

# YOST, CUDD LEAD FIELD INTO FINAL HALF OF OPEN

## Columbia Teammates Net 143, 144 During First Two Days' Play

A pair of Walker Cup teammates, Dick Yost and Defending Champion Bruce Cudd, stablemates of Columbia-Edgewater club, Portland, led the way into the final half of the Oregon Open Golf tournament today after the first half of the tangle at Rogue Valley Country club's tricky course lived up to prognostication. They were rated favorites.

Yost, former northwest amateur champ, added a one over par 73 Saturday to his Friday 70 for a 143 count to push into front spot in the competition which matches some of the top pros and amateurs in five western states.

Right behind was Cudd, who also carded a 73 Saturday matching that with an opening day 71 for a 144 total.

**Sixty-Six Qualify**  
Final 36 holes of the 72 hole tussle are being contested today over the Medford links. Sixty-six players who carded 162 or better qualified to play today as about two-thirds of the field was eliminated after yesterday's action.

The two Columbians shot ahead of Warren Dailey, young Stanford university player, who took the Friday lead. Dailey stroked a 77 yesterday and was still much in contention, ranking fifth with 146. Ahead of Dailey were Eddie Simmons, Medford, and Eddie Joseph, Crescent city, Calif. Joseph remained the front running professional in the competition by adding a 73 to his Friday 72. Simmons was one of few to hit par or better yesterday shooting a course standard 72.

Two pros, George Bazzini, Diablo, Calif., and Eddie Hogan, Riverside, Portland, were next in line with 148's. Hogan put a 72 with a 76 and Bazzini was one of two who broke the standard, adding a 71 to a 77. Bob Duden, Portland professional, placed his 71 with a 79 for 150. Harvey Takson, Eugene, and Joe Greer, Yakima, both professionals, ran ahead of Duden with 149's.

### Fleskes Wins Senior

Senior low gross winner was Ted Fleskes, Oswego, with 162.

Yost was two over par for his nine at yesterday but blazed back through the return nine with a one-under. He picked his two birdies on the last two holes with a two on 17 and four on 18.

Both Cudd and Joseph did well on the fairways, "hitting" 16 greens in the strokes in the par allotted in the par for the holes. But Cudd mentioned putting trouble. He three-putted three greens. The defending champion was even par for the front nine.

Simmons had two pars and two bogies on the front lap and one of each on the second. Dailey was three over standard on the fore nine and two over on the second.

Field for the final 36 holes of the tournament today was trimmed to the low 60 pros and amateurs at the end of the Friday and Saturday rounds. The linkmen, among them some of the best in the west, played under ideal weather conditions both Friday and Saturday and the weatherman indicated that conditions would be near ideal again today.

**Tournament Committee**  
headed by Russ Heysell, general chairman for the host club, have emphasized that residents of southern Oregon are welcome and wanted to help with the success of the event by joining the galleries of spectators. There is no charge for admission to the course.

### Chisholm, Harmon Here

Two interesting sports personalities have added to the luster of the Open. They are D. Scott Chisholm, golf announcer and Tom Harmon, sports director for Columbia Pacific radio network, branch of the Columbia Broadcasting system in 11 western states.

Scotty, dressed in the kilts of his native Scotland, has been a colorful and popular figure around the club with his booming voice and unique way of presenting to the galleries scores and information on the players.

Harmon, former all-American football back at the University of Michigan, will be master of ceremonies tonight at the awards dinner. He originated his daily Texaco Sports Finale from the studios of station KYJC last night and was to originate his sports segment of Sunday Desk this evening through KYJC facilities.

Three youthful amateurs, including the defending champ and the leading pre-tourney favorites, came through with under par medals and one professional was even par Friday after a

field of 181, largest in the history of the event, finished play in the opening 18-hole round of the Oregon Open Golf tournament at Medford's Rogue Valley Country club.

Warren Dailey, 21-year-old Stanford university senior, No. 2 player for his college, headed the field with a three-under-course standard 69. Dick Yost, 25, former northwest amateur champ, playing out of Columbia-Edgewater club, Portland, was on Dailey's heels with a 70.

Defending champion Bruce Cudd, 21, also of Columbia and co-favorite along with Yost, carded a 71 on the initial lap of the 72-hole tourney.

