After the state-wide broadcast musical entertainment and dancing will be diversions of the evening. The dance music is to begin at 10 p.m. and continue to midnight.

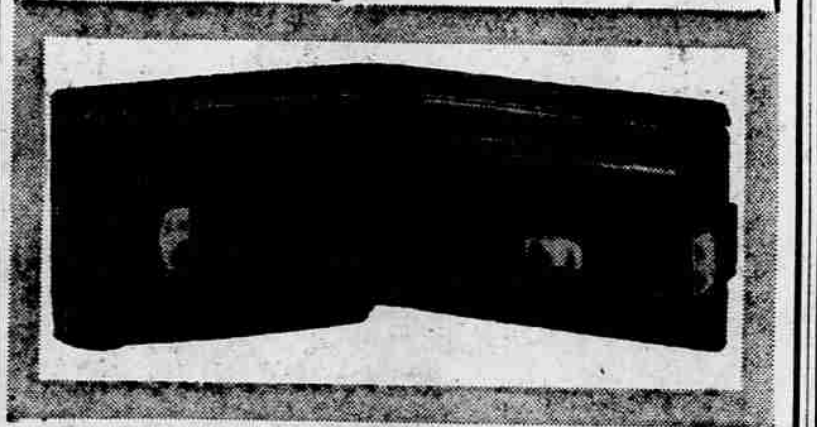
