Mrs. Herb Crain reported yesterday. She reminded Oregon State college mothers that Friday, March 18, is the last day upon which reservations can be made.

Miss Moor had many years of college experience before becoming dean. She served as assistant head of Waldo hall and as secretary to Dr. Kate W. Jameson, when she was dean of women at OSC. She will address the luncheon guests and be prepared to answer any questions relating to campus life.

A native of Toledo, Ohio, Miss Moor received her bachelor of arts degree from Smith college in 1925 and her master of arts from Stanford University in 1935. She has taken graduate work from Columbia University Teachers college and New York University. She first came to Oregon State as assistant head of Waldo, women's dormitory, in 1926. She served the following year as secretary to Dr. Kate W. Jameson. The following year she went to Scripps college in California as secretary to the president.

From 1929 to 1941 Miss Moor was dean of women and registrar at Eastern Oregon College of Education at La Grande. From La Grande she went as dean of women to Northern Illinois College at DeAlb, where she remained for 13 years before coming back to Oregon State college.

Friends of the family are invited to call between the hours of 1 and 4 o'clock in the afternoon, and 6 and 10 o'clock in the evening.

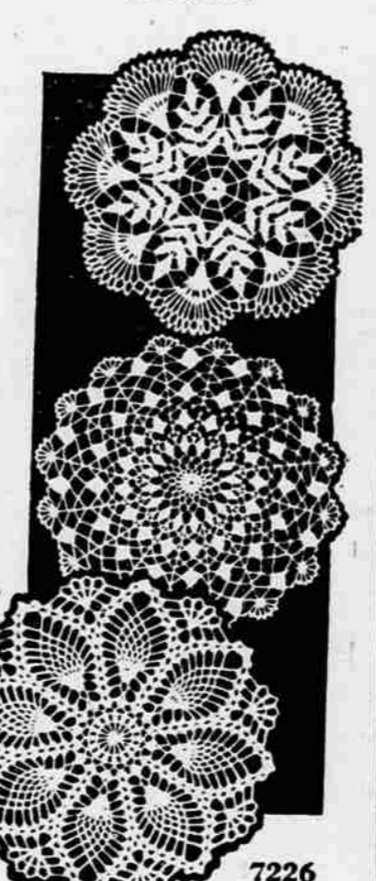

Rice and Cheese Ring Good Dish for Lent

New York—(U.P.)—Rice, one of the most versatile of all foods, add variety to meatless Lenten meals. Try it combined, for instance, with cheese, in this main dish casserole—a ring of rice filled with a cheese sauce.

You will need:
4 cups (1 lb.) shredded American cheese; 1 1/4 cups milk; 3/4 teaspoon salt; 2 tablespoons butter or margarine; 1/2 cup chopped green pepper; 1 cup chopped celery; 1 tablespoon finely minced onion; 1/4 cup chopped pimento; 1/2 cup mushroom pieces; 6 hard-cooked eggs; 1 1/2 quarts hot cooked rice.

Combine cheese, salt and milk in the top of a double boiler. Cook over water, stirring occasionally until well blended. Melt the butter in a skillet, and add the pimento, mushroom and coarsely chopped eggs to the cheese sauce.

Butter a 1 1/2 quart ring-mold type casserole, and pack with rice. Unmold the rice on a large platter and fill the ring with the hot egg sauce. Or, you can vary the recipe, serving the sauce on mounds of hot rice. Yield, 6 servings.
