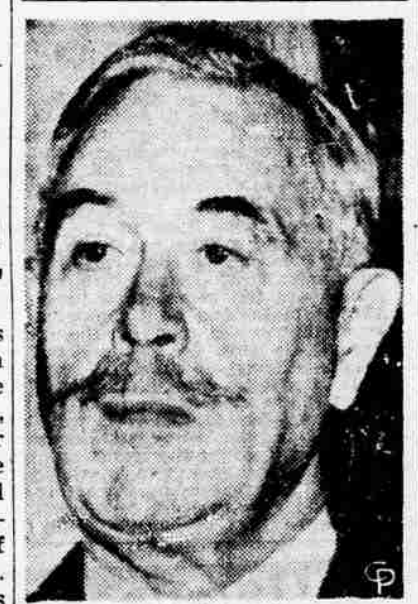
Klamath Basin Water Plentiful

Klamath Falls (U.P.)—Farmers and ranchers in the Klamath Falls basin will, in general, have sufficient supplies of irrigation water for the 1955 season, according to W. T. "Jack" Frost of the U. S. Soil Conservation Service.

Adequate supplies of water in the Upper Klamath Lake and Clear Lake reservoirs was the basis of the optimism at a water conservation meeting held here Saturday. Upper Klamath lake now contains 400,000 acre-feet of storage water, down only 17,000 feet from the 10-year average.

Only dark spot in the basin's 1955 prospects is the 20,000 acre-foot shortage in Gerber reservoir. Farmers and ranchers in this area will not have sufficient water to meet all needs for the coming season.

Winter rains of 55 per cent average—compared to 30 per cent for central Oregon—are responsible for the comparatively bright picture.
