16-Year-Old Stowaway Vows He Will Not Return Home; Will Geet Talk from Mother

Honolulu, T. H. — (U.P.) — A student who stowed aboard a Hawaii-bound freighter vowed Saturday he would run away again if forced to return home.

Donald Allen Prichard, 16, was arraigned Friday on the "technical charge" of being a juvenile delinquent but he quickly captured the court's sympathy.

Prichard told the court he had no particular reason for wanting to come to Honolulu and that he just wanted to get away from his home.

He said he had heard about "pineapples and the happy life" in Hawaii.

Judge J. Frank McLaughlin ordered the boy to be given pine-

apple to fulfill at least half his desires.

In Gardena, the boy's mother, Mrs. Virgil Padgett, said she was cheered to hear that he was safe, but that when he comes home she is going to have "a mother-to-man talk with him."

"He always reads a lot and wanted to see far-off places," she said. She hoped his present jaunt would satisfy him.

She won't try to paddle him, she said. "It would be silly anyway. He's nearly 17 now and bigger than I am and a lot braver, judging from what he's done."

Real Fine Boy

Probation Officer Robert W. Cassidy said Saturday "he's just a poor kid who felt unwanted at home. He seems to be a real fine

boy."

The stowaway was taken to the City and County Emergency hospital Friday night for a physical checkup. Cassidy said the boy "appeared to be quite weak and kept stumbling around."

The checkup revealed Prichard was all right but was weak because of the lack of nourishment. The boy told authorities he lived on beans, soup and water for eight days.

Offer Home for Boy

Cassidy said he has received several calls from Honolulu residents offering to take the boy into their homes.

The probation officer said the boy told him he and his stepfather could not get along. He said the family has been living in house trailers for the past few years, moving around much of the time. Prichard said he would run away from home if he was forced to return.

The student told Cassidy he climbed into a navy ambulance on a San Pedro, Calif., dock on March 17. He said he knew the vehicle would be loaded aboard a Matson freighter bound for Hawaii.

During the dark hours in the ambulance the boy kept a brief diary but had to give it up finally when his candle supply ran out.

Portland Girl Drowns In Flooded Basement

Portland — (U.P.) — A 10-year-old Portland girl drowned in a flooded basement excavation here Saturday while playing with two other girls.

Joyce Ann Clark, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Madden Clark of Portland was throwing sticks and stones into the muddy excavation when she slipped and fell in. Police said the hole contained about six feet of water.

'Caine Mutiny' Chosen Best Film of 1954

New York — (U.P.) — The motion picture "The Caine Mutiny" was named the best film of 1954 in the annual Film Daily poll of critics, it was announced today.

The picture received 293 votes. Other pictures in the top running were: "On the Waterfront," with 273 votes; "Rear Window," 259; "The Country Girl," 206; and "The High and the Mighty," 191.

Art Workshop for Teachers To Open

On Inservice art workshop will be held in Medford at the senior high school cafeteria beginning Tuesday, March 29 and continuing for three days. Classes begin at 3:30 p.m. and continue to 9:30 p.m. with an hour from 6 to 7 p.m. for dinner. Medford schools will serve a meal at a nominal cost.

Instructor for the course will be Miss Cleo Heller, demonstrator for Binney Smith and company. Miss Heller holds a master's degree in art from University of Southern California and a bachelor's degree from UCLA. She has had 15 years experience in classroom teaching and supervision in schools both elementary and high schools. Various materials will be used in the "learn by doing" workshop including crayola, chalk, finger paint, powder paint, tempera, water colors, papier mache, and clayola. The course runs for 15 hours.

No Observers

Pre-registration was made earlier in the year. The class is limited to approximately 50 teachers. No observers but administrators and supervisors are permitted. Certificates of completion will be given to teachers attend every session and completing the 15 hours. British Newspaper Strike In 4th Day

London — (U.P.) — The government debated today whether to step in and try to get the presses rolling in the four-day-old London newspaper strike.

Leaders of the Newspaper Proprietors Association and the Strike Committee held separate meetings this morning but neither side made any move to resume negotiations.

American newspapers published in Europe continued normal shipments of copies to London. The New York Herald Tribune edition published in Paris said it was considering a step-up in deliveries to London.

The Manchester Guardian was the only national newspaper still publishing in Britain.

A walkout of 700 electricians and mechanics has stopped publication of London's three afternoon, nine morning and 11 Sunday newspapers since Friday. Their total circulation is nearly 50,000,000.

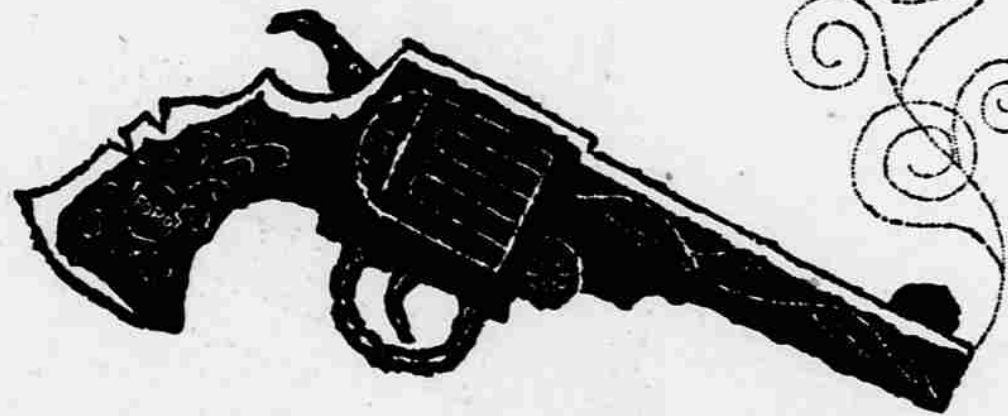

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Airmen Escape Crash Of Army Helicopter

Eugene — (U.P.) — Two Ft. Lewis, Wash., airmen escaped death yesterday when their Army helicopter crashed one mile east of Saginaw near here.

