Jacksonville Beaten 12-6 By Prospect

Prospect defeated Jacksonville high 12 to 6 Friday in the only Jackson County B League baseball game contested.

The victory pulled the Cougars even in the standings with Talent. Wet grounds forced postponement of the Talent-St. Mary's and Rogue River-Butte Falls contest. St. Mary's will make up its fray with Talent on May 2 and Butte Falls is now slated at Rogue River next Tuesday.

Prospect and Talent now have two wins and no losses in the circuit. St. Mary's has won the only game it has played.

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The Cougars capitalized on eight hits, four Redskin errors and wildness on the part of Jacksonville hurlers. Redskin tossers gave 11 walks while Sid Peterson, Prospect, issued only one. Each team had a five-run inning. Jacksonville's first turn at bat was its big one and was highlighted by Clyde Smith's home run with two men on base. Sam Bishop, Gary Hueners and Dick Sanford got singles and there was an error in the inning.

ADA Denies Charge By GOP Senators

Washington — (U.P.) — Americans for Democratic Action Saturday denied a charge by the Senate Republican Policy Committee that it advocates a program of socialism.

The ADA replied to a bulky document, criticizing it which was supplied to all GOP senators by the policy committee Friday.

National ADA Chairman Joseph L. Rauh called the booklet "just another example of the healthy state" of Republican finances and "the poor state of their politics."

The booklet said ADA is "a group of left-wing Democrats who seem to hope that, as either the senior or junior partner of a labor alliance, they are going to capture the Democratic Party."

American Tourist Has Narrow Escape

Havana, Cuba — (U.P.) — An American tourist narrowly escaped death Friday night when terrorists, believed to be Communists, bombed the General Electric retail shop on Havana's Prado Boulevard in the heart of the city.

Richard Czarjakowski, 55, Seattle, was passing the store when the bomb blew in its show window, filling the air with fragments of glass and metal. He was dazed and temporarily deafened by the blast but escaped without injury.

Larry Lewis Finalist in AAU Tourney

At least two Medford Police Athletic league boxers scored Friday night while two others drew byes to advance into Saturday night contention in the state AAU boxing tournament at Hillsboro.

Four boys from Medford lost decisions Friday while a fifth was disqualified, according to a report from Coach Hugh Jennings.

Larry Lewis drew a bye to move to a Saturday night title bout in the 112-pound class of the open division. Bobby Lyons, a state champ last year, lost by a decision in the semi-finals of the open 119-pound class.

Medford's other open entry was Junior McDonald. A wire from Jennings said that McDonald flattened Roland Gonzales with a left hook in the first round of a Friday semi-final welterweight tussle but reported that the Medford fighter was "disqualified" when his opponent was unable to continue.

In the novice division Jimmy Evans scored two victories on Friday while Larry Irvin recorded a first round knockout to gain a titular clash on Saturday. Larry Nored got a bye in the 119-pound group to reach a final berth.

Bob Little lost by a decision in the first fight of the 100 pound novice class. Loren Christensen dropped a decision in the 165 bracket and Jean Cronin, 112-pounder, lost a nod.

Hillsboro — (U.P.) — Some 1,500 fans including Gov. Paul Patterson watched the opening night of the Oregon AAU boxing championships Friday night as 31 bouts were held.

Only one of the five Northwest champions fought last night. Churk Lincoln knocked out Ray Hoskins of Albany in two rounds in the 156-pound open division. Denny and Phil Moyer and Tommy Thomas of Portland and Jackie Pucos of Eugene, drew byes.

Military experts from Australia, France, Pakistan, the Philippines, New Zealand, Thailand, the United Kingdom and the United States will attend the conference.

Ducks Defeat Washington; Moad, Bingham Score Wins

Seattle, Wash. — (U.P.) — The University of Oregon Webfoots maintained their supremacy in Northern division dual track meets Saturday by downing the Washington Huskies 69½ to 61½.

Oregon hasn't lost a Northern division dual track meet since midseason in 1953.

The Ducks clinched the meet by winning the mile relay when anchor man Gordy Dahlquist overtook Henry Banks in the home stretch and broke the tape five yards ahead of Banks.

Oregon's Jim Bailly set a new meet record in the 880-yard run with a time of 1:53.7. The old mark of 1:54.1 was set by Jack Hensley of Washington in 1947.

Dean Singer of Washington was the meet's only triple first-place winner, coping both hurdle events and the high jump.

