Washington — (U.P.) — President Eisenhower will go to Augusta, Ga., April 12 for a spring vacation, the White House said today. He will stop enroute at Charleston, S.C., to accept an honorary degree from The Citadel.

Gen. Mark W. Clark, World War II comrade of Mr. Eisenhower, is president of the Citadel, one of the oldest military colleges in the nation.

The White House would not estimate when Mr. Eisenhower will end his stay in Augusta, but unofficially he is expected back here about April 20 or 21.
