Committee Named To Plan Armed Forces Day May 21

Col. William H. Bartlett has been named general chairman of the Medford Armed Forces day observance, scheduled for Saturday, May 21.

Plans call for a military show and celebration, with displays of military equipment, a fly-over of military aircraft, and exhibits by local National Guard and Army reserve units.

Assistant chairman for the observance will be Mayor Earl Miller of Medford.

Publicity committee chairman will be Jennings Pierce Sr. Committee members named

in charge of the program will be Col. William H. Bartlett, with Col. Charles E. Stafford serving as co-chairman. Members

of the committee will include Lt. Col. Jack M. Hartley, Earl A. Sterigere, of the Medford Ground Observer corps post, and CPO Cleve King, Navy recruit here.

Jennings Pierce Jr., of the Medford Junior Chamber of Commerce, will be chairman of the refreshments committee. Jack Sides, of the Medford Lions club, will serve as co-chairman.

Military chairman will be Capt. Jay M. Hamilton. Members of his committee will include Capt. Donald T. Hemingway, Major Oliver J. Blanchard, and Lt. L. G. Monroe.

Paul Butler Sees Democrat Victory

Washington — (U.P.) — Democratic National Chairman Paul M. Butler said Democratic gains in Michigan and Chicago elections "support our belief that a great Democratic victory is in the making for 1956."

Republican National Chairman Leonard W. Hall countered that although Democrats won the mayor's race in Chicago, the GOP made a good showing in that "traditionally Democratic stronghold." And he said the Michigan results are still incomplete and await "further clarification."

In Chicago, Democrat Richard Daley beat Republican Robert E. Merriam in the hotly contested mayoralty race. In Michigan, although recounts appeared likely in six of eight statewide contests, Democrats claimed they have now become the dominant party.

North Viet Nam Guerillas Said Well Equipped if War Breaks Out

Hanoi, Indochina — (U.P.) — If war breaks out again in Indochina, Ho Chi Minh's Communist guerrilla Army will be well equipped.

The Geneva armistice agreement forbids the entrance of weapons and ammunition to

Indochina. There is an International Armistice Commission, but its efforts to enforce the truce terms are regarded by Westerners as ineffective.

No machinery can be set up in this wild, rugged land to keep Ho's army from getting weapons from neighboring Red China.

Three commission teams returned recently from an inspection trip along the Chinese border in search of secret arms movement. They were like teams of ants exploring the hide of an elephant. They had a fine camping experience.

But they found no sign of arms smuggling.

They would follow a road in a jeep, on ponies, afoot until it disappeared into nothingness in a jungle. They plodded along jungle trails. But they found no sign of arms smuggling.

The people were friendly. But where once they were loyal

allies of the French, and displayed a French flag and a statue of the Virgin Mary on their walls, they now displayed pictures of Ho Chi Minh, Red Chinese Leader Mao Tse-tung and Soviet Premier Nikolai A. Bulganin.

The international commission consists of Canadians, Indians and Poles. There are seven fixed teams, with six officers in each. They have 1,600 miles of jungles, mountains and broken sea-coast to watch.

It is safe to assume—and the French army assumes it—that the Viet Minh rebels now have enough war material on hand to begin the war again.

Ho's territory is an armed camp. His young, confident army is the most important fighting force between here and India.

But Ho, apparently, is not thinking of marching now. He is preparing for the 1956 elections for the unification of northern and southern Viet Nam.

Councilman Named At Jacksonville To Succeed Long

Jacksonville — E. D. McIntyre this week was named by Mayor John F. Keaveny to fill a vacancy on the Jacksonville city council. McIntyre is co-owner of the Jacksonville market.

The council vacancy was created by the recent resignation of Jack Long due to the press of personal business. McIntyre will fill the remainder of Long's term, which expires at the end of this year.

In appointing McIntyre to the post, Mayor Keaveny expressed his appreciation to Long for the work he has done on the council.

Dates of August 6 and 7 were approved by the council for the annual Jacksonville Gold Rush Jubilee. The dates were requested by Ike Dunford, of the Jacksonville Lions club, which sponsors the event. Dunford noted that work on booths and street decorations will start on August 5.

Purchase of a water system for the small city park was approved by the council. The water system will be installed by the Jacksonville Garden club, which keeps up the park.

The council heard the first reading of a proposed city curfew ordinance. The ordinance would forbid youngsters under 16 years of age from being in public places between the hours of 10 p.m. and 4 a.m. unless they were accompanied by their parents or had their parents' consent. It provides for fines not to exceed \$100.

Jobs To Be Plentiful For Agriculture Grads

Urbana, Ill. — (U.P.) — In the next five years there will be two jobs for every agricultural graduate, according to experts at the University of Illinois.

Openings will exist for extension specialists, salesmen, sales managers, agricultural engineers and especially vocational agriculture teachers, according to H. W. Hannah, associate dean of the university's agricultural school. Hannah said the university has the equipment and facilities for training 50 per cent more agriculture students than are now enrolled.

Average yearly salaries for agricultural graduates engaged in educational work range from \$3,700 to \$9,000, he said. Annual salaries for agricultural grads in business and industry have been averaging \$8,300 and those in farming and farm management between \$5,500 and \$8,500.

Jacksonville — An Easter egg hunt, sponsored by Jacksonville city police and merchants, will be held Saturday starting at 10 a.m.

Scene of the hunt will be the grounds of the Jacksonville museum. The event will be open to children through nine years of age.