### Joseph Low Pro

Eddie Joseph, Crescent City, Calif., paced the professionals with his par-on-the-nose 72. He was trailed by a professional, Ken Townes, Tacoma, Wash., 1949 national public links champ and an amateur, Eddie Simmons, Medford, who won the 1954 Oregon Golf association match play today. They had 73's.

Four pros and one amateur had 74's. They were Harvey Hixson of Harold West, both Laurelwood, Eugene; Mel Babica, Eureka, Calif.; and Al Feldman, Tacoma, Wash., pros, and Lou Stafford, Eastmoreland, Portland, amateur. Feldman was low pro in the pro-amateur on Thursday.

In the 75 bracket were five amateurs, George Harrington, Medford; Robert Stafford, Colwood, Portland; Gary Loustoul, Redding, Calif.; Marshall Smith, Roseburg, and Dick Bailey, Redding. Pros tied with them were Dave Killen, Eastmoreland; Bill Johnston, Provo, Utah Open champ, and Larry Lamberger, Portland.

Chuck Van Linge, Stanford university player who had a 69 in the pro-am, was among those who carded 76's on Friday, as were his college teammates, Phil Getchell, Medford, and Fred Brown. John Brodie, fifth member of the Stanford delegation, which is not playing as a school team, had an 80 Friday. Eddie Hogan, Riverside, Portland, and Eddie Oldfield, Roseburg pro, formerly of Medford, were among the 76's. Ralph Dichter, Astoria, runner-up to Cudd, last year, had a 78.

### Scores High

Scores were generally high in the first round. Most participants hit the ball well on their drives and approaches but had trouble on the greens. Not so for Dailey. The young linkman from Manitowish, Wis., found the greens to his liking and needed just 27 putts in making the rounds. He had four birds and just one bogey in carding 35 on the front nine and 34 on the back. Dailey sank an "impossible" wedge shot for a birdie three on No. 3 green, his ball going over a hump and into the hole.

Yost had birdie twos on 15 and 17, with a three-foot four wood shot and 30-foot putt, and drove onto the green to gain a bird on 18. Cudd was even par through the front nine and one under with two birds and a bogey coming back. Joseph had five birdies and five bogies.

Marvin Clark, Grants Pass, with a 79, was the leading senior competitor in the initial round. Ted Fleskes, Oswego, and Ward Cummings, Roseburg, scored 81's.

## Irish Horse Wins Grand National Steeplechase

Liverpool, England — (U.P.) — Quare Times, an Irish jumper, gave his country its third straight victory in the Grand National steeplechase Saturday with a 12-length victory over a rain-drenched, soggy Aintree course which remained as tough as ever despite attempts to soften it.

Tuned to the peak of physical perfection for the gruelling four-mile, 856-yard race by Trainer Vincent O'Brien, Quare Times brushed off a belated challenge by Tudor Line, the best English horse, to win as he pleased. That stirring victory under the worst possible weather conditions gave Irishman O'Brien his third straight victory in the steeplechase classic.

### 30 Start, 11 Finish

Thirty horses started but only 11 finished this exacting test, which claimed the lives of four horses a year ago. Quare Times was the only finisher with any run left, however. Tudor Line, owned by Mrs. E. Truelove, was exhausted at the finish. Four lengths behind him was D. Coughlan's Carey's Cottage, another Irish horse. Gigolo, owned by Mrs. Milne of Scotland was fourth.

After last year's death and destruction, the height of famed Becher's Brook jump was reduced and the ground on the landing side raised to reduce casualties. Saturday the stewards of the meeting eliminated the water jump from the race.

## Coloradoans, Oiler Five In AAU Final

Denver — (U.P.) — Underrated, unseeded Luckett-Nix of Boulder, Colo., and the Phillips Oilers squeaked into the finals of the National AAU Basketball tournament over stiff opposition in do-or-die Friday night semi-finals.

The Luckett-Nix cagers, made up of Colorado university seniors fresh back from the NCAA tournament at Kansas City, defeated the U. S. Marine champions from Quantico, Va., 63-56, in an overtime.

Phillips, second-seeded in this year's tournament, had to rely on Walsh's 40-foot set shot at the final gun to eke out a 53-51 victory over a battling San Francisco Olympic club.
