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Divorcee Tells Tale of Terror

Atlanta, Ga. — (U.P.) — FBI agents here are trying to straighten out a tangled tale of violence starring a beautiful 21-year-old brunette, suspected as an accomplice in a bank holdup.

Divorcee Mary Crawford Fogarty surrendered to the FBI for "protection," telling agents she was an unwitting accomplice in a \$6,900 holdup in Luther-ville, Ga. a week ago. She said two men, identified as William Duncan and Jack Waites, forced her to drive their getaway car at gunpoint. She said she drove through police barricades with a pistol at her throat.

Miss Fogarty told the FBI the men took her to Cincinnati. She fled, headed south, and gave herself up in Atlanta because, she said, she was trying to "keep from being killed."

On her information, Atlanta detective tracked Waites and Duncan to an Atlanta hotel room. Both men had pistols under their pillows when they were nabbed. Police say they recovered about \$1,500.

Fulbright Says GOP Fears Economy Probe

Washington — (U.P.) — Sen. Fulbright says Republicans seem to be afraid that the nation's economy can't stand investigation.

The Arkansas Democrat lashed out at Republicans who have criticized the Senate Banking Committee's investigation of the stock market. Fulbright says that apparently he has more confidence in the strength of America than his Republican critics have. Fulbright, who is chairman of the banking committee, deplored what he called the injection of partisan politics into the investigation.

Meanwhile, the United States Chamber of Commerce says there is nothing in the economy to foreshadow a collapse of the stock market. And yesterday, prices on the market eased quietly upward.

McKay Says Bureau May Eventually Be Self-Sustaining

Washington — (U.P.) — Interior Secretary Douglas McKay said today the Interior Department "May eventually be self-sustaining" with the revenue it receives from power, oil, and gas receipts.

McKay made the statement in an interview as a House Appropriations Subcommittee made public testimony by him and other department officials in support of their request for an appropriation of \$424,461,000 for the fiscal year beginning next July 1.

Natural Resources

"I like to think of the department as the department of natural resources," McKay said, "and we can make it a self-sustaining department if we take care of these resources."

McKay said the department now is within about \$80,000,000 of being self-sustaining. Rep. Michael J. Kirwan (D-O.), chairman of the subcommittee, claims the department now is "in the black" and "has more money coming in than we're putting into this bill."

Kirwan counted estimated net receipts from all funds which total \$428,191,348. This includes trust funds of \$42,422,666 which do not belong to the Interior Department. A large part of the trust funds is money the department is holding for Indians and belongs to them.

Receipts Lowered

Knocking out the trust funds lowers the department's estimated 1956 receipts to \$385,768,662 or \$38,692,894 less than the appropriation request.

McKay said this still is not a fair or "business-like" estimate of receipts because it includes things like duck stamp sales and repayments to the department on projects for which the government already has shelled out the money. McKay said he did not have the figure immediately available, but the difference between the proposed appropriation and being self-sustaining probably was about \$80,000,000.

The largest income items for the Interior Department are the leases, rentals and royalties from oil, gas and minerals, and power revenues.

Premier of France Postpones Showdown On Taxpayer Revolt

Paris — (U.P.) — Premier Edgar Faure postponed today for a week his dangerous showdown with leaders of a taxpayers revolt to avoid the risk of falling from power before France can ratify German rearmament.

Faure backed down from his demand for emergency economic powers to prevent an immediate showdown with anti-tax cru-

sader Pierre Poujade who sent droves of followers to the National Assembly today with instructions to "get Faure."

To Present New Request

Instead the Radical Socialist Premier told the Assembly Steering Committee he would present a new and changed request next Thursday for debate the week after. This will follow French Senate debate on ratification.

It was a clear maneuver to escape what might be a disastrous encounter with the increasingly powerful Poujade.

Faure tried to fight through the jungle of domestic troubles as American publication of the Yalta documents burst into screaming headlines in the French newspapers and threatened possible explosions during the crucial Senate debate on the Paris pacts next week.

Officials Bitter

French officials and newspapers were bitter at the United States for publishing the documents. The Foreign Office maintained an official silence, but asked the American Embassy for a complete copy of the papers in which President Roosevelt, Prime Minister Winston Churchill and Premier Joseph Stalin spoke slightly of France.

Convicted Officer's Punishment Eased

Camp Gordon, Ga. — (U.P.) — An army officer is going to get off with less punishment than he expected, although his conviction for mistreating trainees still stands.

Lt. Charles Anderson had been sentenced to dismissal from the service and to loss of all pay and allowances. But a review board at Camp Gordon, Ga., has decided the sentence was too severe. It has ordered that Anderson remain in the Army, and that he pay fines totaling \$450 over a period of six months.

Witnesses at Anderson's court martial had testified that he ordered one recruit hung up by his ankles, and said he had ordered other men to scrub themselves with sand. The officer had said he merely intended to get his company in shape.

Eisenhower To Stay Overnight at Gettysburg

Washington — (U.P.) — President Eisenhower heads for Gettysburg, Penn., today for an overnight stay at his remodeled farm home.

Mrs. Eisenhower and her mother went to the farm yesterday. This will be the first time the President and the first lady have spent the night together at their farm.

Mr. Eisenhower plans to be back in Washington Saturday night for the annual dinner of the White House Photographers association.

Pastel Cigarettes for Wives of Congressmen

Washington — (U.P.) — Congressmen's wives have come up with a new fad—pastel cigarettes. The colored cigarettes come in at least 10 different shades, and fashionable ladies are expected to match the color of their cigarettes to the color of their dresses. The fad was introduced yesterday at a congressional club meeting. One observer says — "The girls went mad."



Mother Pleads for Child To Be Fed

New York — (U.P.) — A frantic young mother stood before a microphone in a radio studio here and sobbed: "Please, please feed my child."

The woman was 22-year-old Mrs. Josephine Perez. She was appealing to the Negro woman who kidnapped her three-week-old son yesterday.

Mrs. Perez said the woman posed as an agent for the city's department of health. She told Mrs. Perez the child should be taken to a hospital for an examination. When they arrived, she took the baby, telling Mrs. Perez she would bring him to the examining room. She never returned.

San Diego Greet Returning Marines

San Diego — (U.P.) — The Marines have landed—but this time they're coming home.

Some 5500 members of the famous First Marine division have arrived here, nearly five years after their division was sent to Korea. Huge crowds turned out as the five transports steamed into the harbor. Later the Marines marched through a hail of ticker-tape across the city.

The men who have returned have been sent to their home base at Camp Pendleton, Calif. Remaining units of the First Marine division all will have returned by mid-summer.

Safeway Raises Butterfat Content

Portland — (U.P.) — Safeway Stores today announced a two per cent raise in butterfat content of the firm's Lucerne brand half-and-half milk.

It was the first change in butterfat content since voters repealed Oregon's milk control law last November.

Prices remained the same with a pint of half-and-half selling for 23 cents and a quart for 39 cents.
