Gardeners Talk On Care of Lawn At Club Session

Butte Falls—Butte Falls Federated Garden club heard a program on lawns at the last meeting. Three members spoke.

Mrs. Elga Abbott reminded the group that reseeding of thin areas or bare patches is best while frosts still occur, in the early morning before the sun eliminates the "honey-combed" effect, or directly after the lawn has been aerified. Late winter and early spring weed control will be aided by use of certain chemicals, she said, and a balanced fertilizer should be used in the spring.

Mrs. Fred Kincaid continued the information on fertilizers by saying that about this time of year many misguided gardeners give their lawns a mulch of barnyard fertilizer, which is far from being beneficial. It contains very little plant food and is very often full of weed seeds and when applied in lumps can smother out the grass, she said. Research in recent years has demonstrated clearly that early application of plant food is advisable because grass makes its best growth in the early spring.

Mrs. Brittain Ash said it is necessary to give special attention to tree-shaded areas as it is best to allow the grass to grow longer, clipping it with a mower set to cut at two or even three inches. Apply double the rate of water used on the rest of the lawn by watering to a three-inch depth, twice a week, she instructed. It is important too that leaves be raked off in autumn to assist the grass, prune as many tree branches and roots as possible and fertilize each tree once a year. Grass seeded in shaded areas in spring will germinate well giving a good covering for a short time, but it will frequently die after a few months, and late summer seedings in shade have a better chance to survive, she concluded.