Five Get Titles In Y Wrestling

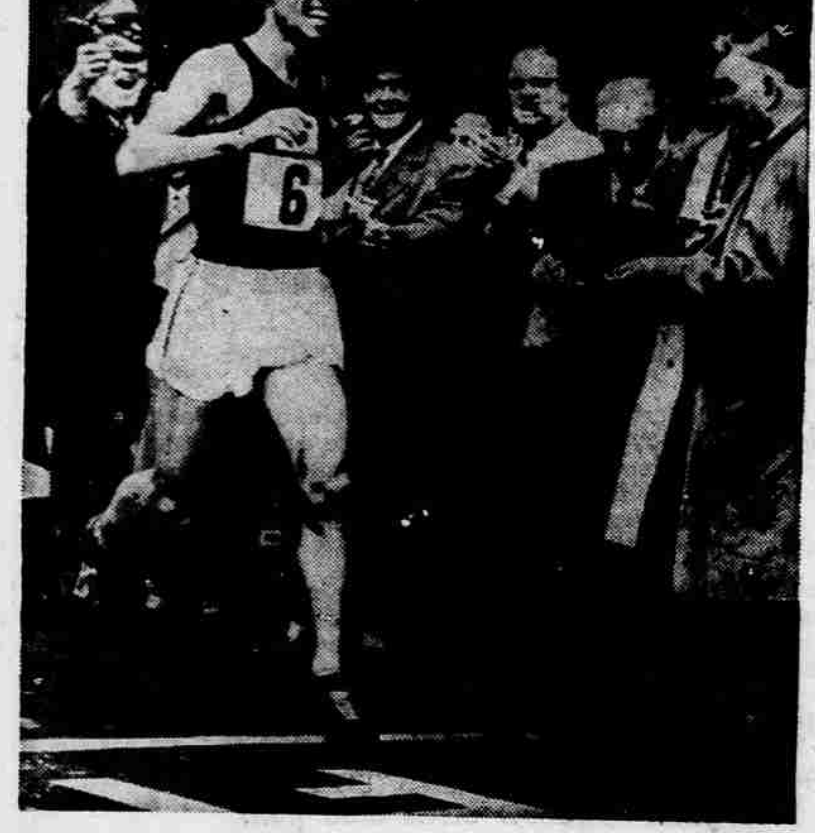

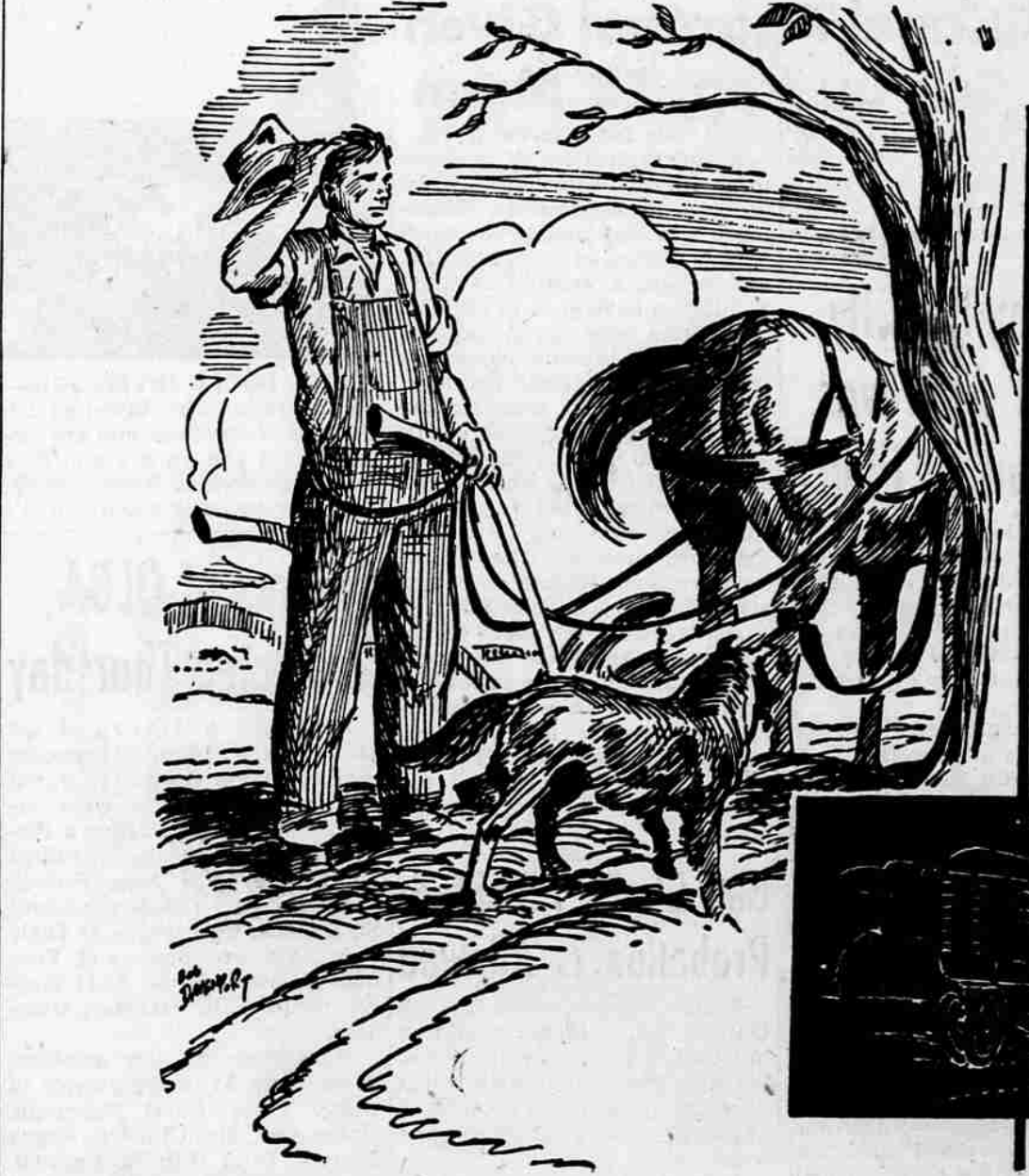
hits but took the benefit of scheduled Friday with Grants Pass was postponed and the make-up date has not been determined.
