A doctor has come up with a cure, but France has yet to decide whether to take it.

The doctor is Paul Reynaud, French Premier during the dark days of 1940. His cure is a constitutional change that might lead to a more stable government in this country which has had a new Premier on the average of every six months since World War II.

Hesitation, brought about by repeated government crises, is the most painful symptom of France's illness. France has been unable to make up her mind for four years about German rearmament. Hesitation cost the French a victory in Indochina.

Reynaud says that because of hesitation there was no French minister of equal rank to sit down with Secretary of State John Foster Dulles and British Foreign Secretary Sir Anthony Eden at the recent SEATO conference in Bangkok.

And Prime Minister Sir Winston Churchill has warned that if France does not occupy her "seat" in international affairs some other nation will—perhaps Germany.

The medicine which Reynaud proposes to brighten the complexion of France is a constitutional change calling for the dissolution of Parliament any time a government is overthrown.

Why would this help? A deputy will think twice about voting down a government if it means losing his own job as well, Reynaud points out.

As it is now, members of Parliament who are not ministers in the government have nothing to lose when they vote out a government. There is always a chance they may become ministers in the next government.

Under Reynaud's reform the deputies would lose their own seats at the same time they overthrew the government. The people would settle the dispute at a new election.

Quarrels between Parliament and the government would come to a head this way: If the assembly votes against the government on a question of confidence, the Premier could ask for another vote within three days.

Around Hollywood

Hollywood — (U.P.) — Today's space is turned over to a small army of teen-agers around the country who shout that rhythm and blues songs aren't corrupting them but are "danceable."

Last week disc jockey Peter Potter announced he was against the new r-and-b craze that swept the record business because many of the tunes have "filthy lyrics" and "are as bad for kids as dope."

Then, Pete, the star of CBS-TV's "Juke Box Jury," has hardly been able to get into his office for the avalanche of objecting letters from platter-spinning students from Boston to Texas.

In most of the letters I waded through, the kids insisted they like r-and-b songs because of the "dance beat," not the eyebrow-hoisting words.

Suggestive Songs
Fourteen-year-old Miss Roxy Wood, of North Hollywood, Calif., wrote, "We realize there are many suggestive songs, but we bought them for the beat."

"If you can say all teen-agers crave dirty records, you're very wrong, Mr. Potter, because if we were so interested in hearing dirty remarks we could just go to any dive and open our ears. Why should we go out and spend one dollar for it?"

"In the motion picture busi-

ness there are lurid movies. Does anybody call the whole movie business dirty? Why doesn't anybody notice the good r-and-b records? The record 'You'll Never Walk Alone' has beautiful words. This is a song which I cherish in my heart always. The slow records really have a feeling that the Negroes feel what they sing..."

A Sherman, Tex., group of teenagers announced that r-and-b tunes are "not dirty." A student at the Boston Latin School wrote that if Potter thought so, "evil to him who evil thinks."

Like the Charleston
"We have a fan club of 1000 r-and-b fans at Latin School, and they are intelligent," the student wrote. "The lyrics have nothing to do with the r-and-b craze. It's the solid beat. If you were ever young, you remember the Charleston, the Black Bottom. They correspond to r-and-b."

Other young music fans wrote they like r-and-b because "there's nothing else to dance to. Most of the big dance bands have folded."

"They have a point there," deejay Potter admits. "If that's the type of music they want to dance to, the record companies should release the tunes and cut out the questionable lyrics."

Several adults, however, wrote Potter to thank him for his refusal to play most r-and-b tunes on his programs. One lady said, "Sex is all that's on the minds of this generation."

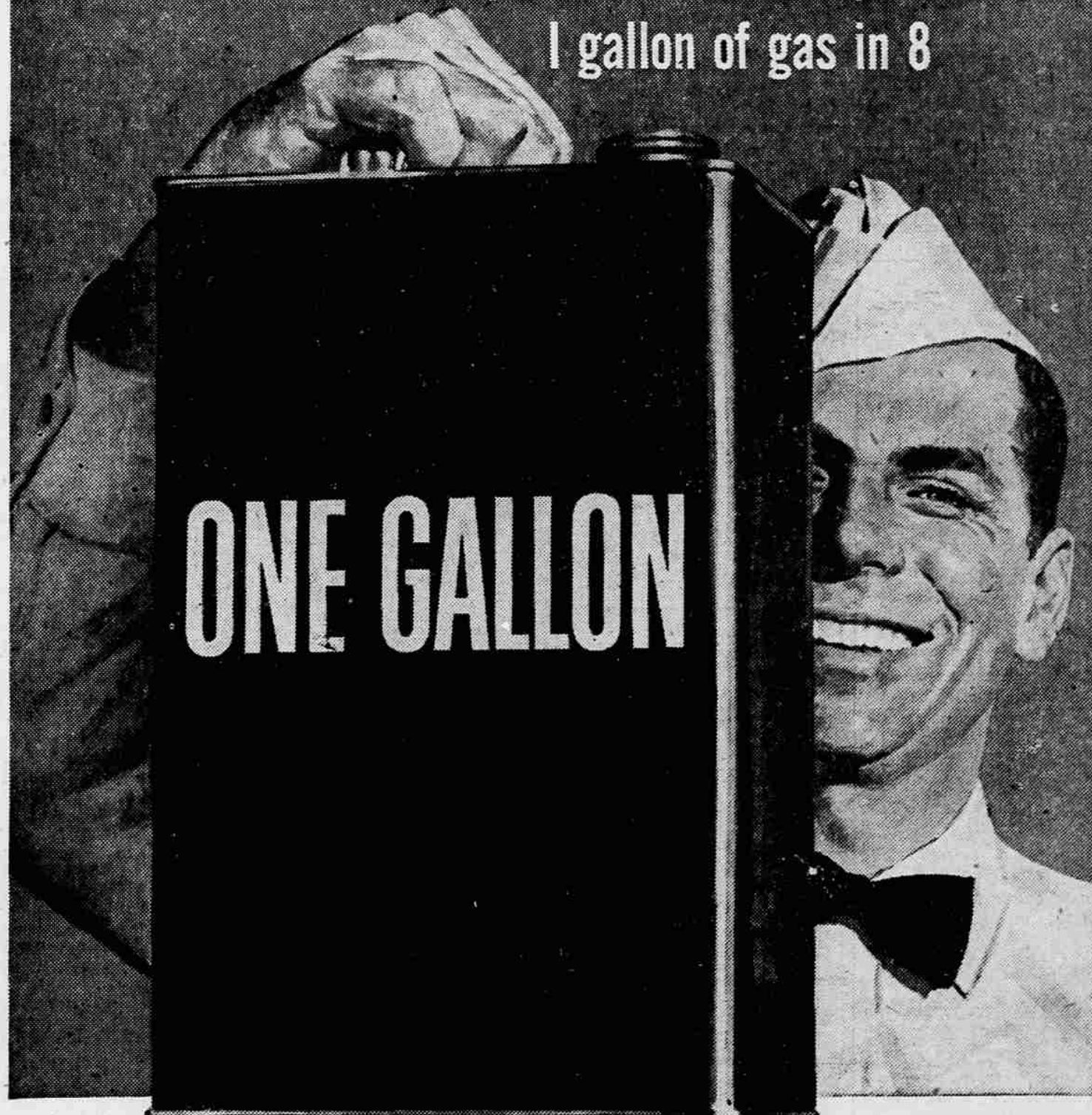
