Survey Group Estimates
100 to 300 Deer Died in
Baker County This Winter

New Bridge, Ore. — (U.P.) — Baker county stockmen and hunters joined state officials last week end to survey the county's deer population in an attempt to prevent recurrence of disastrous winter losses from overcrowding and starvation.

Some 120 members of the state game commission, the U.S. Forest Service, the Bureau of

Land Management, Oregon wildlife federation and other groups took to the range around Powder river and Eagle creek valleys where an estimated 3,000 to 5,000 animals have gathered.

The group estimated that from 100 to 300 deer had died on the range this winter.

Proposals offered by the group to control increasing deer herds, produce more brush-type forage on the lowland slopes, and to increase multiple deer-livestock use of the winter range.

Wilmington, N.C. — (U.P.) — Billy Maxwell of Odessa, Tex., today credited his first victory as a professional golfer to "plenty of luck and breaks." "It's a wonderful feeling and a great honor," Maxwell said after picking up the \$2,200 first money in the seventh annual Azalea Open tournament. Maxwell, who led the field all the way, shot a three-under-par 36 in Sunday's final round to finish with a 72-hole total of 270. He finished one stroke ahead of Mike Souchak of Durham, N.C.

HEARING DELAYED

Trenton, N.J. — (U.P.) — A hearing on the case of injured boxer Bryan Thompson was delayed today to await the outcome of the young fighter's battle for life in St. Francis hospital. Hospital officials reported Thompson still "unchanged and critical." The 23-year-old middleweight from Philadelphia has been unconscious almost constantly since he was knocked out last Tuesday night in the second round of a bout here against Jerry Luedde of New Haven, Conn.

MOORE HAS PHYSICAL

San Francisco — (U.P.) — World light heavyweight champion Archie Moore made an attempt to regain his California boxing license today when he underwent a physical at the California State Athletic commission office.

Moore's license was revoked on March 24 when a commission doctor ruled the 38-year-old champion had a heart condition before a non-title bout with Frankie Daniels in San Diego.

Highway Building
Approval Expected

Washington — (U.P.) — Sen. Albert Gore predicted today that the Senate Public Works committee will approve a compromise bill that would provide for building upwards of \$3,000,000,000 of highways a year.

He also predicted that the compromise will not include a controversial administration plan for financing a substantial amount of the federal share of the cost by issuing special bonds outside the public debt.

The Tennessee Democrat is chairman of a roads subcommittee that has been holding hearings on three highway construction measures. The subcommittee will draft, probably early next month the legislation which the full committee will send to the Senate for its action.

New Firm Mixes
First Batch of
Locally-Made Paint

The first batch of paint to be manufactured by the Medford Paint Manufacturing corporation was mixed Saturday at the company's plant at 906 North Riverside ave., according to R. L. Taylor, president of the new firm.

The paint made Saturday is a utility grade outside housepaint, Taylor explained that there have already been sold and there are orders from local stores for more. The paints produced by the firm will be sold wholesale either to business firms or to painting contractors.

Others in the corporation are D. W. Bowers, vice-president and chemist, Grants Pass, and E. W. DeSpain, secretary-treasurer, who takes an active part in the operations with Taylor.

Production will continue for the present mainly of outside house paints and roof coatings. The roof coating will be made from their own formula and is high fire resistant, according to the owners.

Only one mill and one mixer are in operation, though the incorporators plan to add more.

Rural Fire Discloses
Unawareness of Fire

The garage was destroyed and the rear portion of the house considerably damaged at the Harold Pence place, 1833 Minear rd., about 5:40 p.m. Firemen stated that the blaze began in the garage but that the exact cause was unknown.

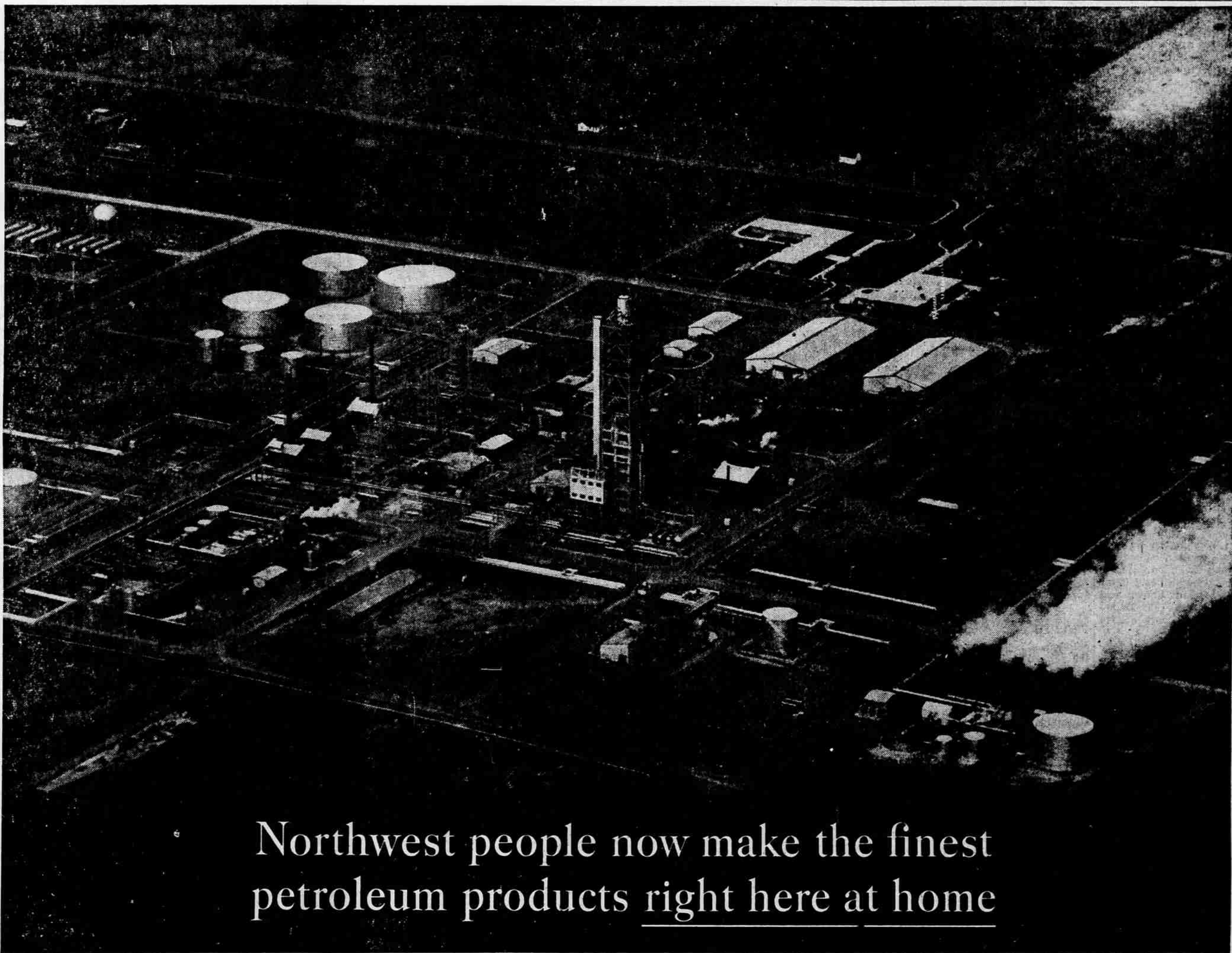
