**Coyotes, Badgers Place 2 Each on NW All-Star**

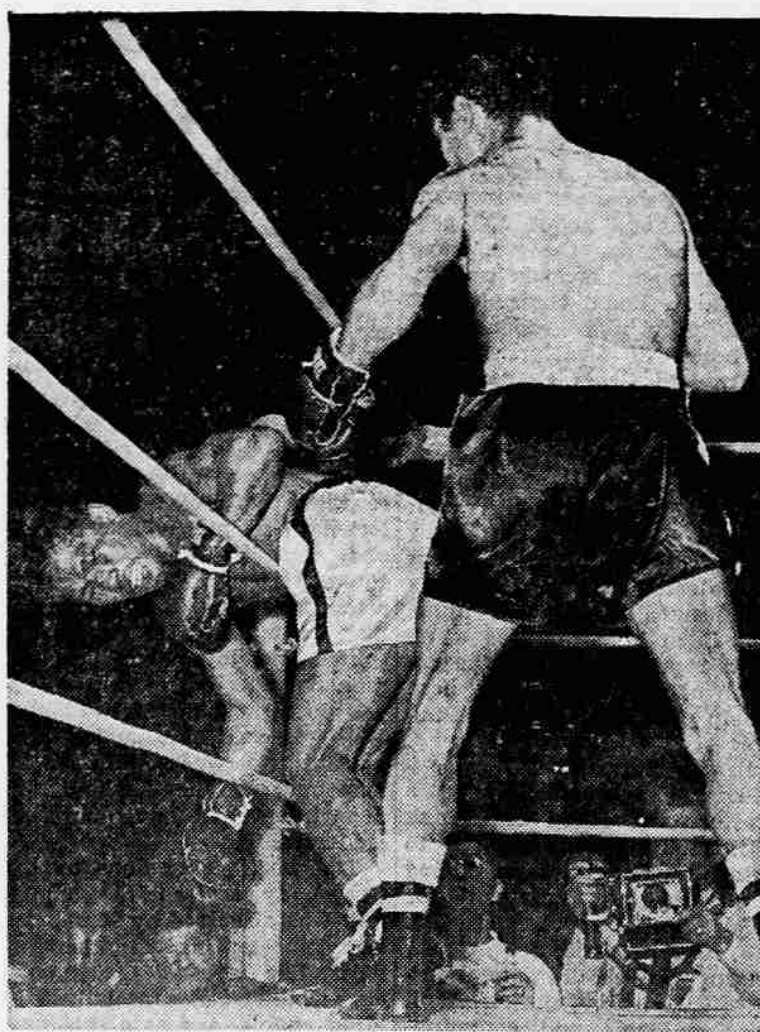

**SE OKLAHOMA, EAST TEXAS IN NAIA CAGE CONCLUDER**

Kansas City, Mo. — (U.P.)—East Texas State and Southeastern Oklahoma, two unheralded teams not figuring in pretournament seedings, came through with Friday victories and reached the Saturday finals of the NAIA basketball tournament here.

Speedy Southeast Oklahoma eliminated top-seeded Western Illinois of McComb, 68 to 61, in the semifinals Friday night, while East Texas State whipped Arkansas Tech of Russellville, 81 to 66, in a cool display of team play.

In reaching the finals, East Texas stopped Portland, Ore., 68 to 55; Southwestern Kansas 94 to 78, and Beloit 66 to 57 before topping Arkansas Tech. Southeastern Oklahoma defeated Middle Tennessee 120 to 67, Nebraska Wesleyan 106 to 69, and Steubenville, Ohio, 96 to 77 before stopping Western Illinois. The 120-point total was a new tournament record.

**No Decision Reached on Trash Fish**

Corvallis — (U.P.)— The question of whether trash fish should be killed out of Oregon's lakes by poisoning or simply controlled by netting and trapping was considered here Friday by the Oregon State Game Commission, but no decision was reached.

The commission is mulling possibilities of cleaning out the perch, catfish, carp and other types of so-called trash fish from several of the state's formerly fine trout fishing lakes.

Commission fisheries experts want to clear out the undesirable fish by poisoning them with rotenone. But this method drew some heated opposition yesterday from a delegation from Coos county where one of the commission's most energetic cleanup programs is planned for the Tenmile lakes, about 12 miles north of North Bend.

All agreed that fishing on the lakes should be improved but many of those appearing before the commission did not want the perch and catfish poisoned. They felt these fish could be controlled by trapping and netting and the restocking of Rainbow trout and silver salmon still could be undertaken with success.

The commission heard all the arguments then Chairman Delbert Gildersleve of Baker announced that a decision would be made at the earliest possible date after all factors had been considered.

Dr. John Rayner, chief of the fisheries division, said the commission's proposed lake rehabilitation program for 1955 would cost \$272,000, with Tenmile lakes getting \$97,000; Devils lake on the north Lincoln county coast, \$10,000; Thompson valley reservoir, \$15,000; Lake of the Woods in southern Oregon Cascades, \$50,000; Drews reservoir and Dog lake, \$30,000 and Miller lake \$70,000.

