

ROGUE RIVER 2nd IN CLASS C RELAYS; EAGLES GET 10 IN B

Eugene — (U.P.)—Central high of Monmouth was victor in the Class B contention of the annual Hayward relays here Friday while Mt. Shasta of northern California grabbed top honors in the Class C struggle.

Central piled up 36 points, 10 ahead of Oakridge's second place total of 26.

Mt. Shasta accumulated 43 1/2 points in C rivalry to beat out strong Rogue River of Jackson county which had 37 1/2.

The Beavers were nursing a 4-3 lead going into the top of the ninth when they banded over three runs to cement the issue. Frankie Austin lashed a bases-loaded single off Zabala to tally two and Sam Calderone followed with another single to bring in the third.

These three sluggers badly mauled Seattle pitchers last week to justify manager Lefty O'Doul's contention that he had nothing to worry about in the hitting department. But until Friday night the trio had been tamed to near-submission as the Oaks dropped three straight to Sacramento.

Brovia Homers

Then came Friday night's game.

Led by Brovia who homered twice and drove in six runs, Metkovich and Marshall were joined by Bob Swift in a 12-hit attack that demolished the Sacs, 10-2.

While righthander Dick Strahs was holding the Solons to six hits, Metkovich collected four hits, Marshall three and Swift three, including a homer, to hand Sacramento its worst licking of the new season. Eight homers were hit in the game between the Braves and Redlegs, which Milwaukee won 9-5.

Johnny Logan's homer and

four singles, paced the Braves' 18-hit attack on five Cincinnati pitchers. Del Crandall and Joe Adcock also homered for the Braves while Ray Jablonski hit two and Andy Seminick, Wally Post and Bob Thurman each hit one for the losers.

The Cardinals had to go 14 innings before they beat the Cubs, 12-11, in a game with seven homers. The Cubs tied a Major League record in the second inning when Randy Jackson, Ernie Banks and Dee Fondy got

homers off Tom Poholsky.

Jim Hearn homered too, in pitching the Giants to an 8-3 triumph over the Phillies.

Pitching rather than slugging was the keynote in Brooklyn's 6-0 victory over Pittsburgh. Pirate starter Bob Purkey had a perfect game until Junior Gilliam led off the seventh with a single.

In the American League, Walt Dropo's grand-slam homer highlighted a six-run fifth inning and powered the White Sox to a 9-4 decision over the Indians.

Homers by Jim Delsing and Harvey Kuenn helped Detroit to an 8-3 conquest of Kansas City as Ned Garver scattered 10 hits for his first victory of the season.

Southpaw Tommy Byrne and Tom Morgan collaborated to pitch the Yankees to a 5-2 victory over Washington in the first night game of the season last night. Byrne, who gave up all nine Washington hits, received credit for the victory although he got into numerous jams and finally was relieved by Morgan in the seventh.

Boston edged Baltimore 6-5, as the Orioles dropped their third straight game. Ivan DeLock was the victim of poor support in the field but was credited with the victory.

Willow Creek Reservoir To Open For Trout Fishermen on May 28; 130,000 Rainbow Trout Planted

The Willow Creek reservoir, northeast of Medford, will open for trout fishing May 28, Robert L. Lee, assistant superintendent of the water commission, has been informed by the Oregon State Game commission.

Lee said he asked the state commission about the opening date after he received several inquiries from local sportsmen.

Fred E. Locke, chief of lake and stream management of the state commission, said the season would open May 28 because a preliminary test netting "indicates that later opening is desirable to permit more trout to reach the minimum legal size length." He also said the reservoir is within the boundaries of the Rogue River National forest.

"Once the fishery is established," Locke continued, "we hope to open this reservoir with the general summer trout season as

it lies at a relatively low elevation." Generally, the trout season opens April 30.

The state game commission last year planted 130,000 rainbow trout in the reservoir.

Morris Concessioner

Lee said Lloyd Morris, who operates concessions at Fish lake, will have charge of the concessions and the boat dock at Willow Creek reservoir.

Lee pointed out that overnight camping at the reservoir will be prohibited because of the danger of pollution and fire, and that fires will be permitted only in the picnic area on the western side of the reservoir.

The maximum boat speed on the reservoir will be limited to 10 miles per hour, Lee said, because of wave action along the shore and for protection of fishermen.

Ski Conditions

Fair to good skiing at Crater lake was reported by the National park ranger's office.

Highway 62 to the park was open yesterday with chains advised. The road to the rim was closed in the afternoon. It was expected to be open this morning, if weather is favorable. The warming hut will be open if the road is open.

Snow fell hard all day at the lake with about 10 inches of new snow falling between 8 a.m. and late afternoon. Depth on the ground was 112 inches compared to 130 last year at this time.
