Faces Tough Foe in Rematch

Mat Fans To Get Another Look At Biggest Wrestler

Valley wrestling fans will get another look at Man Mountain Dean Jr., the world's biggest active grappler and nephew of the original Man Mountain Dean, when he meets tough Yogi Hussane in a rematch at Merrick's arena Saturday night.

Dean, who tips the scales at 385 pounds, also is known for his feats of strength. His specialty is engaging a horse in a tug-of-war and he is said never to have lost. His pet maneuver in the ring is to get his opponent groggy, slam him to the mat, and drop his full weight on the unlucky one. Dean dubs the producer a "belly flop."

Promoter Mack Lillard came up with the rematch when Hussane demanded it, claiming he should not have been disqualified last week when he kicked Dean out of the ring and wouldn't let him return.

A match which should rival the Dean-Hussane fracas for fan interest pits Shirley Winters against Gerry Hunter in a return scrap. Miss Winters, who held the blonde bombshell to a draw two weeks ago, asked for a return date to prove she can take the measure of the Springfield terror.

"Cyclone" Cobb has a date with Larry Presnell, who has been handling the referee assignments in recent weeks. Arena doors will open at 7:30.

Lillard said Buck Davidson will referee all matches.

Bobo Olson Decisive Winner Over Maxim

San Francisco—(U.P.)—Carl (Bobo) Olson, a Lil' David with a mighty slingshot in each hand, crashed into the light heavyweight ranks for keeps today in the wake of pouncing out a brutally decisive ten-round decision over Joey Maxim at the Cow Palace.

"Bobo has proved that he can handle the big fellows and we'll go for anybody—even Rocky Marciano—if the price is right," Manager Sir Flaherty said after Wednesday night's slaughter.

The bald ruler of the middleweight ranks weighed 169 pounds for the non-title nationally televised fight, while Maxim, former world light heavyweight champion, had to sweat to get down to 175 or forfeit \$10,000.

Maxim Floored Twice

Olson had Maxim on the fringes of a knockout in the second and ninth rounds when he floored him with vicious combinations to the head. But Pal Joey always managed to clamber up and keep trying to land his stiff left jabs and hooks.

Judge Jack Downey voted the fight to Olson 60-50, Judge Johnny Bassanelli 62-48 and Referee Ray Flores 59½ to 50½. United

Press saw it Olson 62½, Maxim 47½.

Olson dropped the former light heavyweight king for two counts of eight during the battle, leaving Josey so confused that he said in the dressing room afterwards that he thought he had gone down three times.

Olson's Streak Unbroken

The busy Bobo-man smashed Maxim down the first time with an overhand right to the jaw which he bounced off Joey as if striking him with a dagger.

Another right started Maxim down in the ninth and Bobo kept him going canvasward with a left smash to the face.

It was Olson's 21st straight triumph since Ray Robinson outpointed him in a middleweight title scrap three years ago.

Olson's punches were strictly of the TNT variety and came with amazing rapidity as he constantly squared his shoulders, weaved in, busied himself on Pal Joey's mid-section, then suddenly exploded one-two to the face.

Stan Smith To Coach at Eagle Point

Stan Smith, ex-Medford high athlete, has resigned as football and track coach at Illinois Valley high to accept a similar post at Eagle Point, it was learned this week.

His resignation was accepted Monday by the Josephine county unit district school board.

Smith will begin his new duties next fall succeeding Jerry Mosby who goes to Lakeview. In addition to handling football and track Smith is expected to coach wrestling, a new sport for the Eagles. Eagle Point reportedly is still looking for a basketball and baseball coach. Mosby has tutored four sports.

Taught Social Studies

An Illinois Valley faculty member for three years, Smith has also taught social studies. Last year his track team won second place in the Hayward relays B division, one-fourth of a point behind the winner, Estacada. His Cougar football teams have won eight and lost 17.

Smith played football at Medford high and was a tackle for Southern Oregon college for four seasons. After graduation at SOC he continued studies at University of Oregon. He reportedly plans to complete work for a master's degree in education at U of O this summer.

Boye also won the shot put and Stamm the low hurdles to be among the day's double winners. Clarence Baker won both sprints for the Ashland school. Cleek took the mile and two-mile for Shasta and Jones won both the high and the broad jumps for the California school.

GAME BIRDS RELEASED

Portland—(U.P.)—More than 8,500 game birds raised on farms of the Oregon State Game Commission have been turned out on their own this year, according to the game commission. The commission said it tentatively planned to raise 30,000 pheasants and 8,000 chukars next year.

Miles City, Mont.—(U.P.)—Jim Cordial, former Oregon State football star, has been named head football coach at Custer county high school, school officials said. Cordial has been teaching physical education at the state orphan's home at Twin Bridges since his graduation from OSC.

Crash Survivors Barred From Press

Singapore—(U.P.)—The three Indian survivors of an Air India Constellation crash off Borneo arrived in Singapore today but were barred from seeing the press.

The Constellation, under charter to the Peiping government, crashed into the South China Sea Monday while flying from Hong Kong to Djakarta with 18 persons aboard, seven of them crewmen. Eight Chinese passengers were delegates to the Afro-Asian conference which opens next week in Bandung, Indonesia.

Peiping charged the plane was sabotaged while at the Hong Kong airport but Hong Kong authorities said the chances of sabotage were "extremely remote" since it was under heavy guard during the one-hour layover.
