of the Nile, five of which are in Canada. The first temple was organized in 1913 in Seattle, and Zuleima was the 13th temple to receive its charter, having organized in 1922. Principal work of the order is to assist the crippled child. The members s.e.w. provide delicacies at Thanksgiving and toys at Christmas for the Shrine hospitals throughout the United States. Zuleima temple contributed more than \$400 for the aid of crippled children last year.

Education Needs Changing For Women Students

Ithaca, N. Y. — (U.P.) — Education of women in the future presents special problems, says Dean Helen G. Canoyer of the New York State College of Home Economics.

"The primary function of home economics is and has been the coordination of all sciences and arts toward constructive family life," she explains. "As women's status in society has changed, home economics education has broadened."

The women of tomorrow, Miss Canoyer says, will need an even broader education.

"Women are playing an increasingly active role as wage earners and citizens — in addition to homemaking. More married women," she says, "work outside the home now than at the height of World War II."

Recent estimates, she says, show that more than one-third of the people employed are women; one-half of the women workers are married, and one-fifth of married women work.
