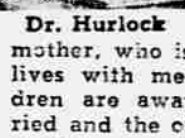

As We Live

EVERYONE NEEDS SOME SOCIAL LIFE

After working all day, many men have no interest in going out in the evenings. Here is a letter from a woman who feels the same way:

(Q) "When my husband was alive, I used to get provoked at him for not wanting to go out in the evenings when I had been at home all day and wanted a change. Now, as a widow, I am faced with the same problem that he was. My mother, who is in her sixties, lives with me. My two children are away; one is married and the other is taking a nurse's training course. I have a job that keeps me out of the home from 8 o'clock in the morning until nearly 6 at night.



"When I get home I am tired, and there are so many things to be done, as every woman who has a home knows. I welcome a quiet evening. My mother, on the other hand, is in the house all day, except for shopping and a few errands in the neighborhood. She always wants to go somewhere and do something in the evenings. I might add that her home was not here and she knows very few people. Of course I want Mother to be happy and enjoy herself, but how can I cope with a job and social life too?"

(A) It is hard to try to work and be out night after night. However, an occasional break during the week would be good for you. You need the recreation. If you mother is well enough to take care of the home and go out in the evenings, couldn't you suggest tactfully that she do some of the things you usually do in the evenings so you would be free to take her out? Even more important, why not get her interested in some of the church and community organizations where she would meet women of her own age? If she makes some friends in your community, that will help to solve the problem of giving her entertainment.

You could have some of the women her age come to your home. Or you could send her in a taxi to their homes while you stayed at home and rested. Don't penalize your mother now while she is well enough to enjoy the last years of her life, even if it means sacrifices for you.

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Water Forecast for Harney Basin Shows Short Supplies Due

Burns—(U.P.)—Irrigation water supplies in the Harney basin during the next six months probably will be seriously short, it was forecast here Tuesday at a water forecast meeting by W. T. Frost of the U.S. Soil Conservation Service.

Frost based his forecast on less than normal fall and winter precipitation in the area, the resulting lack of snow cover and extremely dry soil conditions.

Larry Zimmerman, U.S. Weather Bureau river forecaster, and Ray Dunnavin of the Burns weather bureau, said fall precipitation was only 35 per cent of the 10-year average. Winter rain and snow was about 45 per cent of the 10-year average. Temperatures also have been below normal.

Frost, citing snow cover measurements throughout the basin, said snow depth and water content are near 84 per cent of the 10-year average.

Soils Said Dry
Soils under the snow are dry. Frost said the dry soil would soak up much of the snow melt that otherwise would become part of stream flow. Frost indicated runoff from melting snows in lower portions of the basin's watershed will likely be but about 65 per cent of normal and 25 per cent of normal in the upper watershed.

Several springs in the area also were reported dry. River flow forecasts said the Silves river near here would be 25,000-acre feet during April through September, compared to 11,000-acre feet for the 10-year average. The Donner Und Blitzen flow near Frenchglen was forecast at 43,000-acre feet, compared to an average of 67,000, while Trout creek near Denio was forecast to flow at 6,500 acre feet, compared to a 9,000 acre feet 10-year average.

CAB Sets Hearing On Cause of Crash
Seattle—(U.P.)—The Civil Aeronautics Board said today it would hold a public hearing in an effort to determine what caused a Pan-American airlines stratosphere to go down off the Oregon coast Saturday.

Four persons died in the water after the big plane crash-landed. There were 19 survivors.

Frank McKlveen, Seattle CAB agent, said an attempt would be made to locate the exact place the plane sank. However, he pointed out that the water might be as deep as 5,400 feet at the spot and salvage operations might not be possible.

Meanwhile, mail from three sacks picked up at sea was spread out to dry at the Seattle postoffice before being sent to Portland where the tanker Idaho Falls off-loaded them. Ten sacks of mail apparently went down with the plane.
