George Peckham To Be Soloist For Concert Here

George Peckham, well known basso and former member of Robert Shaw's famous choral group, will be soloist for the concert which the orchestra of the Philharmonic Society of Southern Oregon is planning. The concert is set for Thursday, May 5, in Medford Senior High school auditorium and Richard D. Werner will direct.

Mr. Peckham, now of Seattle, formerly lived in Medford and was first trained here by the late James Stevens. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. George Peckham Sr., live at 219 Beatty street.

The singer, who toured 23 states with the Robert Shaw chorale, is equally well known for his concert, radio and teaching work. He teaches voice at Cornish School of Fine Arts in Seattle, and there he also studied under George Walker, considered one of the great basses of this day.

Mr. Peckham has sung with such stars as Jinx Falkenberg, and has appeared with Charlie McCarthy and Edgar Bergen. In the spring of 1951 he was chosen by Composer Lockren Johnson to create the role of "Mr. Dickenson" in the chamber opera, "A Letter to Emily" which had its world premier in Seattle under the direction of Emanuel Rosenthal, famous French conductor. Later the company toured the Pacific northwest and Canada.

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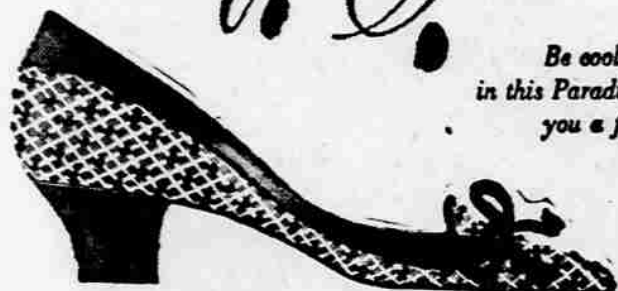
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
