

California Chesapeake Winner In AKC Retriever Trial Stake

Beewacker's Chester, chesapeake male, owned by E. J. Rowe, Daly City, Calif., and handled by Snuffy Beliveau, captured the day-long qualifying stake yesterday, second day of the Rogue Valley Retriever club's fourth annual licensed trial.

The trial was scheduled to conclude with the open all-age stake today. Headquarters for the trial is the Hoover lakes area at the end of Sticky lane north of Medford. Today's stake is scheduled to start at 7 a.m. and there are 31 listed entries.

Beewacker's Chester topped a field of 41 yesterday in a three series contest. Manzanal Curlew, Labrador male, owned and handled by J. M. Rothchild, Oswego, took second.

Third was Barry of Laurende, golden male, owned by Al Benton, Seattle and handled by Paul Shoemaker. Del Tone Char, Labrador male, owned by Mrs. William P. Roth, and handled by Beliveau, was fourth.

Five CM's Given

Five dogs won certificates of merit. They were Wild Bill Hickok, Labrador male, owned by Herbert J. Fleishacker Jr., San Francisco, and handled by Roy Gonia; Rex of Kingsdale, golden male, owned and handled by Katherine Staunton, Tulare, Calif.; Victor of Little Pierrre, Labrador male, owned and handled by J. J. Heneghan, Seattle; Bellota's Hugo, Labrador male, owned and handled by Richard Reeve, Tucson, Ariz.; and Look Judge Look, Labrador male, owned by R. E. Theinhardt, Renton, Wash., and handled by Paul Shoemaker.

All qualifying series were in the vicinity of the military bridge. First was two shot pigeons, one close and the other across the ravine. Second was one duck thrown and shot far out and second was two ducks thrown in decoys with one shot. Third was a two pigeon retrieve, one tossed and shot and the other a blind retrieve.

Judges were Lufe Utter and Irving Warren.

Jibodad Dandy, Bremerton, Wash., entry, and Jig's Moonbeam, entered from Cutten, Calif., garnered top honors in

Moonbeam, Labrador female, called Dina by her owner and handler, Edward F. Pavlich, won the derby stake for dogs under two years of age. The derby rivalry began Saturday and concluded with one series Saturday morning.

Kip, Coaly Place

Two local entries placed in the stakes, Kip of Geneva, Labrador male owned and handled by Kenneth G. Denman, Medford, was fourth in the amateur. It was reportedly the first placing in an amateur by a Medford dog. Rocky Point Coaly, Labrador male owned and handled by Ira G. Parish, Medford, was second in the derby.

Hal's Spi-Wise Zeke, Labrador male, owned and handled by Hal Shidler, Klamath Falls, was second in the amateur and Willows of Trab, Labrador male, owned by Wellington Henderson, San Francisco, and handled by Herbert Fleishacker Jr., San Francisco, was third.

Certificates of merit went to Beaver Creek Bandit, Labrador male, owned and handled by Fleishacker; Oak Creek's Fremont, golden male, owned and handled by C. R. Tobin, San Francisco, and Sasmakra Sassy, chesapeake female, owned and handled by Mrs. Walter H. Heller, San Rafael, Calif.

Sky-Hy-Ty, golden male, owned and handled by Harold Trunnell, Eugene, was third in the derby and Jibodad Pilot, Labrador male, owned and handled by Wayne Faddis, Bend, was fourth.

Judges Alfred Schmidt and Irving Warren awarded five cer-

tificates of merit. They went to Dairy Hill's Tart, Labrador female, owned by A. A. Jones, San Mateo, Calif., and handled by M. Beliveau; Craigmars Lucky Formula, golden male, owned by Dr. O. C. Olson, Spokane, Wash., and handled by Cliff Brassfield; Jibodad Gypsy Vagabond, Labrador male, owned and handled by Bryan; Good Knight of Knight's Ferry, Labrador male, owned by Hunt Conrad, San Francisco, and handled by Ursula Patton; and Meg of Hillcrest, Labrador female, owned by William M. McAllister, Medford, and handled by Carl B. Newell.

In each stake the dogs were put through four tests or series. In the amateur, held entirely in the Military bridge area, the first was a triple on ducks in a small lake with heavy cover. One bird was 100 yards away, one 60 and the other close in open water. It was a marking and memory test.

Pheasant, Ducks Used

Second was a double on pheasants in a draw. Third was a water blind test with a duck 130 yards away. Dogs were sent off a bank into Little Butte creek and kept on a straight line to the bird on a bar. Pigeons were used in the fourth with a dead pheasant 100 yards out and a shot pheasant, or diversion bird 60 yards to the side of the line.

First series in the derby was a single shot pigeon upwind 125 yards away. Next was a spread double with one bird 100 yards out and the other 50. Third was a retrieve of two shackled ducks in and at the edge of a pot hole. Decoys were used. Final test was at large Hoover lake. Two shackled ducks were placed in short tules. For the second the dogs had to go through water, over land and into water. Decoys again were used.

Schmidt and Lufe Utter were judges of the amateur.

