## Traditional Easter Parade Brings Out Record Number

New York — (U.P.) — A record crowd of 2-million persons joined the traditional Easter Parade Sunday to see and be seen on Sun-drenched Fifth Avenue.

The crowd jammed Fifth Avenue in an elbow-crushing mass in a 10-block area around St. Patrick's Cathedral and overflowed into Madison, Park and Sixth avenues and into Central Park.

Smartly dressed women confounded the fashion world by wearing mostly small hats. It was a surprise to milliners who predicted larger hats this season.

Ina Feero and Virginia Beach will play Mrs. Dexter and Mrs. McCutcheon, friends of Mrs. Stanley; and Dick Puckett, Gilbert Ellis, Jim Womack, Gene Lester and Floyd Pavlovski will be among those seen in short roles.

**Churches Jam-Packed**  
Only a few exhibitionists appeared, reflecting the public's disapproval against publicity or commercialism.

About 10,000 persons worshipped in mid-town Manhattan's famous churches and more than 5,000 more were turned away because there was not room for them inside.

Francis Cardinal Spellman, archbishop of New York, officiated at a two hour pontifical mass at St. Patrick's Cathedral. Admission was by ticket only. Many thousands more crowded around the church to hear the services over loudspeakers.

Across the nation, millions of Americans attended church services and celebrated the arrival of spring with traditional walks in Easter finery and holiday dinners.

**Sunny Skies Prevail**  
Skies were fair except for drizzling rain from Western Texas to Georgia and Kentucky and some snow in the Pacific Northwest.

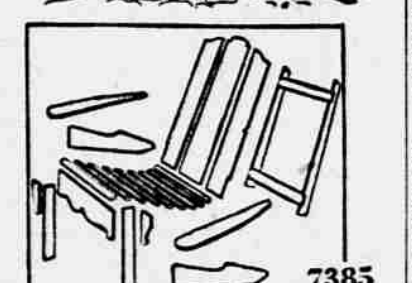
President Eisenhower went to church at National Presbyterian church. The First Lady did not attend; she is recuperating from an illness at their Gettysburg, Pa., farmhouse.

In Chicago, high temperatures apparently lured city dwellers into the country for the holiday. Comparatively few persons promenaded on Michigan Avenue.

A small turnout of about 2,000 persons disappointed sponsors of an Easter service atop Bald Mountain at Alto Pass, Ill. But huge crowds attended other traditional outdoor services.

About 20,000 persons attended sunrise devotions on Mt. Davidson in San Francisco. A crowd of 14,000 went to Red Rocks Amphitheater near Denver and 22,000 others braved freezing temperatures to worship at Pike's Peak near Colorado Springs. At Miami, 40,000 heard a 500-voice choir at Easter dawn.

## President Greet Children At Annual Easter Egg Party

Washington — (U.P.) — President Eisenhower today wished a "wonderful time" to wiggling and waving youngsters at the traditional White House Easter egg roll and advised parents not to get lost.

The President appeared behind a protective fence, a precautionary measure to prevent a repetition of the mob scenes in 1953.

Two years ago, Mr. Eisenhower said, several lost children turned up, "but we found them really the parents who were lost. I hope you all stay together this year and have a wonderful time."

The President told the crowd, tallied at 6411 as he spoke, that Mrs. Eisenhower, who is at their Gettysburg, Pa., farm, was "sorry she couldn't be here to welcome you."

Youngsters crowding up to the fence shoved eight Easter eggs into the President's hands as he came down from the little platform. As he walked back across the lawn towards his office, he held up both hands and commented, "I've got to find someone to give these to."

He was answered with shouts of "give them to me."

The President distributed the eggs to other youngsters as he walked by and said with a laugh, "This is sort of a transfer job." A good half of the crowd seemed to file out of the south lawn after the President spoke.

Although there was some egg-rolling, most of the youngsters were playing tag, just plain running around, and sometimes throwing their eggs.

Only children under 12 are permitted at the egg roll, and must be accompanied by an

adult and bring their own eggs. Last year the first family was vacationing in Georgia, and a skimpy crowd of only 11,500 showed up for the egg roll. For many persons half the fun is in seeing the President.

Highest attendance at the annual egg roll was logged in 1939 when 53,108 persons turned out. At the end of the day 108 children had gotten lost, two persons were hospitalized, six fainted and 22 were treated for small cuts and bruises.

### College Student Joins Cast of Bishop's Players