State police at Eugene said the aircraft apparently ran out of gas. It was one of four "egg-beaters" operating in the area. The other three planes landed to assist the crashed plane.

The copter was heavily damaged. Pilot of the plane was 1st Lt. R. A. Johnson. His passenger has been tentatively identified as a Pfc. McKindley. Both men are of Ft. Lewis.

30 Snorting Brahma Bulls Round Up by Policeman

Phoenix, Ariz. — (U.P.) — Harried authorities Saturday rounded up the last of some 30 snorting Brahma bulls that broke out of a railroad pen and turned city streets into a rodeo arena Friday night.

Several persons were injured, one seriously. Two vehicles were damaged, and fences, lawns, shrubs and gardens were torn up before police corralled the beasts.

Three of the bulls were shot to death by officers. Police switchboards were flooded with com-

plaints from angry citizens chased from the streets by the excited bulls.

Frances Rhodes, 15, an Indian girl, suffered serious head injuries and was under treatment at Phoenix Indian Hospital. James Legg, 72, of Phoenix, suffered minor injuries when he hopped over a fence to avoid a charging bull.

Gordon Weigen, a Phoenix Gazette newspaper photographer reported an angry bull butted his car when he attempted to get a picture of the animal.

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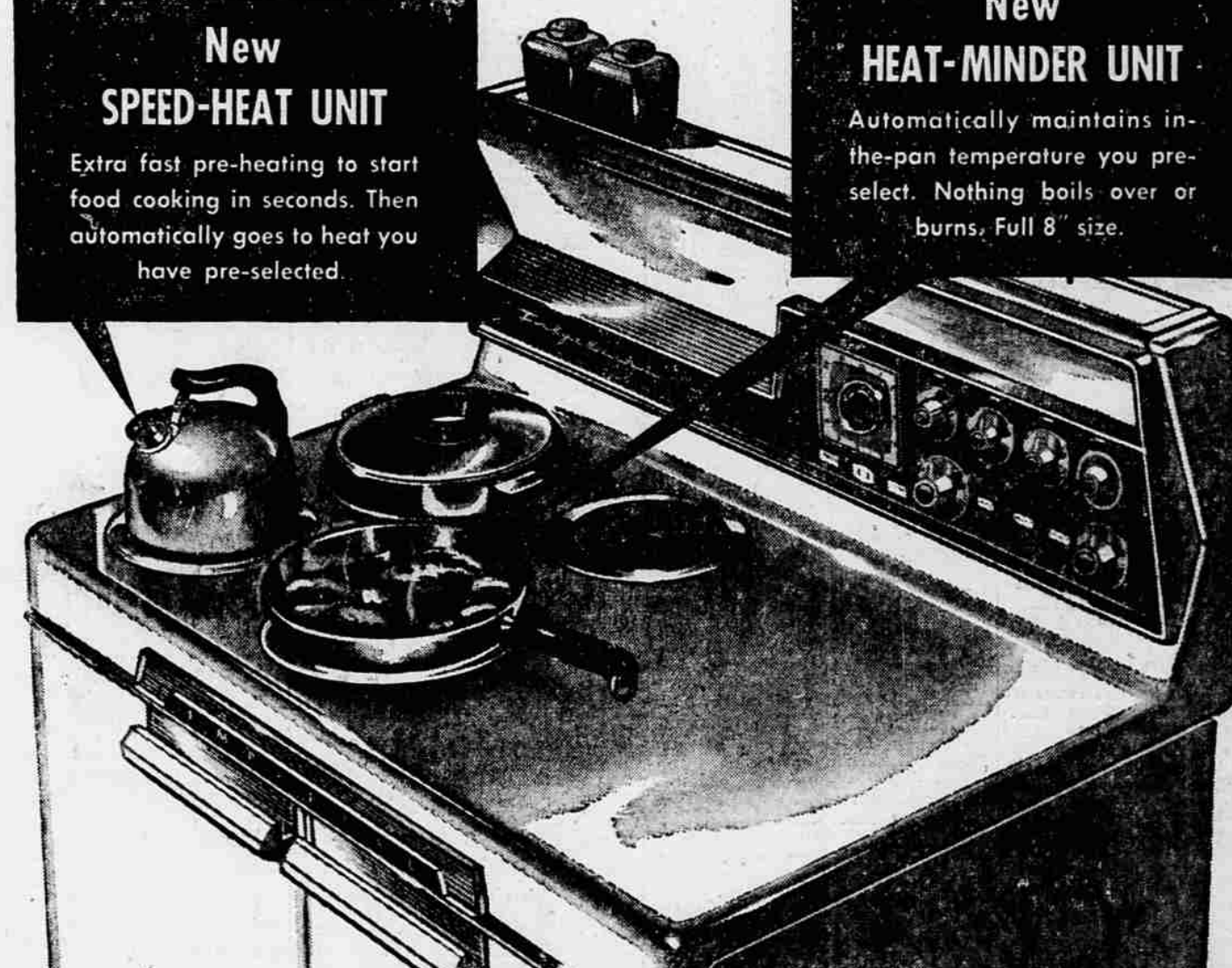
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
