

Sugar Ray Halts Olla In 3rd Round

Milwaukee, Wis.—(U.P.)—Sugar Ray Robinson said he was ahead of schedule on his comeback trail today. His manager said he would file for reinstatement of Robinson's world middleweight title.

Robinson rocked Wisconsin middleweight champion Ted Olla into technical submission in 2:15 of the third round Thursday night in a flash of the form which made him the world's greatest fighter, pound for pound.

But little could be indicated as to future greatness by the class of competition.

Robinson said the victory was the biggest thrill since his first fight after coming out of retirement.

Timing Satisfies

"I'm most satisfied with the timing on my combination," he said. "I'm as satisfied as I could be with my timing after 31 months out of the ring."

The experienced, 34-year-old Robinson caught the 24-year-old Olla with the suddenness of a thunderstorm at the opening of the third round after a relatively inactive first two rounds.

He came out with an explosion of rights and lefts, staggering Olla hardest with a key right. Then he put Olla down for the mandatory eight count with a hard left. Olla was up at four but he might as well have stayed down.

Robinson poured into him with blows from all directions, but was unable to put him down again. There was little doubt the fight should be stopped so Referee Dauber Jaeger stopped it.

Shasta high of Redding Calif., beat Medford 4 to 2 on Thursday in a team tennis match here.

PEL NINE SATURDAY BLACK TORNADO FOE

Medford high's baseball varsity will seek its third and fourth victories in the Southern Oregon Conference Saturday when it entertains Klamath union high school in a doubleheader.

First game will get underway at the Tornado diamond at 1 p.m.

The twinbill is rated a toss-up. Klamath's Pelicans come here after suffering two losses to Grants Pass in the league and one to Crater in non-loop contention. While Medford has a pair of wins over Crater, it isn't figuring the Pels as a cinch. Klamath's loss to the Comets, as well as those to GP, were by narrow margins. Grants Pass is rated favorite in the SO circuit.

Reports from Klamath Falls are that the weather has given the Pels little opportunity for adequate workout. Attitude of the Black Tornado is to regard the Pelicans as a club with a good potential and one which will improve much as the season progresses.

McCullough Picked

Medford Coach Alex McDonald said that Ed McCullough likely will be the Tornado pitcher in the first game with either Ken Pilon or Duane Sides going in the wind-up. He listed Terry King as probable catcher.

Tentative batting order for the first mix has Ed Reinking in

the line-up at first base, Jim Owsley at second, Dick McLoughlin at shortstop, Lorin Jacobs in left field, Paul Eckel in right field, Larry Guber at third base, Bob Mays or Pete Young in center field, King as catcher and McCullough as pitcher.

In the second scrape McCullough likely will be in center field and batting in the lead-off spot. Reinking will be placed seventh in the order.

D'Olive Likely

Dave D'Olive and Earl Tichenor are expected to get the hill duty for Klamath with Modesto Jimenez and Bob Kelley sharing the catching. Possible infield starters are Bill Hamblin, first base; Jerry Burke, second base; Butch Kimpton, shortstop; Ron Conner, third base, and Dave Leelin, Don Taucher and Graig McCarty, outfielders.

Present indications are that the conference and district race among Medford, Grants Pass, Klamath Falls and Ashland will be a tight one this year since most of the games played so far have been close.

Klamath looms as a club with good batting power once it gets in swing. Its pitching potential looks strong for the race.

While the Pelican and Tornado baseball teams are in action the varsity tennis team also will be contending here.

Winters-Hunter Tangle Has Ear-Marks of Grudge Match

Fine Future Likely for Herb Score

Herb Score is headed for just as bright a career as Bob Feller, says Coach Freddie Fitzsimmons of the New York Giants, who was around when both Cleveland Indians fireballers reported for their first spring training.

"Score throws the ball as hard as any left-hander I've ever seen," said Fitzsimmons, a star pitcher in his own right for 19 major league seasons. "The only thing that could give him trouble is control. And at that, he's probably better off than Feller was at the same period of their careers."

"Fat Freddie" was a Giants starter back in 1936 when Feller joined the Indians as a 17-year-old "boy wonder" right off an Iowa farm. Fitzsimmons had a chance to observe Feller during the Giants Indians exhibition tour that spring, just as he did Score this year.

Has Tremendous Speed

"Score has tremendous speed," Fitzsimmons said, "and he has a good curve, too. His curve ball could be improved, but it's good. When he gets that good control, he should become a great pitcher."

Fitzsimmons recalled that Feller had a great deal of trouble with his control when he first came up, and that it took him a few seasons to conquer his wildness.

Fitzsimmons agreed that 21-year-old Score has an advantage in that he came up to the majors with three years of minor league experience, whereas Feller never spent a day in the minors.

Corvallis — (U.P.) — Today's Northern Division baseball opener between Oregon and Oregon State here was postponed because of wet grounds. Beaver Coach Ralph Coleman said it was hoped the game could be made up with a doubleheader at Eugene tomorrow.

University of Oregon, Eugene — Oregon's three Northern Division defending champions open their quest of the 1955 titles this Saturday with action on their home grounds.

Coach Don Kirsch's baseball squad, twice pennant winners in as many years, tackle Oregon State in a home and home series. Coach Bill Powerman's powerful track team meets Idaho and Coach Sid Milligan's perennial title winners meet Washington in golf.

There is more than an even chance the baseball action will fall victim to the long siege of rain and be postponed until the teams meet in May. If the series escapes the weather, Bill Blodgett and Bill Garner will probably get the opening pitching assignments.

The Webfoot infield of Dick Schlossstein, Jim Johnson, Johnny Keller and Pete Williams is back intact from last year and the outfield will have Jerry Ross in left, the incomparable George Shaw in center and either Terry Maddox or Jim Pingree in right. Neil Marlett will again do the catching. Game time here Saturday is 1 p.m.

The Webfoot trackmen are again strong in the flat races, have some additional strength in the field events and are again weak in the hurdles and the discus.

The Ducks golfers will find the Husky tough again with Neil Dwyer and Bob Takano back from last year and Barry Ott and Bob Norquist to lead a fine group of sophomores.
