Ann Arbor (U.P.) — The official report on the value of the Salk anti-polio vaccine was made on the tenth anniversary of the death of Franklin D. Roosevelt — and it was no coincidence.

Mr. Roosevelt's own affliction with the crippling disease made possible the years of expensive research which culminated with the vaccine.

He was founder of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

Basil O'Connor, president of the foundation since its inception and once Mr. Roosevelt's law partner, has always been inspired by "my friend, Frank." It was O'Connor who saw to it that today's announcement was made today — and was a commemoration of his friend's memory.

Astoria-Washington Bridge Said Feasible

Astoria (U.P.) — A bridge across the Columbia river between Astoria and Point Ellice, Wash., is economically feasible, Port of Astoria commissioners were told last night.

Representatives of engineering and financing firms, reporting on a 10-month study of the proposed bridge, said it would cost \$25,430,000. During the first 25 years it would produce \$50,000,000 in tolls. It would take 3 1/2 years to build.

Paul Speer, of the A. C. Allyn Bond Company of Chicago, said that in addition to the \$25,430,000 for actual construction the Port of Astoria would have to borrow enough money to pay interest on any revenue bonds issued. This would be for the construction period and for the first 10 years of operations when tolls would not be enough to defray costs of operation, maintenance and debt retirement.

Raab Opens Talks With Soviet's Bulgarian

Moscow (U.P.) — Austrian Chancellor Julius Raab opened talks with Soviet Premier Nikolai Bulganin and Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov today in hope of winning a treaty for his divided country.

Raab and his delegates who flew to Moscow yesterday from Vienna called on the new Soviet premier an hour after an early conference with Molotov.

The disturbance extended down to Eugene in the interior and to North Bend on the coast. Snowfall was heavy at higher elevations east of the Cascades.

In downtown Portland, 42-mile-an-hour gusts knocked out traffic signals and snarled heavy early morning traffic. The weather bureau said .84 inches of rain fell there by 8 a.m.
