Man's False Impression Causes Marital Trouble

The man who delivered my groceries was a very nice gentleman and never came nearer than four feet to me. However, my husband's mother and sister have told my husband that this man was in love with me and it has made my husband suspicious of me ever since. I now do my marketing, but I know my husband still thinks I'm in love with this man. It has changed his attitude toward me and this is breaking my heart. How can I convince him that there is no truth to what his family has told him?"

(A) If your husband has no more confidence in you than to believe the stories his family tell him, you will have a hard job on your hands changing his attitude. He has become suspicious of you, on no grounds other than what his family said, and he will doubtless continue to be suspicious, if not of this man then of someone else. However, your marriage certainly cannot be happy if your husband is suspicious of every man you meet or if he believes

his family rather than you. You must point out to him that he is being unfair to you and that such an attitude will eventually kill your love for him.

Then try to win the confidence of his mother and sister so they will realize that you are not the sort of person they told your husband you were. It would be logical for you to resent their interference in your affairs and to treat them coldly. Avoid this at all costs. It will just give them an added reason to try to make things difficult for you by poisoning your husband's mind still further.
