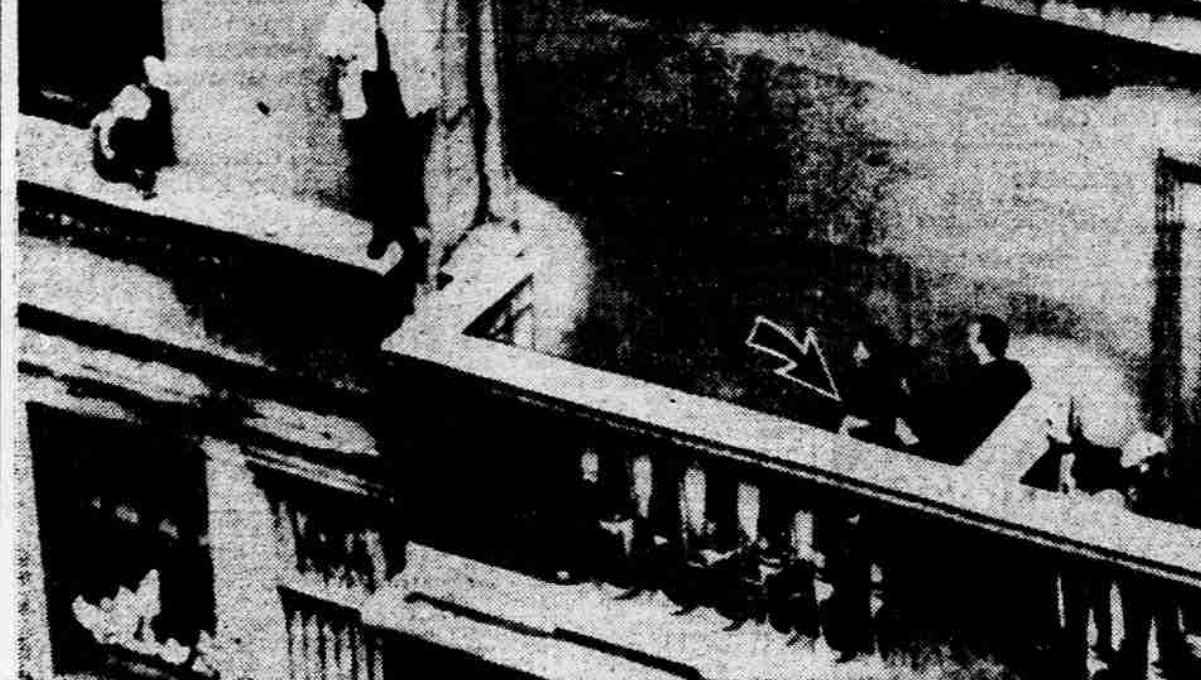

Second Victim of Pasco Shooting Dies

Pasco, Wash. — (U.P.) — P. H. Peterson, 52, wounded in an April Fool's Day shooting spree by his 16-year-old son, died at a hospital last night.

The son, Richard, charged with first degree murder and second degree assault in connection with the shooting which fatally wounded policeman Alva Jackson and hurt the youth's grandfather, Chet Young, may now face another charge, prosecutor Roger Olson said.

The 200-pound high school sophomore went on a half-hour shooting spree after he and his father quarreled about the boy's drinking and the father refused to allow him to use the family car.
