to step into the light-heavy ranks against former title holder Joey Maxim in his next outing, rated an overwhelming 10-1 favorite over Vaughn, and the oddsmakers were offering 3-1 Willie doesn't go the distance.

Weight for the bout, which will not be televised, has been set at 168. Officials at Hollywood Legion Stadium are hoping for a \$30,000 gate.

RUSSIAN TOUR EYED
San Francisco — (U.P.) — Frank Walsh, pioneer promoter of Cow Palace basketball, said today he will leave April 1 for Russia to arrange for a basketball tour by a West Coast college all-star team. Walsh said he will confer with officials of the Soviet Athletic federation about the tour, which will last four to six weeks beginning early in July. The schedule will call for three or four games a week against Russian university and community teams.

Top-Seeded West Illinois Reaches NAIA Semi-Finals

Kansas City, Mo.—(U.P.) — Teams from Illinois, Oklahoma, Texas and Arkansas moved into tonight's semi-finals of the NAIA Basketball tournament, but just one seeded squad managed to remain.

Top-seeded Western Illinois of Macomb, runner-up in last year's tournament, squeezed past Gustavus Adolphus of St. Peter, Minn., 50-49 Thursday night for its second consecutive victory by one point. It had survived the night before by 86-85 over Northeast Missouri.

East Texas Rallies

East Texas State of Commerce overcame an early deficit and eliminated second-seeded Beloit, Wis., 66-57. Southeastern Oklahoma of Durant took its quarter-final triumph over third-seeded Steubenville, O., 96-77, and Arkansas Tech of Russellville coasted downhill after the halftime in a 93-74 win over Alderson-Broadus of Philippi, W. Va.

The Illinois squad plays the Oklahomans tonight at 8 p.m. and the Texans tangled with the boys from Arkansas at 9:30 p.m.

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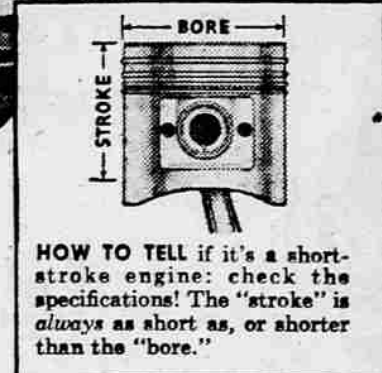
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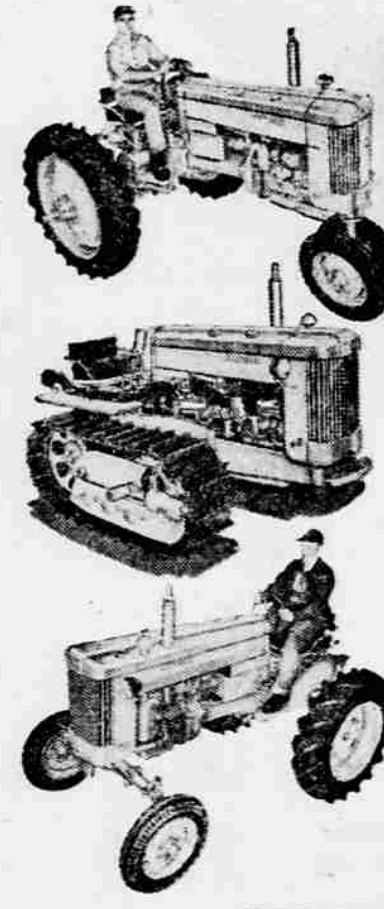


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
