Washington (U.P.)—Back stairs at the White House: Current gag around town: President Eisenhower and Abraham Lincoln have at least one thing in common — a Gettysburg address.

Child Safety Expert Sets Conference Talk

Dr. Harry F. Dietrich, prominent Beverly Hills, Calif., pediatrician and child safety expert, will be one of the major speakers at the Southern Oregon Child Safety conference to be held Friday on the campus of Southern Oregon college.

Dr. Dietrich is senior attending physician at the Los Angeles Children's hospital and has appeared at the National Safety Council congress in Chicago. He is well known to many Oregonians for his presentation to the last Governor's State Conference on Children and Youth in Salem.

Dr. Dietrich will speak during the day on "Teaching Children Fire Prevention," and at an evening session on "Accidents—Greatest Child Health Hazard."

Worst Killer
Accidents kill more than 12,000 children in the United States each year—more deaths than the next six most common causes of death added together. Dr. Dietrich has stated that safety must be learned step by step, and he will give to parents and others working with children a constructive formulation whereby they can provide children with armor against crippling accidents.

Registration for the conference is at 9 a.m. Friday. Dinner at Susanne Homes hall on the campus is scheduled for 6 p.m. All other interested persons are invited, according to the conference committee, and those unable to attend the all-day sessions may come for dinner and Dr. Dietrich's talk.

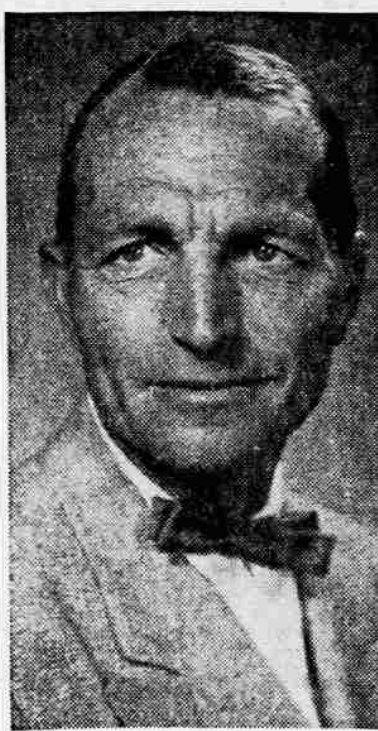
