

Soviet Distortions Forcing West To Release Data on Conference

London — (U.P.)—The British Foreign Office said today the Western powers will release the secret proceedings of the London Disarmament Conference because of persistent Soviet "leakages and distortions."

A Foreign Office spokesman said the Western representatives protested to Soviet delegate

Jacob Malik at yesterday's meeting against the latest violations of the conference secrecy rules by the Soviet press and radio.

Breach Brings Protest

The spokesman said the Western delegates protested "some time ago" in the five nations United Nations Rearmament Subcommittee meeting against

an earlier Russian breach of secrecy.

"In due course the proceedings of the Disarmament Nations Subcommittee will be told," the spokesman said.

The spokesman said a statement by Soviet delegate Andrei Gromyko last night on the disarmament proceedings "is a gross breach of the rule of secrecy." Gromyko pulled out of the conference yesterday for a surprise visit to Stockholm.

Broadcasts Interview

Moscow Radio broadcast his statement in the form of an interview with the Soviet Tass News Agency.

"If the Soviet delegation insists on distorted versions it shows clearly that all they are out for is propaganda," the spokesman said in the sharpest rebuke of the conference to Russia.

"We have nothing to hide and we have maintained secrecy of our own proposals as well as those of the other side," he said.

Consultations among the Western delegations will determine the timing as well as the methods of releasing details of the conference which opened here on Feb. 25.

To Correct Versions

The spokesman said the object of this proposed release is to "correct distorted versions in Pravda and in Gromyko's statement."

Pravda is the official Communist newspaper in Moscow. Yesterday morning it reported details of Russia's new proposal and said the Western allies were trying to frustrate the five-nation talks among Britain, the United States, Canada, France and Russia.

Sources close to the Western delegations said the Pravda report was a flagrant violation of secrecy. But hardly had they made the statement when Tass released an "interview" granted by Gromyko before he left London.

Comment Declined

The Foreign Office declined to comment on Gromyko's interview or on whether the new Soviet proposal represented an advance over Russia's earlier approaches to the disarmament program.

The spokesman said that "after the first day of the London conference there was a leakage of the proceedings" and that protests followed. He said propa-