**Louisville, Niagara Win NIT Openers**

New York — (U.P.)— Niagara flowed hot and heavy Saturday with a torrent of scoring to beat Lafayette, 83-70, while Louisville came from behind to defeat Manhattan, 91-86, in first round national invitation basketball tournament games at Madison Square Garden.

Niagara now plays fourth-seeded Cincinnati and Louisville takes on top-seeded Duquesne in quarterfinal games Monday night.

In an evening doubleheader completing the first round, St. Francis of Loretto, Pa., met Seton Hall and St. Louis university took on Connecticut.

Before an announced crowd of 9,485, Niagara breezed to a first-half lead of 44-31 and then let up a little to win with ease. It was the first time in the tournament for Lafayette, a 13-point underdog, and the Pennsylvania Leopards played like the exit signs in the Garden were put up for them personally. Aside from a tremendous one-man scoring effort by George Young, who made 31 points, Lafayette showed little offense.

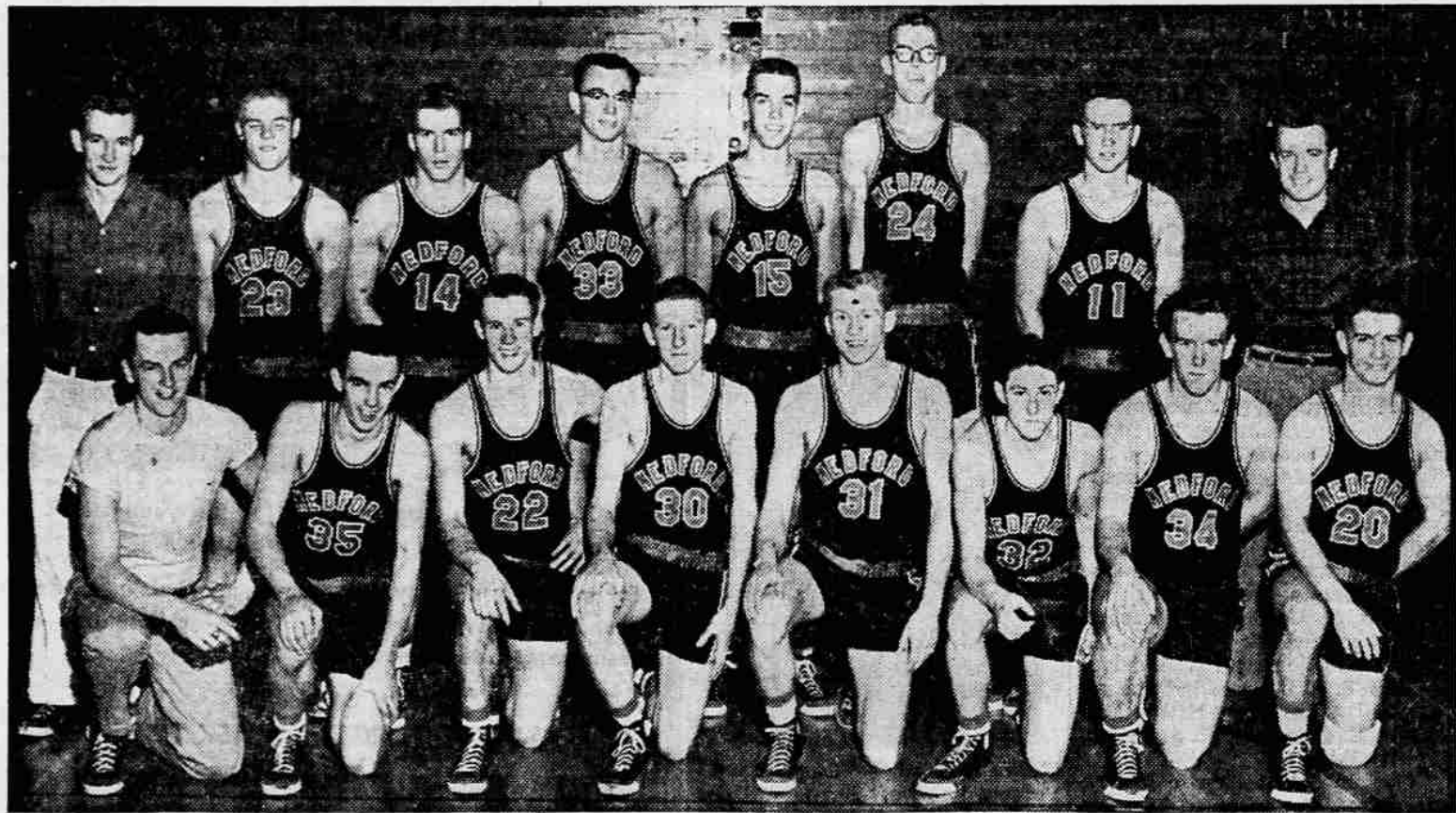
Johnson on Second
