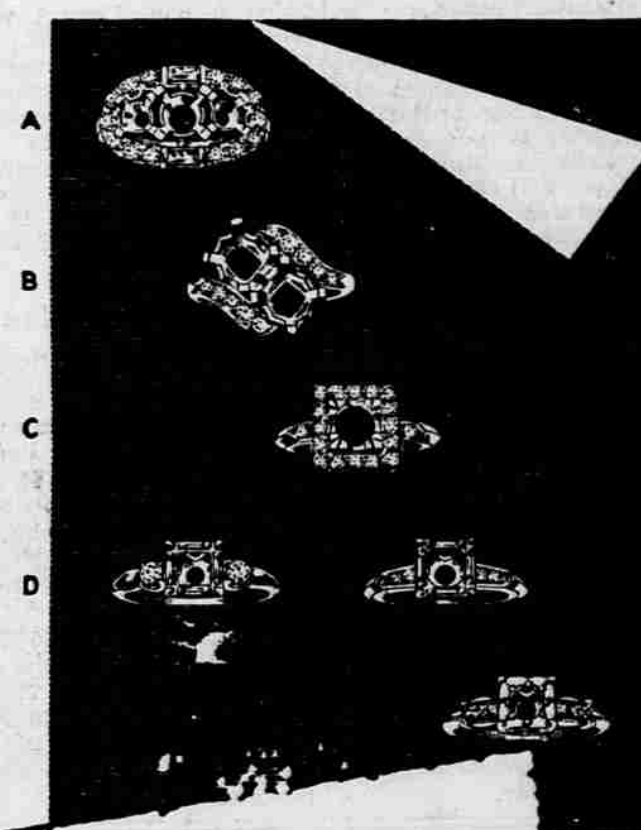
Session Planned By Howard Club
