Concert Planned Saturday As Music Festival Climax

Climaxing the Southern Oregon Music Educators contest-festival, which opened here yesterday, will be the grand festival concert Saturday, April 9, at 8 p.m. in Medford High school gymnasium. At that time selected musicians from the schools attending the three-day music meet will perform in the large festival groups.

The 12-piece festival orchestra will be directed by John O'Connor, conductor from the University of Oregon. The 180-voice choir will be directed by Karl Ernst, director of fine arts at San Jose State college and Clarence Sawhill, band instructor from the University of California at Los Angeles will conduct the 198-piece band.

The orchestra will play "Temptation" arranged by Isaac; "In the Hall of the Mountain King" from Grieg's "Peer Gynt" suite and the first movement of Haydn's "Symphony No. 2."

The chorus numbers will be "Miserere Mei" by Lotti; "Nightfall in Skye" by Robertson; "Hard by the Fountain," by Waelrant; "Skip to my Lou" arranged by Riegger and "Sing and Rejoice" by James.

The band's four numbers will be "Nutmeggers March" by Osterling; "Alleluia and Chorale" by Hansen; "Kin" by Frangkiser and "Bequine for Band," an Oser composition.

A small admission charge will be made for the Saturday night concert.

The Friday evening program is set for 7 p.m. in Medford High school auditorium. Performing will be the Medford Junior High school orchestra directed by John Drysdale; Klamath Union High school orchestra directed by Don McKenzie; Medford High school orchestra, with John Drysdale directing; Klamath Union High school band directed by LaMar Jensen; Medford High school band with I. A. Mirick as director; Klamath Union High school mixed chorus directed by Andy Loney Jr., and Medford High school mixed chorus, directed by Allan Lehl.
