52 Disease Cases Listed Last Week

Fifty-two cases of communicable disease were reported to the county health department last week. Almost half of them — 25 — were cases of chicken pox, with 21 in Medford and 4 in Talent.

Survivor of Crash Asking \$81,000 Damages in Court

Mrs. Zephra Woodley, 51, Dufur, Ore., has brought suit for \$81,000 in Jackson county circuit court for personal damages received Oct. 20, 1954, in a car-log truck accident on Crater Lake highway near Cascade Gorge.

Mrs. Woodley's father-in-law, Clark Eugene Woodley, 85, Grants Pass, was killed outright in the accident, and her husband, Earl H. Woodley, 53, Dufur, died shortly afterward of injuries received in the mishap.

Truck Dumps Load
The two men were fatally injured when a truck dumped its load of logs on the car in which they were riding. Mrs. Woodley, a passenger in the car, was hospitalized with what attendants said were critical internal injuries.

Named as defendants in the suit are William Edward Short, 18 West Third st., driver of the truck, and Steve O. Wilson, Trail, owner of the logging vehicle.

Mrs. Woodley's complaint charges that the accident was caused by carelessness, recklessness, and negligence on the part of the defendants.

She asks \$6,000 special damages for medical expenses incurred from the injuries which she received, and \$75,000 general damages, together with costs and disbursements. The plaintiff is represented by Robert R. Dickey, Medford attorney.

Reviewer Has High Praise For Concert by Brailowsky

It would not be difficult to become extravagant in praise of Alexander Brailowsky, pianist, artist, technician, interpreter, colorist—see what I mean?

He has it all, and he showed it all last night at the Civic Music association concert.

He plays the piano as a pianist—soft and loud, and all the dynamics in between. One is conscious at all times that it is a piano — not an orchestra or a band.

An artist—ne plus ultra. Plays For Music's Sake
As one of the more discerning of the younger musical set remarked, "He plays for the sake of the music and not because he is giving a concert." And this slight, unassuming man gave of his art, through his art, an evening many of us will long remember. Especially was this true in the Bach-Busoni "Chaconne" and the Schumann "Carnaval."

The "Sonata in D Major" by Scarlatti, the "Impromptu" by Faure and "Hungarian Rhapsody No. 12" by Liszt, called for a

technique of the first order. Chopin's "Fantasie - Impromptu," "Ballade in G Minor," "Nocturne in E flat Major," and "Valse in E flat Major," the notes of which we have so often heard, were interpreted for us at last. A real joy to be showered with this purest of piano music.

Would Like More Debussy
We would have welcomed more Debussy. The "Reflections in the Water" were as beautiful as sunlight playing on a prism. The coloring brought forth by Mr. Brailowsky was enchanting.

The "Allegro Barbaro" of Bartok cannot be called music, really. Bartok was more interested in sounds and their juxtaposition than their combining and blending. But the virility of the rhythms were refreshing, and they came from the Hungarian soil.

After this heavy concert, Mr. Brailowsky was most generous with encores by Chopin and Mendelssohn.
