

Police Department Revises File System

Central Point —The Central Point police department is revising its filing and bookkeeping system in an effort to allow officers to spend more time on the streets and less on paper work, according to Chief Oran Chastain.

Need for the revision, which, in effect, will simplify the system, has been brought about by growth of the community with a resulting increase on the duties of the police department, Chastain said.

Features of the new system include a new method of handling bail, which gives a permanent record of each case, and a cross reference case file which will do away with the previous system of recording each case of type of crime.

Easter Seals Sent To County Citizens; Campaign Planned

Easter Seals were mailed to residents of Jackson County last week as the Oregon Society for Crippled Children and Adults took the first step in launching the greatest campaign for crippled children in its 34-year history.

The campaign, which officially opened March 10 and continues through Easter Sunday, April 10, is the one annual opportunity to contribute financial assistance for crippled children's services, according to Mrs. Charles Jones, who is acting as chairman of the drive, sponsored by Epsilon Sigma Alpha sorority. Campaigns are being conducted simultaneously by more than 1,200 affiliates of the National Society for Crippled Children and Adults in the 48 states, District of Columbia, Alaska, Hawaii and Puerto Rico.

More than 90 per cent of the funds raised remain in the state for direct service, the remainder going for a nationwide program of education, direct service and research, including the Easter Seal Research foundation.

Mrs. Howard J. Phillips, mailing chairman, urged all Jackson county residents who have not received their seals to contact her by phoning Medford 2-6831, and thus participate in the 22nd annual drive on behalf of crippled children.

"It is inevitable that some persons may be missed in such a large-scale mailing as that made this year," Mrs. Phillips said. "We not only urge all citizens to call for their seals, but to use them on each piece of Easter time mail."

General Petroleum Plans Oregon Drilling

Portland — (U.P.) — Robert L. Minckler, president of General Petroleum Company, said the oil firm would probably begin exploratory operations in Oregon and Washington within the next two years.

Minckler said his company had never drilled in the Northwest before, but was now leasing land in eastern and western Oregon. He said the two states probably would never rival the oil production of California, Texas and Oklahoma, but he said the potential was "promising."

Bill To Restrict Authority Of Governor's Appointment Killed by Senate Committee

Salem — (U.P.) —The House State and Federal Affairs Committee Wednesday killed a bill that would have restricted the governor's appointive powers relating to state board and commissions.

Under the terms of the bill introduced by 17 House and Senate Democrats, membership of state boards would have to be constituted so that the party of which the governor was a member had a majority of not more than one.

The committee agreed that the governor's hands should not be tied in making appointments since he is responsible for the performance of the boards and commissions. Rep. Walter Pearson (D-Portland) said Democrats would not want the governor's powers restricted in such fashion when a Democrat governor is elected.

The committee also adopted an amendment to a legislators' pay raise bill to provide a per diem expense allowance of \$10 per day for 100 days of each legislative session. The bill before the committee already would provide for a flat pay increase to \$2400 for a two-year term, or \$1200 for each session. The bill was not reported out of committee pending printing of the amendment.

INTERIM STUDY OKAYED

Salem — (U.P.) —The Senate has passed a resolution calling for an interim committee to study Oregon's election laws, and ways of tightening the state's corrupt practices act.

Sens. Howard Belton (R-Canby) and Francis W. Ziegler (R-Corvallis) objected to the resolution because it carries an appropriation of \$15,000. Sen. Bel-

(Q) "My son is nearly two years old and I am greatly concerned about the way I have changed in my feelings toward him. Of course I love him very dearly; I always have and always will. But I find myself becoming very angry and upset about some of the things he does. A year ago, as I look back at it, I never felt this way and it upsets me. I don't want him to grow up feeling unloved, nor do I want to be picking on him all the time as I know this hurts his feelings and makes him rather resentful toward me. Do you think I am just tired and need a change or is this what happens to other mothers?"

(A) It would be unusual if your attitude toward your son did not change as he grew older.

er. It will change many more times between now and the time he is a grown man.

However you don't want the changes to be for the worse. Nor do you want to create the impression in his mind that you no longer love him.

A year ago, your son was still a helpless baby. Now he is getting to the point where he can do many things for himself and he wants to do them. Also, he is exploring his little world and nothing is safe from his prying fingers.

Try to realize that you cannot expect him to remain as he was when you brought him home from the hospital. He will grow up, become independent, have his own interests. Each year he will face new problems and make new problems for you.

Knowing how to help a child face life, meet his problems successfully, and be happy at home is the job of a parent. Just because you do not have to wait on him hand and foot as you did a year ago does not mean that your work is at an end. Your job from now on will be to help him grow up successfully, and this you cannot do unless you understand his needs.

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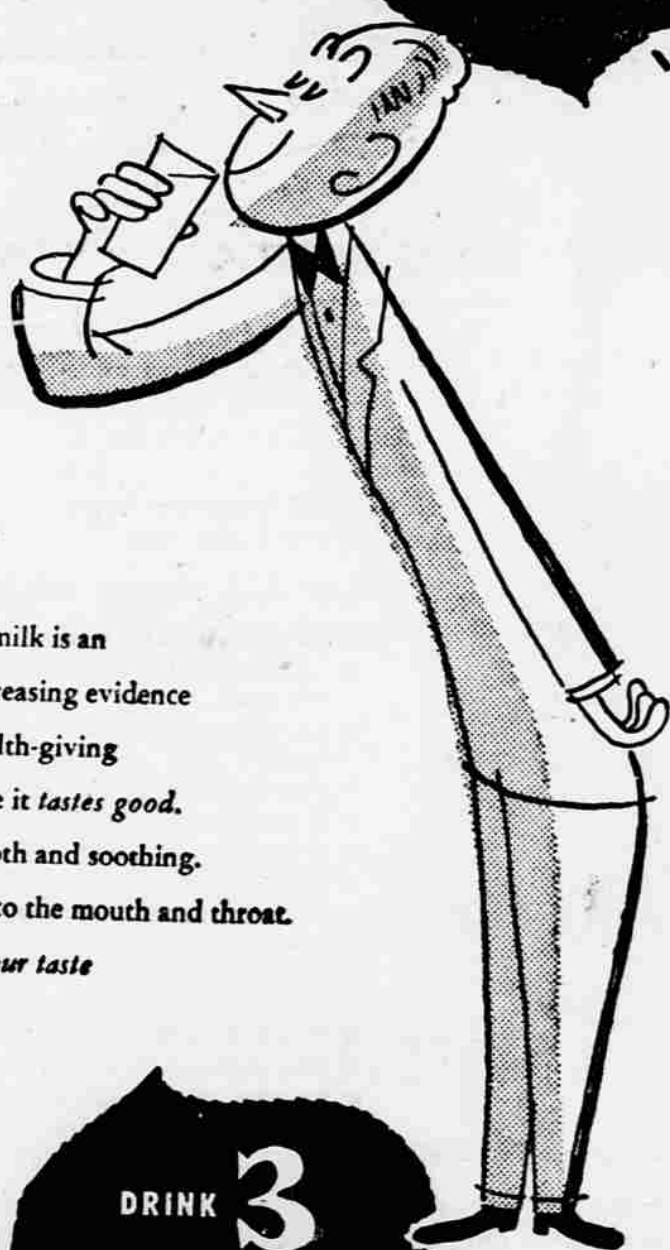
