Plans Going Rapidly Ahead To Administer Anti-Polio Vaccine

Editor's Note: Just a year ago 1,800,000 children took part in the biggest scientific experiment in medical history—the mass-testing of the Salk anti-polio vaccine. Next month the report on that experiment will be issued.

New York (U.P.)—The people and organizations principally involved with the Salk vaccine are acting as though there was no question whatever about its ability to prevent children from catching polio.

The National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis has distributed enough vaccine to vaccinate 9,000,000 children this spring, at a cost of \$9,000,000.

The five pharmaceutical companies which made the vaccine, have and are making millions upon millions of additional doses. They're in a race for domestic and world markets which are expected to boom.

And Dr. Jonas E. Salk, the University of Pittsburgh scientist who developed the vaccine, is preparing to give up personal vaccine research in order to enter a broader scientific field. He obviously regards his polio vaccine work as all but completed.

Meat Cutter Strike Seen in Portland

Portland (U.P.)—The Portland Central Labor Council last night authorized its executive board to place Food Employers, Inc., on the unfair list, resulting in predictions that half of the city's meat cutters may be on strike by this week end.

The action would authorize picket lines at the larger chain and independent retail outlets.

Federal mediator Leroy Smith was to meet with employers and union representatives tomorrow in a final effort to avoid a strike. Smith said employers have offered a \$2 a week increase, while rejecting a union demand for a package plan they claim would cost \$4.50. Negotiations started in January.

Amos R. Buck, secretary of the Portland local, said there does not appear to be any sign of agreement. He predicted a strike. Some 800 meatcutters could be involved, he said.

Communists Fire At Quemoy Island

Taipei, Formosa (U.P.)—Chinese Communist artillery fired more than a score of shots at Nationalist held Quemoy island in the Formosa Strait today.

Nationalist reports said the shelling came from Tatent, a small Red-held island in the bay of Amoy. No damage was reported. An official dispatch said the Communists used four guns in their attack.

The new artillery assault against the invasion threatened base of Quemoy came the day before Vice-Adm. Alfred M. Pride, commander of the U.S. Seventh Fleet, was to arrive.

This report is due in about three weeks—it has been promised for "sometime After April 1." The "evaluation," in charge of Thomas Francis Jr. of the University of Michigan, has been extremely thorough—and extremely scientific. The report will be long and complex.

There has been no "leak" of its contents, and there won't be—to the National Foundation, to the pharmaceutical companies, to Dr. Salk, or to anyone else. Dr. Francis has taken elaborate "security" measures.

Then why are all these people and organizations acting the way they are when they haven't even an inkling of what the evaluation report is going to say? The answer is simple—there is little if any doubt of the vaccine's ability to do what it is supposed to do—that is, prevent human beings from coming down with paralytic polio.

Two Big Answers
That it can stimulate the human body into producing enough anti-bodies to take care of any invading polio viruses, was demonstrated thousands of times before there was even a thought of mass-testing.

No one who has been close to the development of the vaccine entertains the slightest doubt that it is effective. They are positive that the Francis evaluation report won't say the vaccine is no good. The big questions which the report is expected to answer are: How effective is the vaccine? For how long is it effective?

It might be that for reasons now unknown the vaccine does not stimulate "some human bodies into producing enough polio anti-bodies to ward off invasions of the viruses. Dr. Salk's experiments, first in animals, and then in more than 7,000 human beings, makes that a most unlikely possibility.

The big question, "how long?" is the critical one. But if the vaccine can make human beings immune to all three types of polio viruses for only a few months, it will spell the end of polio in all such countries as the United States where public health and other medical services are highly organized. That is the minimum expectation of the people who have been closest to the development of the vaccine.
