New York — (U.P.) — Arturo Toscanini celebrated his 88th birthday today without fuss and fanfare because he doesn't want any anniversary fireworks until 1957.

He observed the event at Villa Pauline in suburban Riverdale. The house, like Ponce de Leon's Fountain of Youth, has been regarded by many as a symbol of the maestro's health and vitality.

As Toscanini began his 89th year, he appeared as healthy as in 1947, when he warned his orchestra he did not want any ceremony on his birthday anniversary until he was 90.