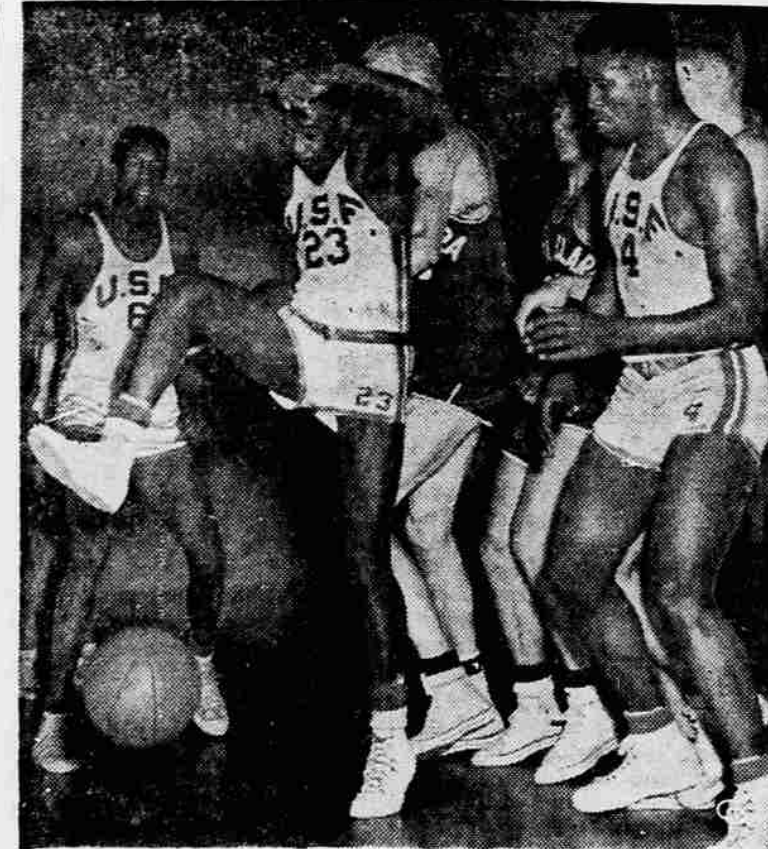

Pan-American Games Close Saturday With 100,000 Spectators

Mexico City — (U.P.) — The second Pan-American games, biggest sports spectacle in the Western hemisphere, drew to an impressive close Saturday in University stadium before an estimated 100,000 persons.

Horses and riders held the center of the stage for much of the afternoon during the final ceremonies, as the equestrian competition was completed.

These games, first inaugurated in 1951, have become the biggest single sports item to practically every one of the Latin-American countries — probably more important than the Olympic games, because there is a better chance for victory here.

Nearly All Enter

Nearly all of the 21 nations had one or more athletes turn in an outstanding performance. Although United States blanketed the scoring — according to the U.S. way of thinking — the games were very close in some other systems.

One Mexico City newspaper (El Universal) worked out a point scoring system of 25 points for first place, 23 for second, etc. It came up with a score of 503 points for United States, 480 for Mexico and 392 for third-place Argentina. That proved that the competition was very close.

On the other hand, using the conventional scoring of 10 points for first, 5 for second, and so on down to 1 for sixth, the United Press compilation showed 1,161 1/2 for U.S., 514 1/2 for Argentina and 396 for Mexico.

No Point Standing

Actually, there is not supposed to be any official point standing.

The games are based on individual performances — and these were the high-lights:

Swimming — Beth Whittall, the Canadian girl student from Purdue University, who within the space of 90 minutes won two races and helped a relay team finish second in another.

Track and field — Rod Richard, former UCLA student now in the service, who won the 100 and 200 meter races and anchored a winning relay quartet for U.S.; Oswaldo Suarez of Argentina, who won both the 5000 and 10,000 meter races; and the two world's records, set by Lou Jones of New Rochelle, N.Y., in the 400-meters and by Adhemar Ferreira Da Silva of Brazil in the hop-step-and-jump.

Basketball — Lurline Melahouse who led the U.S. girls' team to an undefeated record.

Mexicans Tops in Tennis

Tennis — The Mexican team

which won four out of the five championships for men and women.

Outstanding single team — The U.S. weightlifting crew that won seven out of eight titles and set games and world records in nearly every one.

Biggest surprise — The victory of Juan Miranda of Argentina over Wes Santee, the top U.S. miler, in the 1,500-meter race.

Boxing — The Kayo punch landed by Orville Pitts of Milwaukee. It cooled his Chilean foe for 10 minutes.

Baseball — The surprising Dominican Republic's team triumph, sparked by the hitting of the Luis Domingo Vargas, who batted at a .471 clip.

Strold, Berthod Take Harriman

Sun Valley, Ida. — (U.P.) — Unofficial results Saturday showed Martin Strold of Austria and Madeline Berthod of Switzerland take the Harriman cup classic.

Strold made a spectacular two-mile downhill run on the Baldy Mountain course in 2:33.2 for the men's title. Miss Berthod of the Chateau D'Oex Ski club, shot the 1.6-mile women's course in 2:12.2 to take the women's championship.

Ralph Miller of Camp Hale, Colo., was the first man through the starting gate of the 15th annual three others followed him in the annual Harriman Ski races. Forty-downhill over a near-perfect conditioned slope.

Miss Berthod led off the race among 22 of the world's best women skiers.

Combined championships will be decided Sunday after the slalom on Ruud mountain.

Cambridge Triumphs In Thames Classic

London — (U.P.) — Cambridge's eight-oared shell, with two American oarsmen, won the 101st renewal of the classic crew race against Oxford Saturday over the winding Thames River course.

The "light blue" sweepswingers of Cambridge won by an overwhelming margin in 19 minutes and 10 seconds over the four-mile 374-yard course. Blustery winds and intermittent rain squalls hampered the crews.
